SB 606 - RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

Chair Taniguchi, Vice Chair Kahele and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i supports the intent of SB 606, which provides funds to hire student employees at all the campuses. As noted in SB 606 hiring student employees at UH benefits both the student and the University: students earn while they learn and the University has a talented workforce. College students can be hired to do many needed jobs e.g. tutors and recruiters at the high schools; jobs in offices, laboratories and classrooms. National research shows that students who work on-campus persists at a higher rate and earn better grades than students who work off-campus. It is in our best interest to have our students work with us and for us in order to improve the retention rate toward graduation. Career related jobs off-campus give our students an edge in securing permanent positions in their field after completion of their academic program.

Students and families continue to seek financial aid and employment to meet the cost of attendance. UH spends approximately \$22 million to hire students systemwide with funds from tuition and fees, federal and state general funds. Our data shows that during the first month of the fall semester, there were 2,534 students who were looking for an on-campus job and not placed at the end of that month. For that same period, there were more than 3 students applying to every off-campus job at Mānoa (figures for other campuses were not readily available online).

We estimate about 1,500 students can be hired if \$5 million is appropriated. The following table shows the allocation per campus based on the number of full time students. A minimum wage increase would change some of these numbers.

SB606 - Relating to the University of Hawai'i - Student Employment

I am the coordinator of the Student Employee of the Year (SEOTY) program at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. The SEOTY program provides UH employers with the opportunity to nominate their students for their outstanding work and contributions to their department and the University. Additionally, the SEOTY program highlights the personal and professional benefits that students gain through their student employment experience.

The SEOTY program is in its 28th year and we continue to get nominations from supervisors of student employees who perform outstanding work and statements from students on the value of their work experiences at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. I have included quotes from previous winners of the SEOTY award as examples:

2012 Student Employee of the Year Christine Omiya, Senior majoring in Secondary Education

"Being in a fast-paced customer service position has allowed me to further develop skills I already had, plus new ones. My job has also showed me that it's important to think things through, look into further details and different solutions before choosing the best response. Sometimes, the first answer that's off the top of my head may not be the best one, and it doesn't benefit either the customer or me with such rash decisions. I've also learned to be more responsible for the actions I take, good or bad.

Being a student employee has made me realize: I need to take control and account of the decisions and actions I choose, rather than blaming it on others. I think this has helped me to be more on top with my studies."

2011 Student Employee of the Year Jonathan Goto, Senior majoring in Accounting

"My job experience gave me the necessary confidence and skills to make me want to take on more responsibility to continually cultivate my skills and develop my character. My job at the Shidler College of Business has always been a busy one. Ever since I started, there was always something to do, and I didn't mind. I strongly believe in the adage "Nothing in life worth doing is easy," which rings especially true for this job. This office showed me the value in hard work, which is something I never fully appreciated prior, and instilled in me the drive to excel that I know will help me to succeed in the future."

"Every day at the office is always a learning experience that aids my growth as a young Hawaiian woman, a Masters student, a budding musician, a hula student, a scholar, an older sister, a daughter, an aunty, a future teacher, a cultural practitioner and preserver, basically in every aspect of my life.

My work consists of cataloging and digitizing old Hawaiian vinyl records, assisting students, teachers, and community members with various research projects, assisting my supervisor and teacher, Kumu Keawe Lopes, with his Hawaiian music classes (doing video media work), working closely with teachers who are constantly encouraging me in my studies, also cataloging and reviewing the works of Ka Waihona A Ke Aloha. Through these tasks, I have learned more about how to research and organize information, which in hand helps me through my process of finishing my Master's thesis. I have also observed some of the elements that it takes to be a Hawaiian Language Music teacher and in turn am starting to feel more used to the idea of becoming a teacher myself."

I am Kelsey Honda. I am a senior at UH Mānoa majoring in electrical engineering and I support this bill.

I have been a student employee in the Mānoa Career Center for the past two and a half years. My job is to service students at the front counter and to respond to emails received from students using our services. We have many students, especially at the beginning of the semester seeking our services to locate a job on- or off-campus. We also occasionally receive email from students who are having difficulty finding a job. This is one example:

I have applied for dozens of jobs and am perfectly qualified but haven't received a single one. I need to be able to pay rent and I can't go to school anymore if something doesn't happen ASAP.
