Priority Bills for Hawaiian Affairs committee is HB 2806, HD1 regarding Aha Moku, the second bill is Relating to Hawaiian fishponds HB 2838, HD 2, the third bill is Pu'uhonua at Kulani HB 2848 and HB 2808 Kikala-Keokea was passed without amendments by the Committee on Finance on Feb-

ruary 29th, which provides an additional period of ten years within which Kikala-Keokea homestead may construct dwellings, as required in their leases commencing upon the effective date of this Act. During Session, we talk a lot about bills, but what about resolutions? Legislators introduce and hold hearings on resolutions as well as bills. Although resolutions don't become law, they do express the sentiment of the Legislature and may prove vital in moving your issue forward. Resolutions may range from establishing an honorary designation for a day or perhaps a month, to requesting the formation of a task force or calling for a study of a particular issue. When a bill dies, a legislator may convert some aspect of the bill to a resolution. The deadline to introduce resolutions this year is March 14th.

## Opihikao Church



Opihikao congregational church is located in Opihikao, Puna, Hawai'i. The "good news "was brought to Opihikao in 1823. It was recorded by the late Rev. Makuakane that four churches were being es-


tablished simultaneously in 1865. There were two churches in Hilo and two churches in Puna. The Opihikao church was reorganized on March 13, 1868 and Rev. Makuakane records that the church was built in 1895. Without sufficient documentation, we can only assume that the present church is the second, vated several times. Reverend Daniel Makuakane. The Makuakane Ohana has led this church through many generations that will be honored and remembered for their great service to the people and the community.
