Subject: Senate Bill No. 751 Relating to an Urban Growth Commission

The Department of Planning and Permitting **opposes** Senate Bill No. 751 which would establish an urban growth commission under the State Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT). The commission would establish regulations on density, building design, infrastructure and other requirements to mitigate impacts of development on surrounding communities within urban growth boundaries. This commission would convene every five years, and its adopted rules would supersede all state and county standards.

Clearly, this is a violation of homerule. This bill appears to establish a statewide zoning code. There are other concerns:

- 1. There is no stated purpose or objective of the proposed commission, other than to override existing regulations. There is no definition of "urban growth boundaries".
- 2. Without any staffing support, and apparently meeting infrequently, it is unlikely that the large commission can be effective.
- 3. It is perplexing why the State Office of Planning and the State Land Use Commission are not represented on the commission, as they deal directly with land development.

- 4. The bill appears to disregard the unique needs, issues and regulatory framework of each individual county.
- 5. How will any new regulations be enforced? Will there be an administrative relief process to allow for variances from adopted standards?
- It is questionable whether an appointed body should administratively override regulations adopted by the legislative body of each jurisdiction. This is one of the issues that raised public concern over the Public Land Development Corporation.

Please hold Senate Bill No. 751 in Committee until more justification for an urban growth commission is provided. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
