SUBJECT: S.B. 3034, S.D. 2 – RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD WELFARE EDUCATION COLLABORATION

Hearing: Tuesday, March 11, 2014; 10:00 a.m. Conference Room 329, State Capitol

PURPOSE: The purpose of S.B. 3034, S.D. 2, is to appropriate funds to restore

the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration to assist with the recruitment and training of graduate students from the University of Hawaii School of Social Work for Child Welfare positions at the Department of Human Services.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS)

supports the intent of this bill provided it does not adversely affect the priorities in the Executive Supplemental Budget.

When this program was in effect, the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration (HCWEC) was a successful workforce recruitment and training program between the DHS and the University of Hawaii School of Social Work. Between 1998 and 2008, 109 graduate students were admitted to the HCWEC. Of that total, 100 students completed the program; and as of 2013, 25 graduates were still employed by CWS.

In 2009-2010, the Reduction-in-Force decimated CWS of 21% of its experienced social workers. The Department of Human Services has been rebuilding the CWS staff; however, the intensity and complexity of child protective services has made it extremely challenging to recruit, hire and retain qualify social workers. As of December 31, 2013, CWS had 64 vacant positions. At the same time, CWS staff are retiring or transferring to other jobs. This situation is compounded by the fact that 36% of CWS workers are 50-59 years of age and 29% are 40-49 years. There is a concern that with the impending possibility of retirements in the next five years, CWS will face a critical shortage of experienced workers and supervisors.

The HCWEC could provide a continuous stream of qualified candidates, filling vital vacant positions. Utilizing the university's graduate social work program, ten (10) fulltime and ten (10) part time students would be educated and trained with specialized CWS curriculum, field integrated seminars, and practicum placement in Child Welfare. Students would graduate with a Masters in Social Work degree and be employed with Child Welfare Services after graduation, for a minimum of three years. Based on prior experience, the Collaboration is projected to cost \$353,176 annually, of which 75% is State funded (\$264,882) and 25% Federally funded (\$88,294).

Building a workforce of highly qualified social workers will ensure the safety and well-being of children, increase the level of services to families and improve the outcomes for children in Hawaii.

SB 3034 SD2 – RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD WELFARE EDUCATION COLLABORATION

Chair Carroll, Vice Chair Kobayashi and members of the committee:

As the dean of the Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, I am pleased to support SB 3034 SD2 which funds the opportunity for collaboration between the MBTSSW and DHS/CWS. SB 3034's appropriated funds will allow for the restoration of the Hawai'i Child Welfare Education Collaboration which assists in the training of graduate students from the University of Hawai'i Mānoa Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work for child welfare positions at the Department of Human Services.

MBTSSW and DHS/CWS have a history of collaboration and partnership in successfully recruiting and training social work students to work in the child welfare field in Hawai'i. If approved, the funding allocation for HCWEC will address well documented work force shortages within child welfare services.

MBTSSW is uniquely positioned to support HCWEC due to previous collaborative efforts with DHS/CWS as well as our capacity to deliver the MSW degree program to students who reside on each of the neighbor islands, thus ensuring funds appropriate to the HCWEC support DHS/CWS workforce development statewide.

I encourage the committee to amend SB 3034 SD2 to ensure funding for HCWEC for at minimum three (3) years, to ensure CWS workers are supported through completion of MSW degree requirements. Funding for three (3) years will support DHS employees in Child Welfare while they work full time at CWS and take classes part time.

I strongly urge your favorable consideration of this bill, with the proposed amendment provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in the University's Board of Regents Approved Executive Biennium Budget.

NASW is in **STRONG SUPPORT of SB 3034** which will support the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration.

This bill appropriates funds to restore the Hawaii child welfare education collaboration to assist with the recruitment and training of graduate students from the University of Hawaii Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work for child welfare positions at the Department of Human Services. There are currently 64 vacant positions in the Department of Human Services. NASW concurs with findings of the measure, "Accordingly, the intent of this Act is to build a workforce of highly qualified social workers in Hawaii and improve outcomes for Hawaii children" (and families).

NASW supports the professional development and training of all social workers. The Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration prepares social work graduate students by integrating curriculum, field integration seminars, and practicum experiences to increase the knowledge, skills, and abilities of individuals to respond appropriately to the needs of the children and families involved in the Child Welfare Services system (CWS). To date, the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration, have seen was a successful workforce recruitment and training program that provided over a hundred positions with twenty-five participants remaining employed by CWS. In addition, there are numerous others that are indirectly connected with CWS serving in public and private agencies such as Children's Justice Centers of Hawaii, EPIC Ohana Conferences, Family Programs Hawaii, and NASW.

NASW strongly supports SB 3034. We appreciate your sincere consideration of the restoration of the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration. Please pass this bill. Thank you.

Aloha Representative Carroll and Representative Kobayashi and committee members,

My name is Cheri Tarutani and I am a proud graduate of the Hawaii Child Welfare Education Collaboration (HCWEC) and I strongly support SB3034. It is with much gratitude that I submit this testimony.

My cohort of 12 graduated eleven years ago. Six are still employed with Child Welfare Services (CWS), one is retired, sadly one has passed, and the rest support child welfare in our professional roles. What appears to happen is that even when those graduates leave CWS, they continue on in positions that support the Department. Consequently, CWS now has a community of well-educated and experienced social workers supporting their work, their workers and the children and families that they assist.

Child welfare social workers are special. I believe, they are the most giving of all public servants with their time, their hearts and their continual sacrifices regardless of staff shortages, layoffs, hiring freezes, furloughs, natural disasters, etc. The State has designated them essential workers and I agree, whole heartedly, and believe together Child Welfare Services in collaboration with the Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work have done an excellent job preparing past graduates for this unique work and can be just as successful reinstating the program.

Graduates from the program share camaraderie and pride from completing the HCWEC program and are also deeply imbedded in a unique experience that only those who have lived it can understand. With diversion services in place, child welfare social workers must now be equipped to work with the most serious and severe cases. These families are in extreme crisis and are highly vulnerable. Professional social workers are aware of the potential imbalance of power in these relationships, and are trained and educated to remove bias and understand trauma. They work collaboratively with families, and practice ethically to ensure all families are treated fairly with warmth, genuineness and empathy.

I cannot stress the importance of involving child welfare workers and graduate social work students as part of this collaboration due to the nature of this work. As an instructor for the School of Social Work, I strongly encourage students to consider the area of public child welfare to start their careers as I believe this provides the best foundation for them to work with children and families. To have a comprehensive program specifically addressing this specialized area of social work would tremendously benefit those who commit to careers in child welfare and the families they serve.



In closing, I want to say that the six and a half years of I spent in child welfare services were the most challenging of my life, but the most rewarding experience of my career. There were many tears, but those tears of joy when a child once wrote me, "Thank you for giving me my daddy back" ... well, those words resonate with me every day.

Again, thank you Representatives Carroll and Kobayashi and I humbly request that the committee members support this bill with passion and purpose.

Please vote yes to pass this bill and please appropriate the necessary funds to restore the Hawai'i child welfare education collaboration to assist with the recruitment and training of graduate students from the University of Hawai'i school of social work for child welfare positions at the department of human services.

The collaboration between the University of Hawai'i school of social work and the state department of human services helps to ensure a higher quality of social work services for needy families and children. Good social services for at-risk children and families helps prevent other costly interventions including the criminal justice system.

Social workers like any profession benefit from the support of academic institutions. Social workers who work with families at risk for child abuse and neglect are especially subject to tremendous stresses and special preparation is necessary. Their being trained specifically with the university's support only makes them more likely to be successful in understanding how to work with these families. Social work is a social science and subject to new discoveries like any other science.

California has an especially strong collaborative effort with its Berkeley school of social work and its state child welfare departments, which has been shown to effectively increase best practices for working with children and families (See: *California Social Work Education Center: A Partnership for Education, Student Support, Training, Evaluation and Research, January 1, 2014. It is vital for social workers to stay up to date on the latest practices and research in working with at risk families and children. It is just as important for the university to keep abreast of the realities facing child protection social workers in our state. Clearly the two agencies need to collaborate in order to foster better child welfare outcomes. The research is clear, if we can work more effectively assist at-risk children and families, we can decrease many other costly social problems including substance abuse and participation in the criminal justice system.
