### SCR 70, SR 37 SUPPORTING THE RIGHT OF HAWAII'S FARMERS TO SELL THEIR LOCALLY GROWN PRODUCE FREE OF DUPLICATIVE AND UNNECESSARY STATE AND LOCAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

## Testimony of Loretta J. Fuddy, A.C.S.W., M.P.H. Director of Health

March 28, 2013 3:00 p.m.

1 **Department's Position:** The department opposes this resolution.

2 **Fiscal Implications:** This resolution has no significant fiscal implications.

3 **Purpose and Justification:** The department opposes this resolution for the following reasons:

1) There are many "value-added" produce products that are now classified as potentially
 hazardous foods. This means food that has the ability to harbor, grow, and spread deadly pathogenic
 bacteria and viruses. Many of Hawaii's farmers do not have access to potable water, which would make
 the sale of their "value-added" produce very dangerous to consumers as non-potable water has a high
 potential to contain dangerous levels of disease-causing bacteria. Unprotected water supplies can
 introduce mammalian feces, urine, parasitic or viral pathogens and other physical contaminants into the
 local food supply if allowed to be sold unchecked.

2) Temporary food sale permits allow the department to evaluate the safety of the food being sold, and can be approved by the department in as little as five minutes if all the paperwork is in order and all public health requirements are met.

3) The provisions of the FDA Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) are designed to have the
local health departments maintain regulatory control by the promulgation of local rules to comply with
federal law. Since the FDA has no jurisdiction to inspect intra-state commerce or regulate locally sold
produce, there will be no duplication of effort. "Value-added" produce is typically considered "readyto-eat." As such, some of these products can be potentially hazardous and require strict local oversight
to protect public health.

4) Contrary to the resolution (page 1, lines 22-24), the majority of grocery stores or purveyors of produce in Hawaii, do not require their produce vendors to show proof of 3<sup>rd</sup> party quality control inspections or any other food safety certification documentation which specifically protects the produce supply from contamination.

It is critical for public health protection that purveyors of potentially hazardous value-added produce be inspected and monitored by DOH to prevent foodborne illness. Value-added produce is the cause of numerous deaths and illnesses throughout the United States due to E. coli, Salmonella, and other life-threatening food-borne illnesses.
