SENATE BILL NO. 524 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairperson Nishihara, Vice Chair Kouchi and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill No. 524. Unfortunately, I will not be able to represent the Department of Agriculture at the hearing today. This is due to my responsibilities as Chair of the Board of Agriculture to convene the Board of Agriculture meeting which has been planned for many weeks to address several important issues that require board action.

The purpose of this measure is to implement selected recommendations of the "Increased Food Security and Food Self-Sufficiency Strategy" ("Strategy") report issued by the Office of Planning in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture, by creating within Chapter 141, an agricultural development and food security program within the Department of Agriculture, pursuant to amendments to be made to the State Planning Law (Chapter 226, HRS). The Department of Agriculture supports the intent of this measure as evidenced by the prioritized staffing and programmatic initiatives established by the Department particularly for the utilization of "barrel tax" monies.

The Department prefers to address the proposed initiatives as indicated in the Department's budget.

SB 524 - Relating to Agriculture

Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Kouchi, and members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, my name is Maria Gallo. I am Dean and Director of the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR), University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, and I am submitting testimony today in support of SB 524 on behalf of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of SB 524, "Relating to Agriculture," for the purpose of establishing an agricultural development and food security program. The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa supports the intent of the bill provided it does not adversely affect our UH priorities as set in our budget request, most notably in health and safety and repairs and maintenance issues.

As noted in the text of SB 524, food security and sustainability are extremely important issues for the State of Hawai'i. The Interim Dean of the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) participated in drafting the report from the State Office of Planning entitled "Increased Food Security and Food Self-sufficiency Strategy: A State Strategic/Functional Plan Prepared in Accordance with HRS Chapter 226 Hawai'i State Plan and the Hawai'i Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy." SB 524 would provide the funding necessary to facilitate implementation of the recommendations in that report.

Within our available resources, including any resources provided by SB 524, CTAHR and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa are prepared to lend our full support to the implementation of these recommendations. To assist in this implementation, we have provided preliminary budget information to the Chair of the Board of Agriculture for those recommendations in the report in which CTAHR would be most involved.

Support of SB 524, Relating to Agriculture (Establishes an agricultural development and food security program).

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers and a utility company. LURF's mission is to advocate for reasonable, rational and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources, and public health and safety.

LURF appreciates the opportunity to express its **support of SB 524** and of the various agricultural stakeholder groups who defend the goals of viable agricultural operations and the conservation and protection of agriculture, including important agricultural lands (IAL) in Hawaii. The bill conveys the need for collaboration amongst diverse sectors of the community - business, government, and agricultural stakeholders - and the importance for them to work together cooperatively to improve the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry.

SB 524. This bill authorizes the creation of an agricultural development and food security program; establishes state planning objectives to increase demand for, production of, and access to locally grown foods; and makes appropriations accordingly.

LURF's Position. This bill is consistent with the underlying intent and objectives of the IAL laws (Hawaii Revised Statutes [HRS], Sections 205-41 to 52), which were enacted to fulfill the mandate in Article XI, Section 3 of the Hawaii State Constitution, "to conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands." As noted in HRS Section 205-41, the intent of Act 183 (2005) was to develop agricultural incentive programs to promote agricultural viability, sustained growth of the agricultural industry, and the long-term use and protection of important agricultural lands for agricultural use.

Passage of the long-awaited IAL legislation would be pointless without implementation of these inducements which require the cooperation and support of agricultural, business and educational organizations, as well as government agencies, which this bill is intended to cultivate and promote.

By recognizing the significance of, and need to advance the interrelationships between private and public sectors to develop and improve the local agriculture industry, and establishing a program to identify the objectives and address the needs of the industry, this bill significantly helps to promote economically viable agriculture and food selfsufficiency in Hawaii. As such, LURF is in **strong support of SB 524**.
