SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO TO CONDUCT AN OUTREACH PROGRAM, PERFORM A NEEDS ASSESSMENT, AND ESTABLISH A HIGHER EDUCATION LEARNING CENTER IN THE DISTRICT OF PUNA ON THE ISLAND OF HAWAII.

WHEREAS, rural areas in the State are in need of higher
 education learning centers that can help improve employment and
 entrepreneurial activities in those areas; and

5 WHEREAS, the district of Puna on the island of Hawaii is a 6 prime location for establishing a higher education learning 7 center, and it could identify educational and training needs in 8 the district, design a business incubator approach to support 9 job growth in the area, and focus on outreach to increase 10 agriculture production and processed products for local markets 11 utilizing emerging engineering programs; and 12

WHEREAS, if successful, the higher education learning
center in Puna can serve as a model for other rural areas in the
State; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2013, the House of Representatives concurring, that the University of Hawaii at Hilo is requested to establish a higher education learning center, as broadly described above, in the district of Puna on the island of Hawaii; and

24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii at 25 Hilo is encouraged to work with the United States Pacific Basin 26 Agricultural Research Center in establishing a higher education 27 learning center in Puna; and

29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 30 is requested to support and assist the University of Hawaii at

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Hilo in establishing a higher education learning center in Puna;
 and

4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii at 5 Hilo is requested to establish an outreach program under the College of Agriculture, Forestry, and Natural Resource 6 7 Management to conduct an outreach program and perform a needs assessment for the higher education learning center, including 8 an assessment of existing educational resources and facilities 9 that can be used to provide educational and training options in 10 Puna; and 11

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the University of Hawaii at Hilo is requested to report findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation and funding needs, resulting from the outreach program and needs assessment to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014; and

20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the 21 United States Pacific Basin Agricultural Research Center; 22 Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture; President of the 23 University of Hawaii System; Chairperson of the Board of Regents 24 25 of the University of Hawaii; Chancellor of the University of Hawaii at Hilo; and Dean of the College of Agriculture, Forestry 26 27 and Natural Resource Management at the University of Hawaii at 28 Hilo.

Chair Choy, Vice Chair Ichiyama and Members of the Committee:

My name is Donald Straney, Chancellor of the University of Hawai`i at Hilo. We support SCR198 to conduct an outreach program, perform a needs assessment and establish a Higher Education Learning Center Project in the District of Puna.

Agriculture is a promising career choice for a new generation of innovative and responsible leaders who will contribute to the future needs of our island economy. There is a critical need to strengthen rural outreach, education and economic development. Dear Chair Isaac Choy, Vice Chair Linda Ichiyama, and Committee Members,

Hawaiian Shores Community Association (HSCA) is the homeowners association representing the Hawaiian Shores Recreational Estates subdivision located in the Puna district on the Big Island containing nearly 1300 lots. As with many of the large subdivisions of the Puna and Ka'u districts of the Big Island, where build-out is now greater than 35%, we maintain community center facilities that may function as part-time classrooms and/or venues for hosting workshops and training programs.

We are very much in support of this measure which would include conducting a needs assessment to identify existing facilities and expertise (individuals and organizations) that can team up to create a virtual learning center network that ties together various facilities in the community where classes can be held such that residents don't have to travel far to participate. There may also be an element of distance (online) classes incorporated into this program which is where the largest growth in higher education offerings is now occurring.

The idea of starting with a focus on agriculture - crop production and processing of foods for local markets – makes perfect sense for the district of Puna which is rural and has great potential to contribute to food security for our local population. Once a successful program is developed that truly promotes and encourages greater agricultural production, we envision this program branching out into other applied subject areas that will lead to job skill growth and support entrepreneurial efforts needed in our community. This would support the growth of small and medium sized businesses in this economically depressed region of the State. Further, the applied nature of the proposed outreach program will make it eligible for other sources of financial support, such that it isn't solely dependent on State funding to be sustained.

We encourage the committee members to support this measure, and hope that the House will pass this concurrent resolution.

As a first step we need a computer learning center that can serve two purposes.
