SENATE BILLL NO 737 RELATING TO TRUTH-IN-ADVERTISING

Chairperson Nishihara and Members of the Committee

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 737. The bill proposes to establish a farmers' market operator license to ensure that more than 50% of the vendors in respective farmers' markets sell food, farm produce, or flowers which are prepared, grown, or produced in Hawaii. The department supports the intent of the bill and offers comments.

The department also recognizes that consumers associate farmers markets as a venue where vendors sell locally produced or prepared food products and flowers. Based on the department's farmers' market listing, there are an estimated 109 recognized farmers' markets in the State.

In order to fulfill the requirements of this bill, the department will need to amend the Hawaii Administrative Rules to establish the licensing requirements for each farmers' market operators and how each vendor is to be evaluated to determine if they are "primarily" selling food, farm produce, or flowers prepared, grown, or operated in Hawaii, which may take up to one year or more to adopt. Or in the alternative, the Senate can amend existing statute to address these concerns.

Comments: Regarding SB737 Truth in Advertising Aloha, and Mahalo for hearing my testimony. As the co-owner and operator of five farmers' market in the state of Hawaii, I must guestion the purpose of SB737. I find it very difficult to understand its intent. It seems to read that up to 49% of produce sold at farmers' markets may be grown in China, California, New Zealand, Equador, or anywhere else on the globe, as long as 51% of the produce is grown in Hawaii. If we are talking about truth-inadvertising, then I would suggest that 100% of the produce sold at farmers' markets have the requirement that it be grown in our beautiful state. The general public should be able to trust that when they enter a farmers' market they are not simply buying produce that has been repackaged from Costco. I recently visited a "farmers' market" and found produce from 17 different countries and states well beyond the borders of Hawaii. The deceit in that is horrific. Why on earth would anyone think it is okay to sell Mexican Mangoes at a farmers' market in Hawaii? And what percentage of the general public has the knowledge to walk through and start counting imported items? The expectation is that you are buying local when you make the choice to shop at your neighborhood farmers' market. This bill does nothing to address that concern. If we truly want to increase Local Food For Local Consumption, then we need to support our local farmers who are breaking their backs trying to feed us. As to the language regarding complaints, it seems not only excessive, but illegal to have the State DOA digging through the records of a legitimate business at the paranoid request of its competition. It seems to read that if I have a personal vendetta against so-and-so who happens to run a farmers' market, then I can simply call the Department of Agriculture and wreak all kinds of time consuming havoc for them, making their business suffer and giving me opportunity to get more of the market share. How is this legal? Although I am in favor of a very clear set of high standards for farmers' markets (similar to our personal market regulations) I do not feel SB737addresses the immediate farmers' market concerns regarding Truth in Advertising and therefore it does not have my support. Comments: What is the definition of a farmers market in Hawaii? There is not one. We are putting the cart before the horse when asking a person who runs a farmers market to get a license.We don't even have a process in place to verify what a farmer is. I have been operating farmers markets for almost two decades. My credits are being voted Farmers Market Manager of the year in North America by all my peers in 2005 by the North America Farm Direct Marketing Association. The markets that I have run have been voted twice one of the top 5 markets in the country along with Union Square in New York and Ferry Plaza in San Francisco. Hale'iwa Farmers Market before it closed was voted one of the Coolest Markets in the World and voted twice Hawaii's favorite market by American Farmland Trust. What I would like to understand is what does 50% of the vendors in the market primarily sell food, farm produce, flowers, prepared, grown or processed in Hawaii mean? Does it mean 50% of what the farmer sells should be from Hawaii? I believe as does California and Texas that it should be 100% grown in Hawaii. Nothing is more insulting to me and our farmers to see Dole Ecuadorean bananas or mangoes being sold at a so called farmers markets. Also resellers that purchase carrots, potatoes, garlic, lemons, peppers etc from a wholesaler or Costco and deceive the customers thatthey grow that item and it is freshly harvested when it coild be a month old. What does primarily mean? Does that mean that the food vendors should have 50% of their prepared food be grown in Hawaii? Does it mean that a market can have 49% imported food? This bill is so vague. Truth in Advertising is so important when it comes to produce that local people and visitors purchase. Farmers markets are the backbone for Local Food for Local Consumption. Value added from the farmers helps the farmer quadruple his raw product in dollars. Prepared food at markets support the farmers by using the local product in their dishes and sharing with others how to prepare local food at home. Also to investigate an operator based on a complaint will not meet "probable cause" laws already enacted. To subject a business to examination of their books, ledgers, scales etc based on a complaint process is clearly a competitors dream. There needs to be a wrong doing proved before a state can allow examination and production of documents. This act is trying to supersede processes already defined in the court system. In conclusion, this SB737 is so vague in so many ways and possibly illegal in others that I must oppose it.
