A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that capital improvement
- 2 projects cover a wide range of projects in the State, including
- 3 the construction of new facilities and improvements. Currently,
 - agencies that submit a proposal for a capital improvement
- 5 project are not required to include an estimate of operational
- 6 costs relating to the maintenance and continued operation of a
- 7 facility or project. However, operational costs are often
- 8 significant and can even be greater than the cost of development
- 9 and construction.
- 10 The legislature finds that if agencies submit an estimate
- 11 of operational costs for capital improvement projects, the
- 12 legislature, prior to approving projects, would have a clearer
- 13 view of the total cost of the project as opposed to the cost of
- 14 only planning and construction. This knowledge will permit the
- 15 State to make more fiscally sound decisions and better
- 16 prioritize spending on capital improvement projects.

1 The purpose of this Act is to require that agencies include 2 estimated operational costs in their capital improvement project 3 cost estimates. SECTION 2. Section 37-43, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "[f]\$37-43[f] Capital improvement project allotment 7 process. The department of budget and finance shall carry out 8 the capital improvement project allotment process, which shall 9 consist of reviewing, prioritizing, and evaluating capital 10 improvement project appropriation proposals submitted by state 11 and county agencies to [assure] ensure conformity with statewide 12 planning goals and objectives and executive priorities, and 13 report its findings and recommendations and an estimate of the 14 operational costs for each proposed capital improvement project 15 to the governor in order that [such] the proposals may be 16 considered for possible inclusion in the executive capital 17 improvement project budget that is to be presented to the 18 legislature. The department shall also review, analyze, and 19 report on state and county capital improvement project 20 appropriation proposals that extend over wide geographical areas 21 of the State and that have significant impacts upon economic

- 1 development, land use, environmental quality, construction
- 2 employment, and executive policy directions.
- 3 SECTION 3. Section 37-68, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended to read as follows:
- 5 "§37-68 Responsibilities of agencies. Under [such] rules
- 6 as may be prescribed by the director of finance with the
- 7 approval of the governor:
- $\dot{\dot{c}}$ [Every] Each agency assigned the task of developing (1)9 programs and preparing program and financial plans, 10 budgetary requests, and program performance reports Ĺ shall develop [such] the programs and prepare [such] the plans, requests, and reports and submit the same 12 13 to the director of finance at [such] times, on [such] 14 forms, and in [such] a manner as the director may 15 prescribe. For informational purposes, the University of Hawaii shall submit its program and financial 16 17 plans, budgetary requests, and program performance reports to the legislature at the same time the 18 university submits them to the director of finance. 19 Where new programs are being proposed, [every] each 20 21 agency shall demonstrate that the program:

1		(A)	Is an appropriate function of state government;
2			and, as applicable
3		(B)	Can be implemented by the public sector as cost-
4			effectively as the private sector while meeting
5			the same plans, goals, objectives, standards,
6			measures of effectiveness, wage, salary,
7			conditions of employment, and employee benefit
8			programs of the State;
9	(2)	[Eve:	ry] <u>Each</u> agency administering state programs and
10		[eve	ry] <u>each</u> agency responsible for the formulation of
11		prog	rams and the preparation of program and financial
12		plan	s, budgetary requests, and program performance
13		repo	rts, shall furnish the department of budget and
14		fina	nce all [such] documents and information as the
15		depa	rtment may from time to time require. Each agency
16		shal.	l make available all documents and information, as
17		may	oe requested, to the legislature and any member or
18		comm	ittee of either house of the legislature[, all

(3) The director of finance or any employee of the department of budget and finance, when duly authorized, for the purpose of securing information,

documents and information as may be requested; and];

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1		shall have access to and may examine any books,
2		documents, papers, or records of any agency[-]; and
3	(4)	Each agency submitting a capital improvement project
4		proposal shall furnish the department of budget and
5		finance with an estimate of operational costs for the
6		proposed capital improvement project and all documents
7		that support the estimate of operational costs. Each
8		agency shall make available all documents and related
9		information, as may be requested, to the legislature
10		and any member or committee of either house."
11	SECT	ION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
