In consideration of SENATE BILL 524, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Senate Bill 524, Senate Draft 1 proposes to: (1) Establish an agricultural development and food security program, (2) Establish state planning objectives to increase demand and access to locally grown foods; and (3) Establish state planning objectives to increase production of locally grown foods. The Department of Land and Natural Resources ("Department") supports this measure but recommends that the bill be amended to include three critical elements.

- 1) Designate someone within the Department of Agriculture with direct responsibility to implement a food resiliency program. The position needs to be fully funded with a fully funded support staff to coordinate and implement the plans.
- 2) The program needs to outline specific tasks to be accomplished.
- 3) Any program and/or initiative for food resiliency must be able to measure progress through appropriate, comprehensible, specific and practical metrics, which both the farm community and the public can easily understand.

The Department <u>strongly supports</u> measures that will aggressively advance Hawaii's goal of food self-sufficiency.
