

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY POVERTY REDUCTION TASK FORCE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	TON 1. Findings and purpose. (a) The legislature
2	finds tha	t:
3	(1)	It is in the public interest to improve access to
4		economic and educational opportunities to help
5	• • •	families achieve self-sufficiency and financial
6		security while reducing the number of Hawaii residents
7		living in poverty;
8	(2)	Poverty has social and economic costs for children and
9		families, communities, and the State. Children living
10		in poverty often experience lower academic achievement
11		and increased health and behavioral problems. These
12		problems often continue into adulthood, resulting in
13		greater social and economic costs to society,
14		including increased crime rates, health problems, and
15		negative economic impacts estimated to cost
16		\$500,000,000,000 nationally in lost earnings each
17		year;

1	(3)	More and more middle-class Hawaii families living from
2		paycheck to paycheck, especially in these very
3		difficult economic times; and

- (4) More states are recognizing that reducing poverty by addressing the needs of low- and moderate-income families is a critical economic development issue.

  Reducing poverty requires strategic, integrated, and comprehensive approaches that create opportunities for families to achieve economic success, including creating quality jobs, providing work support, promoting greater collaboration with the private sector, and implementing targeted tax policies.
- (b) The purpose of this Act is to:
- (1) Create a task force to assess current policies and practices, along with evidence-based solutions, used in other states, that promote economic opportunity and poverty reduction; and
- (2) Develop a strategic, integrated, and comprehensive plan to expand economic opportunities in Hawaii to reduce, by at least fifty per cent by 2021, the number of Hawaii residents, including children and families, living in poverty.



- 1 SECTION 2. Definitions. As used in this Act, unless the
- 2 context clearly requires otherwise:
- 3 "Federal poverty level" means the poverty guidelines
- 4 updated periodically in the Federal Register by the United
- 5 States Department of Health and Human Services under the
- 6 authority of title 42 United States Code section 9902(2).
- 7 "Poverty" means living at or below one hundred per cent of
- 8 the federal poverty level.
- 9 "Self-sufficiency standard" means a measure of the income
- 10 needed by a family of a given composition in a given place to
- 11 adequately meet its basic needs without public or private
- 12 assistance.
- "Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" means the
- 14 federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program created in
- 15 title 7 United States Code section 2011 et seq.
- 16 "Task force" means the economic opportunity poverty
- 17 reduction task force.
- 18 SECTION 3. Economic opportunity poverty reduction task
- 19 force; established; subcommittees; duties. (a) There is
- 20 established, within the office of the governor for
- 21 administrative purposes, the economic opportunity poverty
- 22 reduction task force to assess current state practices that



1	promote e	conomic opportunity and poverty reduction and to
2	develop a	strategic, integrated, and comprehensive plan to
3	expand eco	onomic opportunities in Hawaii to reduce, by at least
4	fifty per	cent by 2023, the number of Hawaii residents,
5	including	children and families, living in poverty.
6	(b)	The task force shall consist of five members as
7	follows:	
8	(1)	One member of the house of representatives appointed
9		by the speaker of the house of representatives;
10	(2)	One member of the senate appointed by the president of
11		the senate;
12	(3)	One member appointed by the governor;
13	(4)	One member of a community organization with expertise
14		in poverty reduction or asset building appointed by
15		the speaker of the house of representatives from a
16		list of three organizations submitted by the majority
17		leader of the house of representatives; and
18	(5)	One member of a community organization with expertise
19		in poverty reduction or asset building appointed by
20		the president of the senate from a list of three
21		organizations submitted by the majority leader of the



senate.

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1		(c)	The	memb	pers	shall	select	one	of	its	members	to	serve
2	as	chairpe	ersor	ı of	the	task	force.						

- 3 (d) Initial appointments to the task force shall be made4 by August 1, 2013.
- 5 (e) The members of the task force shall serve without
- 6 compensation and shall not be reimbursed for any expenses
- 7 incurred in the performance of their duties.
- 8 (f) The task force shall meet at least four times and
- 9 additionally as convened by the chairperson.
- 10 (g) The task force may appoint subcommittees to advise the
- 11 task force in completing its duties. The chairperson shall
- 12 select subcommittee members from stakeholder groups that shall
- 13 include relevant executive branch agencies, the counties,
- 14 business and labor organizations, educational organizations,
- 15 advocates, and individuals directly affected by the work of the
- 16 task force. The chairperson of the task force shall appoint a
- 17 member of the task force to chair each subcommittee.
- 18 (h) The task force shall:
- (1) Assess current state policies and practices that
- 20 promote economic opportunity and poverty reduction
- and, before December 22, 2014, shall develop a
- 22 strategic, integrated, and comprehensive plan that



1		will	expand economic opportunities in Hawaii and, by
2		2021	, reduce by at least fifty per cent the number of
3		Hawa	ii residents, including children and families,
4		livi	ng in poverty;
5	(2)	Stud	y and evaluate best policies and practices that:
6		(A)	Build family assets and financial stability;
7		(B)	Increase preschool through postsecondary
8			educational opportunities;
9		(C)	Expand the work force with quality jobs that meet
10			private sector needs;
11		(D)	Make work pay through the use of fair and
12			sustainable targeted tax policies; and
13		(E)	Address work-support issues;
14	(3)	Stud	y and evaluate:
15		(A)	Federally-supported and state-supported programs
16			that serve persons living in poverty;
17		(B)	The economic impact of poverty;
18		(C)	Current policies and services that affect persons
19			living below the self-sufficiency standard;
20		(D)	The interaction of various issues that affect
21			poverty, such as a lack of education, health

1		care, housing, income, child care, and food	
2		security; and	
3		(E) The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program,	
4		with the goal of recommending changes to increa	ase
5		participation and secure additional federal fur	nds
6		for assistance with education and training; and	d
7	(4)	Prepare an initial and final report to be submitted	to
8		the legislature on December 22, 2013, and on December	er
9		22, 2014, respectively, that includes:	
10		(A) An outline of the issues reviewed by the task	
11		force and the proposed time frame for addressing	ng
12		identified issues;	
13	·	B) A general description of the scope of the probl	lem
14		in Hawaii with respect to poverty;	
15		C) In the initial report, an assessment of current	С
16		policies and procedures that address poverty;	
17		D) A summary of the work accomplished by the task	
18		force over the prior year; and	
19		E) Any legislative recommendations as the task for	rce
20		deems necessary.	
21	(i)	The task force shall terminate on December 22, 2014.
