I. BACKGROUND & SUMMARY

1. Background

Kama'aina Kids, Hawaii's Enrichment & Education Professionals, is a private, nonprofit 501c(3), multi-service organization dedicated to serving our island communities. We believe that by providing a variety of educational, recreational and enrichment experiences, children and youth develop a sense of self, their community and their environment. As one of the largest child care organizations in Hawaii, we serve over 10,000 children daily on Oahu, the Big Island, Kauai, and Maui from 6 weeks to 17 years old, employing nearly 1,000 positions.

Kama'aina Kids was awarded management of He'eia State Park, located on the Windward side of Oahu. This opportunity has afforded us the ability to continue our mission statement on a broader scale and to also service communities and visitors in a direct fashion by providing facilities and educational programs unique to He'eia and its location.

<u>Mission Statement</u>

"To serve children and their families by providing ongoing quality education and enrichment programs teaching a sense of self, community and earth."

2. Goals and Objectives

This Grant Request will go towards the design, permits and fees associated with the construction of a He'eia Community Learning Center (hereinafter referred to as the "Center") located at the entrance of He'eia State Park formerly occupied by the He'eia Pavilion. Our goal is to create a gathering place for the communities in order to facilitate educational and cultural learning programs and to establish a foundation of support. Specific uses of this building will include:

- Opportunity to allow new and growing community groups to use the facility to support their programs, mission and events
- Provide an interpretive learning center highlighting cultural significance of Heeia State Park focusing on He'eia State Park's Master Plan in "...recognizing and (to) perpetuate the natural and cultural heritage of the site known as, Lae O Ke Alohi and its surroundings, and serve the entire community as a social, educational and cultural gathering place".
- Provide a variety of community based training programs such as First Aid, CPR, ocean recreation management, and safe boating to name a few that would be available to the general public and organizational groups
- Office space that will be used by the community and organizations to foster the development of their goals related to the promotion of educational and cultural values

It was originally intended that the Pavilion be renovated and converted into a community center however recent events resulting from a 90 foot tree (see **ATTACHMENT C**) falling onto the roof of the building and having it condemned has escalated these efforts. The Pavilion was used regularly by various

groups and the public which has now been taken away from them. Costs associated with these objectives include demolition of existing structure, design and construction of building, purchase and installation of equipment and furnishings for the Center which will also have a kitchen in addition to bathroom and shower facilities. This grant will make it possible to complete these objectives in a reasonable amount of time and to immediately begin benefitting the communities and the organizations that support them.

3. Public Purpose and Need To Serve

In essence we further highlight He'eia Community Learning Center Mission Purpose

- bring together people and resources from a neighborhood or community to strengthen bonds and a sense of community for positive change
- gathering place with interactive learning stations, classrooms, meeting rooms, sleeping facilities a kitchen, bathrooms and showers for community groups to teach, support and perpetuate Hawaiian culture.
- location for school field trips to learn firsthand on-site about He'eia and its surrounding environment and the importance of its cultural place in Hawaii's history
- creates a sense of belonging that not only enhances individual and collective purpose but also strengthens our mental, emotional and spiritual well being
- provides a forum for the awareness and education of social life impacts, culture, nature, family values and childcare
- embrace the values unique to He'eia promoting environmental education, marine exploration, coastal ecosystems and ethnobotony programs for Hawaii's children.

Specific targeted audiences based on purpose and need also include:

- 1. Community Center: After operating the He'eia State Park for the last 3 years we have become very familiar with the needs of community support groups in the area. We have hosted 1st birthday luaus, church services, graduation parties, community training, First Aid & CPR training, ongoing education seminars, public events, and many more. This is also an opportunity to "give back" to the community and allow for interest groups to use the facility for a nominal fee. Kama'aina Kids is well known and understand the needs of these communities. A facility to continue these traditions and gatherings will meet the needs of the Windward community in addition to state-wide organizations. The Windward district are accustomed to utilizing He'eia State Park for their various community and family functions and this will broaden their opportunities.
- 2. <u>Training Center:</u> We have partnered with community groups and organizations including Nature Conservancy, Eagle Scouts, Paepae o He'eia Fishpond, Marimed Foundation, Spirit of America, Division of Conservation and Resource Enforcement (DOCARE), Hui o Ko'olaupoko Watershed Restoration, Keiki o kai Aina and The Puakea Foundation that would be able to utilize the facility. Other organizations will also be able to utilize the facilities based on availability. Kama'aina Kids will also sponsor programs at the Center related to He'eia State Park's educational aspects of the environment and culture unique to He'eia in sponsorship with other organizations.
- 3. Office Space: The 2nd floor of the building will be used to provide an area for community service programs such as DOCARE, Nature Conservancy, Park Security and other programs that require office space and accommodations.

4. Target Population

Target audiences include organizational groups and members that promote the educational and/or cultural learning aspects of Hawaii and for community sponsored trainings such as literacy instruction, creative lesson planning, and community organizations to provide a gathering place to support their mission out in the public. Specific organizations that already intend to use the facilities include Nature Conservancy, Eagle Scouts, Paepae o He'eia Fishpond, Keiki o kai Aina, Marimed Foundation, Spirit of America, DOCARE, Hui o Ko'olaupoko Watershed Restoration and The Puakea Foundation who also serve the community and/or the general public. Kama'aina Kids will also sponsor programs and service announcements oriented towards keiki grades K-8 related to ocean safety and recreational use, environmental education, marine exploration, coastal ecosystems and ethnobotony.

5. Geographic Coverage

The physical address of the facility and grounds is He'eia State Park 46-465 Kamehameha Hwy, Kaneohe Hawaii 96744; located in the Windward district of Oahu. Primarily serving the Windward community, the Center will also be used to accommodate the general public through our community service programs such as CPR & First Aid Training and facility rental for community organizations statewide.

II. SERVICE SUMMARY AND OUTCOMES

1. Scope of Work, Tasks and Responsibilities

This Grant Request will help provide supplemental funds to cover anticipated fees and taxes associated with the construction for the building of the Center which will include 2-story training facility, a community meeting center, office space, kitchen, showers and bathrooms.

The scope of work will consist of the following tasks:

- contracting vendors and assessment of property
- demolition of the existing structure (the pavilion)
- site assessment for building
- design phase
- construction
- acquisition of furniture and fixtures

Total known costs at this time associated with this effort amounts to \$6.82 million. Estimate of building dimensions amount to 12,000 square feet @ \$400/square feet with \$100k estimated for furnishings and equipment. Project will be managed by President & CEO Ray Sanborn, who will serve as project manager and who will be managing the office staff of both He'eia State Park and Kama'aina Kids for various operational efforts including financial planning, maintenance, marketing, quality assessment and health and safety issues.


