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#### Maalaea Special Response Vehicle --- Testimony in Support

The people of Maui will be healthier and safer with the addition of a Maalaea Special Response Vehicle (SRV) to the Maui County EMS system. The Maalaea SRV unit will reduce morbidity and mortality among residents and visitors, particularly in the busiest regions of West. South. and Central Maui. The last time new EMS units were added in Maui was nine years ago in 2004. The last four years in particular have brought a steady increase in EMS call volume, adding approximately 1,000 calls per year, from 2009's total of approximately 14,300 calls for service to 2012's total of approximately 17,200 calls for service. Again, this 20% increase in call volume was handled by an EMS system that has had no addition of medic units in the last nine vears. The island of Maui still relies on only one full-service hospital, Maui Memorial Medical Center. People of West Maui are particularly affected. They are served by only two ambulances that typically have transport times of 45 minutes to 1 hour or more. When those two busy ambulances are unavailable, the next ambulance responds from South Kihei, with a typical response time to Lahaina and Napili of 40 to 50 minutes, and only if the Kihei ambulance is available. These "out-of-district" responses, especially into West and South Maui, have increased 25% over the past four years, from 160 in 2009 to 200 in 2012 just for those two districts alone. Not only may illness worsen or death ensue during these prolonged responses, the removal of ambulances from their own districts merely creates a repercussion of depleted EMS resources.

Placing a SRV unit in Maalaea will markedly improve this situation. It will be staffed by a highly trained, experienced, and specialized Paramedic. From Maalaea, the SRV unit will be well situated to arrive at calls in the West, South, and Central areas in 10 to 15 minutes or less. Once on scene, the SRV medic will be equipped to provide lifesaving Advanced Life Support (ALS) at - or potentially even beyond - the capabilities of a traditional ambulance. This ALS care will mean lives saved and patients stabilized in the critical first moments of an illness, injury, or cardiac arrest. Currently, even when Fire Department personnel are present as first responders. only basic care is provided, as they are not able to offer any of the ALS interventions that would be available from a SRV medic unit. By utilizing a single Paramedic, the SRV unit will not only be cost effective and very inexpensive compared to a traditional ambulance, but it will also be a highly adaptable resource available for field triage, incident command, and other public health and safety functions. The SRV unit would be emblematic of a truly intelligent use of EMS resources, from collaboration with the Maui Medevac helicopter, to utilization of the most appropriate of the various ground transport modalities available now and in the future. The precedent for single-paramedic response vehicles already exists in Honolulu, and models for innovative use of expanded-scope, special response Paramedics are available from North Carolina to Toronto, Canada. As populations and healthcare demands in Hawaii continue to grow, a Maalaea Special Response Vehicle will emerge as a key element of effective prehospital medicine in Maui County.

Comments: On behalf of Maui County Paramedics Association I am writing to support SB 498. The increase of 911 calls in Maui County has been steady. The time it takes to transport a patient from the Westside to the hospital has lengthened because of increased traffic. It also takes longer for an ambulance to return to its district because of traffic. This is evolving situation is exacerbated by increased calls for all ambulances in Maui County. When both ambulances on the Westside are out an ambulance from either Kihei or Kahului moves to Maalaea to cover the Westside. Right now, a little more than every other day an ambulance is pulled out of its district to respond to the Westside. The out of district ambulance responding will take up to 30 minutes to get to the patient. Driving Lights and Sirens to a call is the most dangerous part of EMS. More and more we are lengthening the response distances, increasing the chance of an accident. The increased time to get to the patient also decreases the chance of survival for patients in acute distress. A Rapid Response Unit (RRU) would help decrease response distance and time to assist patients. Having a RRU staffed with a Paramedic stationed in Maalaea allows moves to either the Westside, Kihei, Kahului, or Upcountry to cover the area in need. This RRU would also be of great benefit in Mass Casualty events and assisting in the use of Maui Medivac. Our community is growing fast and it is hard to keep up with the growing pains on a limited budget. By passing SB498 we can greatly reduce the pain our community is feeling now. Comments: SB #498 Testimony Over the past (4) years, increase in resident & visitor populations have resulted in a rise in the number of 9-1-1 calls for Emergency Medical Services in both South & West Maui districts. 2004 was the last year there were any EMS state funds appropriated for upgrades in services. SB #498 supports a 'special response vehicle' operation that will augment Maui EMS in more flexible, need-specific ways. • It will ADD a FASTER response to the entire Maalaea community where there is no current EMS or fire units stationed. Closest for both responses are from Wailuku + Kihei. • This unit will be able to move into (South or West) districts that may have both of their respective ambulances 'on-assignments' thereby creating a FASTER paramedic response than is currently available coming from another (outside) district. • An additional Paramedic resource will be available for multi-casualty incidents 24/7 including assisting Central Maui area. The Maalaea area has increased its call volume by 64% between 2009 and 2012. Additionally, the WEST Maui Ambulance Districts have received 48% more responses that have come from ambulance units that were 'outside' this district including from Kihei, Wailea, + Central Maui. Any ambulance response from 'out-of-district' results in a LONGER response time no matter where they are responding from. This roving, FIRST Response "special response vehicle" will be able to render Advanced Life Support treatment while awaiting transport. Although transport is important, being able to render IMMEDIATE life-saving skills as well as administering critical medications may be the difference between life & death. This Paramedic WILL make a difference on Maui!! Please pass SB #498. Thank you!!

I am writing this letter in firm **support of SB498**. Following are personal and statistical reasons behind my support.

I currently work within the 911 system on Maui as a paramedic. I have two personal experiences that quickly come to mind where individuals have suffered morbidity and mortality because of delayed response of an ambulance. In fact, in one incident, bystanders were quick to judge ME, personally as "being slow to respond", not aware that I had to drive 26 plus miles to arrive at the scene. The person I attended to died. I firmly believe had there been special emergency response unit (SRV) within the area, this may not have been the case.

Often times, I hear the two ambulances that support the isolated west side of Maui responding from our only acute care hospital, which is over 20 miles away. My home community of Kihei is usually the one that suffers when both of these ambulances are transporting because one of the two ambulances from Kihei is used to respond to Lahaina. This leads to the community losing the chance for a quick response in cases of an emergency.

I have read that Maui County has the fastest growing population in the state. Not only do we have a blooming local population, but the two areas of the island where this SRV unit would be highly utilized, Kihei and Lahaina, are by far, predominantly tourist destinations. The tourist population on Maui adds upwardly 33% to the local population at any given time. I work within these areas and can contest to the fact that at least 33% of the time I respond to tourists, adding to the need of 911 services in this county. The last 911 ambulance station to open in Maui County was over 8 years ago. I have witnessed firsthand how it has benefited and saved lives, as this is my home unit. I strongly believe that it is again time to support legislation for a new 911 unit in Maui County.

I urge and plead you, please support our rural communities of Maui and vote in favor of SB498.

Comments: I am registered nurse in the Maui Memorial Emergency Department. As a charge nurse I take calls directly from our medics out in the field as they give us advance notice of what patient's are coming in to our emergency room. I am keenly aware of the emergency calls that go out and the locations of our medics. Very often Medic 14 (Wailea) or Medic 3(Kihei) will have to go out to Lahaina because the Lahaina Medics 4 and Napili Medics 5 are already out on calls. Often these calls are serious in nature and involve response within minutes. CPR in progress, near drownings, motor vehicle crashes, heart attacks and strokes to name a few. Situations when every second counts. I cannot tell you how many times I listen in the ER knowing that the closest medic is over 30 minutes away, the whole time the patient will be getting worse and worse and our jobs harder and harder to save them. Sometimes medics will drop off patients at the hospital and must return to Lahaina to pick up another and it is unfathomable that they are more than 30 minutes away. Similar situations arise upcountry when both medic 2 and medic 11 are out on calls, or on a medivac transport. Having a medic station in Maalaea is a great start. Please pass this bill! The life you may save may be your own!

Comments: As a paramedic working on the West Side of Maui I am keenly aware of the challenges that this district present. Not only is West Maui one of the most popular tourist destinations in the state, but it is also home to a growing local population. The area is also home to busy, roadways, beaches, and other locations where dangerous conditions are the norm. Futhermore with no acute care facility on the West Side, transport to Maui Memorial Hospital is often in excess of 20+ miles or 30+ minutes. What seem like the norm for those of us working in this district is responding to a 911 call while still at the hospital or while returning to district. Also, it is common for BOTH West Side units to be either assigned to a case or transporting a patient, requiring that another unit from Central or South Maui must respond, leaving their own district. What this ultimately results in is delayed response, assessment, and treatment of patients, with increase in morbidity and mortality a real possibility, and harsh reality. In short I believe that a paramedic-staffed "Special Response Unit" based out of Ma'alaea would provide rapid assessment and early treatment for patients in these cases. I believe this model has been shown effective in Honolulu and in other areas nationwide, and would ultimately prove helpful to EMS, and improve public safety on Maui.

Comments: I work as a Paramedic in Lahaina. As a conservative estimate. I would say that at least once a shift an out of district ambulance (coming from either Kihei or Wailuku area) is required to respond to the west side of the island because both of those medic units are running calls or transporting patients. Simply put, its approximately 35 minutes that a patient would have to wait in order to recieve advanced life support care. If this person is having a stroke, cardiac event, or suffering a traumatic injury, this direct measurable delay in the arrival of an ALS assest virtuallyl gaurantees a worsended condition by the patient and greater health care costs.

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Senator Josh Green Chair, Senate Committee on Health Re: Senate Bill 498 Letter in Support

Dear Senator Green:

I am writing to you to support SB 498 to establish a Advanced Life Support Rapid Response Unit in Maalea Maui. As an Emergency Physician I know that you are well aware that a key link in the American Heart Association's Chain of Survival is access to rapid Advanced Life Support. Access to rapid ALS is also a key link to survival of many out of hospital emergency conditions such as stroke, internal bleeding, and victims of trauma. Indeed, the "golden hour" is dependent on a rapid initial response to direct a critical trauma patient to the appropriate means of transport to lifesaving resources.

As Maui grows, the emergency medical services system is often strained by simultaneous calls and by long response and transport times. It is not unusual for both West Maui ambulance units to be simultaneously engaged in patient care and transport. It is also not unusual for both South Maui ambulance units to be similarly engaged with patient care. Whenever on of these situations occur, an ambulance from another district must be re-positioned to provide a shorter response time to an open district. This leaves emergency response to that unit's primary service area as well as to the vacated service district delayed....a net system loss of response times to both regions.

Further exacerbating this challenge is the new requirement from the State EMSSIP Branch that every ambulance must stay at the hospital until an electronic patient care record is completed except in certain circumstances. Since a serious/critical EPCR involves many fields of data collection besides the documentation of patient care provided, these EPCRs may take an additional 30-60 minutes to complete, sometimes longer depending on the complications of the case and signature collections. Provisions to release an emergency ambulance have been made, providing that a hand written Brief Ambulance Report (BAR) is completed and scanned. This means that emergency ambulance personnel must write out a BAR before they leave the hospital, further delaying the process.

Even if an ambulance is immediately able to respond to the West Side, it would take over 30 minutes to respond to Lahaina and over 40 minutes to reach Napili. And it would take more than 20 minutes to respond to Kihei and well over 30 minutes to respond deep in to Wailea. These response times are not consistent with the AHA's Chain of Survival, nor with documented survival times needed to survive critical medical and traumatic emergencies. As a former member of the State Emergency Medical Advisory Committee for 8 years and as a member and the Facilitator for the Maui County EMS Advisory Committee for over 30 years, I understand system planning and resource allocation.

I believe that an Advanced Life Support Rapid Response Unit (RRU) placed in Maalaea and that is flexibly deployed to open areas would solve these issues. A RRU can be strategically positioned when ambulances are out of district. An RRU can help coordinated and direct the MEDEVAC helicopter when it is needed. The RRU can help in triage and directing appropriate resources in an multiple casualty incident. And the RRU can help provide Advanced Life Support Coverage (thus strengthening the Chain of Survival) whenever an emergency ambulance is unable to respond in a timely manner for any reason. And since an RRU would be staffed by only one MICT, ALS coverage would be provided in a cost efficient manner.

For these reasons, I urge you to support SB498.
