RELATING TO TANNING ACT 205 (14)

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TANNING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many physicians and
- 2 scientists now warm that the health risks associated with
- 3 suntaining are greater when tanning with artificial ultraviolet
- 4 light. Specifically, those health risks include but are not
- 5 limited to sunburn, premature aging, skin cancer, retinal
- 6 damage, formation of cataracts, suppression of the immune
- 7 system, and damage to the vascular system.
- 8 The legislature further finds that certain medications,
- 9 cosmetics, and foods are "photosensitizing," which means that in
- 10 some people, they react unfavorably with ultraviolet light to
- 11 produce skin rashes or burns, and sunlamps and other artificial
- 12 sources of ultraviolet light are known to intensify these
- 13 effects. In light of this, the legislature further finds that
- 14 it is necessary to protect and promote the public health,
- 15 safety, and welfare concerning tanning with artificial
- 16 ultraviolet light, especially where minors are concerned.

1	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make it unlawful							
2	for tanning facilities and operators to allow the use of tanning							
3	beds by anyone under the age of eighteen.							
4	SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is							
5	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated							
6	and to read as follows:							
7	"§321- Tanning facilities; minors; penalties. (a) It							
8	shall be unlawful for any tanning facility owner, lessee, or							
9	operator to allow any person under the age of eighteen to use							
10	any tanning equipment.							
11	(b) A tanning facility owner, lessee, or operator shall							
12	post in a conspicuous place in each tanning facility that the							
13	individual owns, leases, or operates in this State, a notice							
14	developed by the director of health addressing the following:							
15	(1) That it is unlawful for a tanning facility owner,							
16	lessee, or operator to allow a person under the age of							
17	eighteen to use any tanning equipment;							
18	(2) That any tanning facility owner, lessee, or operator							
19	violating this section shall be subject to a fine;

1	(3)	That any individual may report a violation of this						
2		section to the individual's local law enforcement						
3		agency; and						
4	(4)	The health risks associated with tanning.						
5	<u>(c)</u>	The director of health may impose on a person who						
6	violates this section:							
7	<u>(1)</u>	For a first violation, a fine not to exceed \$250; and						
8	(2)	For each subsequent violation, a fine not to exceed						
9		\$500.						
10	(d)	This section shall not apply to any physician duly						
11	licensed to practice medicine who uses, in the practice of							
12	medicine,	medical diagnostic and therapeutic equipment that						
13	emits ult	raviolet radiation or to any person who owns tanning						
14	equipment	exclusively for personal, noncommercial use.						
15	(e)	The director of health may adopt rules in accordance						
16	with chapt	ter 91 to implement this section.						
17	<u>(f)</u>	As used in this section:						
18	"Ope:	cator" means a person designated by the tanning						
19	facility o	owner or tanning equipment lessee to operate or assist						
20	and instru	act in the operation and use of the tanning facility or						
21	tanning equipment.

1	"Tanning	equipment"	means	any	device	that	emits

- 2 electromagnetic radiation with wavelengths in the air between
- 3 200 and 400 nanometers used for tanning of the skin, including
- 4 but not limited to sunlamps, tanning booths, or tanning beds.
- 5 "Tanning facility" means any location, place, area,
- 6 structure, or business that provides persons access to any
- 7 tanning equipment, including tanning salons, health clubs, gyms,
- 8 apartments, condominiums, and hotels, regardless of whether a
- 9 fee is charged for access to the tanning equipment."
- 10 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 11 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 12 begun before its effective date.
- 13 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014.
