My name is Robert Witt and I am executive director of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS), which represents 99 private and independent schools in Hawaii and educates over 33,000 students statewide.

HAIS supports SB 592 which appropriates funds to operate and implement the Future Farmers of America and 4-H programs, helping to build the next generation of our islands' agricultural leaders and supporting careers in agriculture. We ask that the legislature consider similar support for the school gardens programs that encourage and supplement our youngest students with experienced-based learning and complement the 4H and FFA agricultural education.

4H and FFA are programs with decorated histories of educating and training our communities' farmers and ranchers to be sustainable. They are organizations that address sustainability by providing hands-on help in providing our youth with the tools for success. Local agriculture can be revitalized by supporting these organizations, which provide the experience and skills needed by farmers and ranchers to endure the rigorous, yet rewarding work they face. The lack of young farmers and ranchers with the experience, skills, and ambition needed to undertake the complex work of farming and ranching as a business is large. 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Chairs: Nishihara, Tokuda, and Taniguchi and the members of the Committees on Agriculture, Education and Higher Education.

My name is Ernie Gill and I applaud your efforts to address the shrinking supply of trained agriculturists needed to meet the demands of agriculture and natural resources in Hawaii.

I work for the National FFA Organization as the Western Regional Director. My responsibilities require me to work with the 10 western states to facilitate the delivery of agriculture education and FFA by working with state staff, teacher leaders and Universities in those states. Currently the National FFA Organization is at record highs for number of agriculture education programs and student membership in the National FFA. In Hawaii the number of programs and FFA membership are at all-time lows. Although there may be many more enrolled but a small percentage are in FFA where they learn crucial leadership skills necessary to for employment in today's agriculture. Every state in the nation has a State Director of Agriculture Education and in Hawaii this position has been absent for numerous years. Without this person information is not provided and followed up on with the advisors. Thus students are deprived of numerous opportunities provided by National FFA that create leadership, personal growth and career awareness for all students. Hawaii has a rich heritage in the FFA dating back to 1929 when Hawaii territory was recognized with a National Charter and in1931 when a student from Hawaii received the first American Degree. Over the years there have been many finalists in Public speaking at the National level and students have participated in numerous leadership development events at the national level. Currently Hawaii students only participate sporadically in the many National FFA leadership development programs. There are numerous programs and most are offered at a minimal fee or cost sharing. This bill, SB 592, would be a starting point for support that is necessary to reverse this trend allowing the resources necessary for participation. However, I am concerned about the funding and the way it is appropriated. The \$75,000 to be appropriated to the Department of Education where one half is to be for FFA support and the other half is to be for 4-H support is concerning. I think it is appropriate for FFA as traditional funding comes from USDE, to DOE and then to the schools for use in school based programs. However, the funding for 4-H should not be appropriated to DOE as it is not school based. The appropriate channel for funding of 4-H is USDE to Land Grant Universities then through extension agents to local support. I am afraid this would cause confusion and conflict of use with two different entities funding 4-H. I would recommend that \$75,000 be appropriate to DOE for

use solely for FFA support and that \$75,000 be appropriated to the University for Agriculture Education and Extension Education training teachers and agents. There is a severe shortage now and in the future for these professionals. We cannot train the agriculture youth of the future without well qualified agriculture teachers and extension agents.
