SB 3093 SD1 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO

Chair Luke, Vice Chairs Nishimoto and Johanson, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Donald Straney, Chancellor of the University of Hawai'i at Hilo (UH Hilo). We support SB 3093 SD1 that appropriates funds to UH Hilo to support its memorandum of agreement with RISE 21st Century After School Program and the implementation of the agreement by the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i, a unit of UH Hilo.

The 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i has been cultivating community partnerships that targets greater engagement by Hawai'i Island youth with the resources of UH Hilo. A positive partnership has been established with the RISE 21st Century After School Program that serves as a community and cultural resource for disadvantaged Native Hawaiian youth in Keaukaha. The proposal will help to expand collaborative opportunities supported by staffing and curriculum resources to establish mentorships, initiate project-based learning activities, and offer academic and career planning. UH Hilo views our continued partnership and collaboration with RISE as a positive solution to increase access to higher education and career opportunities for Native Hawaiians on Hawai'i Island.

We support SB 3093 SD1 provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities in our BOR approved budget.

I am writing this letter in support of SB 3093 and the relationship between the RISE After School Program and the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center.

'Imiloa's mission is to honor Maunakea by sharing the culture and science of the mountain to inspire generations.

Science and culture united provides a powerful and inspiring story, and it would be hard to imagine anywhere in the world better suited to tell that story than on the Island of Hawai'i, at the University of Hawai'i at Hilo where world-class science coexists with a rich and remarkable indigenous culture. 'Imiloa not only serves as an educational outreach to the general community, but it more importantly serves as a connector and pipeline for K-12 student and teacher engagement with higher educational resources and opportunities.

At the same time, 'Imiloa today remains a work in progress. Recognizing that 'Imiloa has yet to achieve its full potential, the leadership and staff are cultivating community partnerships that targets greater engagement by Hawai'i Island youth with the resources of the University of Hawai'i. The partnership that we've cultivated with the RISE program directly relates to our priority of serving as a pipeline to higher education. The 'Imiloa Astronomy Center would serve as a bridge between the University of Hawai'i at Hilo and start with the youth of Keaukaha and Pana'ewa through the RISE program and its efforts by creating mentorship opportunities, project based learning activities, and also peer mentoring opportunities between youth groups of the Island. We eventually would like to be able to grow this program to expand throughout the island, and potentially the state. With changing economic, societal, environmental, and political conditions, it is critical that we afford educational opportunities that engage our local youth in meaningful, relevant experiences to help equip them for their futures – Hawai'i's future.

My name is Stanley H Roehrig. I was born and raised in Manoa. I have been practicing law in Hilo for almost 49 years.

During territorial days in 1952, when I was about 5'2" tall and 12 years old, I went from Manoa Elementary School to Stevenson Elementary School. At the time Stevenson was a war zone. I got off on the wrong foot. I joined a gang for survival and beefed under the cafeteria. My "after school program" was detention on most days. The Principal told my mom I was not going to make it at Stevenson, that I was flunking out and that I had to go elsewhere. My parents were frightened and enrolled me in Punahou.

Now I am frightened for my grandson Kawelo, a kolohe young boy who is growing up in Keaukaha. He is Hawaiian, Filipino, Chinese, and Haoli. The RISE After School Program headed by Keahi and Ka'iu can make a difference in our keiki's lives. By connecting this Program to the University of Hawaii, it has a chance of survival for the long term.

Keahi, Ka'iu and I met years ago at the Hawaiian Language College. I also know Keahi and Ka'iu from paddling at Keaukaha Canoe Club for many years. They are part of our Keaukaha Community and both Doctoral candidates at UH Hilo. Chancellor Straney and his staff of professionals are passionate to make this happen.

Please help us implement the RISE Program.

My name is Naomi Ahu, a 23-year resident of the Hilo district and a graduate of the University of Hawaii at Hilo's College of Business and Economics Baccalaureate program and Hawaii Pacific University's Master of Arts in Organizational Change program. In addition, I am the sole fiscal and administrative support for the R.I.S.E program and was instrumental in its initial creation.

I have worked alongside R.I.S.E. Executive Director, Shadd Keahi Warfield on various community projects and programs involving youth in our community (specifically the Keaukaha and Panaewa Hawaiian Homestead areas) for the past 10 years. Through such experiences, I have recognized the challenges our local youth face such as exposure to drugs, alcohol, abuse, poverty, suicide, domestic violence, and more.

It is extremely important for these youth to have exposure to opportunities to offset such behaviors and/or circumstances and to help them recognize their true potential in becoming valuable contributors to the sustainability of our community and future generations. I have extreme confidence that the R.I.S.E. program will contribute greatly to this need, being that it is one of the only programs of its kind in the Hilo district.

Our established relationship and memorandum of agreement with the University of Hawaii at Hilo and the Imiloa Astronomy Center helps to increase the higher education and career opportunities for R.I.S.E. youth participants and the larger community; one of the main objectives R.I.S.E. is striving to achieve. An appropriation of funding to support our collaborative efforts would greatly support our goals moving forward. Therefore, I greatly support the intent of SB3093 SD1 and truly appreciate your consideration of this important bill.
