POTENTIAL WINDMILL FARMS ON LANA'I AND MOLOKA'I

As our island-state faces greater demands for energy, new and creative solutions are needed to fulfill Hawai'i's growing energy needs. In a recent joint hearing between the Senate Committees on Energy and Environment and Commerce and Consumer Protection, residents of Lana'i and Moloka'i gathered to discuss the construction of wind farms upon their islands.

Those opposed to the wind farms point out the permanent scaring of the landscape and insufficient returns to the residents of these islands. Those in support of the farms indicate that if successful in this first step, the State of Hawai'i will obtain 40% of its energy from renewable sources by 2030. This would significantly reduce the environmental effects of burning fossil fuels to provide Hawai'i it's energy needs. In return for producing renewable energy, Hawaiian Electric Company and Castle & Cook proposed a community benefit package for the residents of Lana'i and Moloka'i that would entitle them to electric rates that match those of Oahu, the allotment of hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to community proj-

ects such as improving water systems, and the guarantee that these islands would have 100% renewable electricity within 20 years. Sen. English, a strong supporter of renewable energy, pointed out that residents of Lana'i and . Moloka'i need to be prepared for the possibility that the wind projects are going to happen, yet on the other hand the developers need to be ready for the possibility that they won't. Even if these farms are not the energy solution that Hawai'i is looking for, Sen. English proclaimed that, "It's a great starting point, but the zone of possible agreement is far higher than the first offer."

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BILLS INTRODUCED BY SENATOR ENGLISH MOVING THROUGH THE 2011 LEGISLATURE

SB 816 Testimony Apportions ten per cent of the conveyance tax to the Kaho'olawe rehabilitation trust fund.

Status

SB 817 Places Molokini island under the jurisdiction of the Kahoolawe island reserve commission.

Testimony

Status

SB 819, SD1

Testimony

Authorizes the department of transportation to establish a vehicle miles traveled pilot program to evaluate the use of a vehicle miles traveled user fee.

Status

SB 823

Provides procurement authority to semi-autonomous county public transit agencies.

Testimony Status

SB 824, SD1

Testimony

Makes null any portion of a motor carrier transportation services contract that requires the carrier to indemnify the other party from any liability.

Status SB 825, SD1

Testimony

Status

Allows repeat intoxicated drivers to install ignition interlock devices in any vehicle they operate.

SB 828, SD1

Testimony

Status

Requires helmet use when operating or riding motorcycles, bicycles, motor scooters, mopeds, and all-terrain vehicles.

SB 831

Testimony

Status

Establishes a new markets tax credit for a taxpayer that holds a qualified equity investment on a credit allowance date.

SB 1130

Testimony

Status

Requires that all letterheads, documents, symbols, and emblems of the State include both state languages.

SB 1457

Testimony

Status

SB 1458

Testimony

Authorizes the successor to a small estate to close the estate through a petition process.

Status

Creates three classes of medical marijuana licenses: 1) for the sale of medical marijuana to qualified patients; 2) cultivation of medical marijuana; and 3) marijuana-infused products manufacturing.

SB 1460

Establishes a civil violation of not more than \$100 for possession of one ounce or less of marijuana.
