# S.B. 4 RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES

Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor

The Department of Transportation (DOT) recognizes the need for all motor vehicle occupants to be restrained by a seat belt or child passenger restraint while riding in a motor vehicle being operated on any public roadway.

As such, the DOT supports SB 4 because it would increase the safety of all motor vehicle occupants by as much as 45 percent, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

NHTSA also states that seat belts are the most effective safety feature ever invented and have saved the lives of thousands of motor vehicle occupants.

In 2011, there were 40 motor vehicle occupant fatalities in Hawaii. Of the 40 motor vehicle occupant fatalities, 14 or 35 percent, were not restrained. If those 14 occupants had been wearing seat belts, at least 6 of them might have survived the crash.

The HPD strongly supports the passage of Senate Bill No. 4, Relating to Motor Vehicles. Passage of this bill would require that all front and back seat passengers be restrained by a seat belt assembly or a child passenger restraint when the motor vehicle is operated on any public highway.


Wearing a seat belt is the most effective way to prevent death and serious injury in a crash. Data provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention demonstrate that laws, education, and technology have effectively increased seat belt use from 11% in 19812 to nearly 85% in 20103, saving hundreds of thousands of lives. Yet, about 1 in 7 people still don't buckle up.

- Seat belts dramatically reduce risk of death and serious injury. Among drivers and front-seat passengers, seat belts reduce the risk of death by 45%, and cut the risk of serious injury by 50%.
- Seat belts prevent drivers and passengers from being ejected during a crash. People not wearing a seat belt
  are 30 times more likely to be ejected from a vehicle during a crash. More than 3 out of 4 people who are ejected
  during a crash die from their injuries.
- Seat belts save thousands of lives each year, and increasing use would save thousands more. Seat belts saved almost 13,000 lives in 2009. If all drivers and passengers had worn seat belts that year, almost 4,000 more people would be alive today. Locally, according to the Hawaii State Department of Transportation, there were 40 motor vehicle occupant fatalities in Hawaii, 14 of which were unrestrained. Had they been using a seatbelt, 6 of these individuals may have survived.


As a policy priority of the Hawaii Injury Prevention Plan, 2012-2017, the Hawaii Strategic Highway Safety Plan, and the State Highway Safety Council, we strongly urge the committee to support this measure.

My name is Marie Weite and I am currently a Claims Adjuster at First Insurance Company. I am a former member of the Governor's Highway Safety Council and spent several years on the Keiki Injury Prevention Coalition. I am also a Child Passenger Safety Technician.

I strongly support the passage of SB4. For the last 25 years, I have handled automobile Injury claims and have seen firsthand the effect of being properly restrained. I have handled numerous claims where the properly restrained occupant has survived and in the same vehicle, the unrestrained perished. I have also witnessed the unnecessary injuries sustained to occupants who have been ejected from the vehicle because they simply did not use their seatbelt. The economic toll these injuries and deaths have on our society is senseless. It is unfortunate, but people still look to the government to tell them what is common sense, that the proper use of seatbelts reduces injuries and fatalities.

Comments: This bill has the potential to save lives and prevent injuries by requiring that all passengers in a motor vehicle are restrained - all ages, all seating positions. Any unrestrained person or object in the vehicle is a potential projectile that in a crash can cause major damage. This bill will protect not only the newly restrained adult back seat passenger, but all others in the vehicle. It is not going to help a front seat passenger or driver to be restrained if they are hit from behind by an unrestrained back seat passenger flying toward them. It is well documented that seat belts and child restraints save lives. They are just as much a public health protective factor as immunizations are to prevent communicable disease.
