H.B. NO. 174

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness 2 3 continues to be one of the State's most significant and 4 challenging social problems. The legislature further finds that 5 according to a recent report, fourteen thousand two hundred homeless individuals were served through shelter and outreach 6 programs in fiscal year 2011. Of these individuals, nine 7 thousand seven hundred eighty-one resided in the city and county 8 of Honolulu. The legislature also finds that homeless service 9 providers estimate that six thousand homeless people in the 10 11 State need shelter each night.

12 The legislature additionally finds that homelessness is a 13 complex issue that requires continuous resources and coordinated 14 efforts at all levels. The legislature also finds that homeless 15 persons face a myriad of issues, including mental illness, 16 substance abuse, loss of employment and income, and lack of 17 affordable housing. Appropriate funding for programs and 18 services tailored to address these issues is essential. 2013-0465 HB SMA-1.doc

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The purpose of this part is to better assist individuals
 facing or experiencing homelessness by funding various homeless
 and housing programs.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 6 7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the homeless programs office of the 8 department of human services to assist homeless and at-risk 9 homeless individuals and families with housing placement, 10 11 health, education, employment, and other support services. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 12 of human services for the purposes of this part. 13 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 15 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and 16 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 17 year 2014-2015 for the rental housing trust fund. 18

19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
20 housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of
21 this part.

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1	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general					
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so					
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and					
4	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal					
5	year 2014-2015 for substance abuse treatment and mental health					
6	support services for individuals who are homeless or at risk of					
7	becoming homeless.					
8	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department					
9	of health for the purposes of this part.					
10	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general					
11	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so					
12	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and					
13	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal					
14	year 2014-2015 for clean and sober housing support services to					
15	be administered by the alcohol and drug abuse division of the					
16	department of health.					
17	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department					
18	of health for the purposes of this part.					
19	PART II					
20	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general					
21	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much					
22	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the					
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same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 1 2014-2015 for a rental assistance program, also known as a 2 shallow subsidy program, for homeless working individuals or 3 4 families who are ready to rent permanent housing to obtain and 5 maintain permanent housing; provided that the subsidies shall be 6 available via participation in workforce development programs or 7 other programs that provide support to workers to increase selfsufficiency; provided further that the maximum subsidy shall be 8 \$300 per month after households pay a minimum of forty per cent 9 of their adjusted income for rent. 10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii 11 public housing authority for the purposes of this part. 12 PART III 13

14 SECTION 7. The legislature finds that housing first 15 programs are a collaborative effort between the department of 16 human services and the United States Department of Housing and 17 Urban Development that provides housing and support services for 18 chronically homeless individuals, including those who have an 19 addiction or mental illness, or both. The principles of housing 20 first programs include:

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1	(1)	Moving chronically homeless individuals into housing	
2		directly from streets and the shelters without a	
3		precondition of accepting or complying with treatment;	
4	(2)	Providing robust support services for program	
5		participants that are predicated on assertive	
6		engagement rather than coercion;	
7	(3)	Granting chronically homeless individuals priority as	
8		program participants in housing first programs;	
9	(4)	Embracing a harm-reduction approach to addictions	
10		rather than mandating abstinence while supporting	
11		program participant commitments to recovery; and	
12	(5)	Providing program participants with leases and tenant	
13		protections as provided by law.	
14	The	housing first programs in the State closely resemble	
15	the requirements of the United States Housing and Urban		
16	Development shelter plus care program and the Veterans		
17	Administration veteran's assisted supportive housing voucher		
18	program for homeless veterans. In its December 2011 report to		
19	the legislature pursuant to section 346-378, Hawaii Revised		
20	Statutes, the department of human services reported that the		
21	State has six hundred fifty-eight permanent housing placements		

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plus support services through the shelter plus care and 1 2 veteran's assisted supportive housing voucher programs. The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to the 3 4 department of human services to support the State's housing 5 first programs in assisting Hawaii's chronically homeless who are often the most vulnerable, most visible, and most difficult 6 7 to serve. 8 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the 10 11 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 12 2014-2015 to be deposited to the credit of the housing first special fund under section 346-377, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for 13 the department of human services to continue to administer 14 housing first programs for chronically homeless individuals in 15 16 the State. 17 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department of human services for the purposes of this part. 18 19 PART IV 20 SECTION 9. The legislature finds that the purpose of the 21 United States Housing and Urban Development's homelessness 22 prevention and rapid re-housing program was to provide 2013-0465 HB SMA-1.doc

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1 economically distressed households and individuals with
2 financial and other assistance to prevent them from becoming
3 homeless and help those who are experiencing homelessness to be
4 quickly re-housed and stabilized. The funds under this program
5 were intended to target individuals and families who would be
6 homeless but for this assistance.

The department of human services administered the 7 homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing program to provide 8 homeless prevention and housing assistance to all eligible 9 individuals and households who apply through contracted 10 organizations. The funds from the program provided for a 11 12 variety of assistance, including short-term or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation, and stabilization 13 services, such as mediation, security or utility deposits, 14 utility payments, moving cost assistance, and case management. 15 16 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to the department of human services to once again provide homelessness 17

18 prevention and rapid re-housing assistance to all eligible

19 individuals and households.

20 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much 22 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the 2013-0465 HB SMA-1.doc

same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 1 2014-2015 for the homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing 2 3 program. 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 5 of human services for the purposes of this part. PART V 6 There is appropriated out of the rental SECTION 11. 7 housing trust fund established in section 201H-202, Hawaii 8 Revised Statutes, the sum of \$30,000,000 or so much thereof as 9 may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the same sum or 10 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 11 for uses specified in section 201H-202, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 12 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii 13 housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of 14 this part. 15 PART VI 16 SECTION 12. The shelter plus care program of the United 17 States Department of Housing and Urban Development provides 18 rental assistance in connection with supportive services. The 19 20 program provides a variety of permanent housing choices, 21 accompanied by a range of supportive services funded through 22 other sources. The program assists hard-to-serve homeless 2013-0465 HB SMA-1.doc

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individuals with disabilities and their families. These
 individuals primarily include those with serious mental illness,
 chronic problems with alcohol and drugs, and HIV, AIDS, or
 related diseases.

There are four components to the shelter plus care program: 5 single room occupancy component - moderate rehabilitation for 6 single-room occupancy dwellings; sponsor-based rental assistance 7 component; project-based rental assistance component; and 8 tenant-based rental assistance component. Under all components, 9 supportive services must be available to meet the needs of 10 participants. Similar to many other federal programs, the 11 shelter plus care program has a match requirement. Applicants 12 must match the aggregate amount of shelter plus care rental 13 assistance with supportive services. This ensures that 14 appropriate and timely services will be available to meet the 15 needs of individual participants. 16

17 The purpose of this part is to provide matching funds for18 the shelter plus care program.

19 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$400,000 or so much 21 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the 22 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year

Report Title: Homelessness; Housing; Appropriation

Description:

Appropriates unspecified funds to the homeless programs office of the department of human services and the rental housing trust fund. Appropriates unspecified funds to the department of health for substance abuse treatment, mental health support services, and clean and sober housing services, and to the department of human services for matching funds for shelter plus care grants. Appropriates funds for a rental assistance program, also known as a shallow subsidy program. Appropriates funds to the Hawaii public housing authority to continue to administer housing first programs for chronically homeless individuals and to reestablish the homeless prevention and rapid re-housing program. Appropriates funds out of the rental housing trust fund. Appropriates matching funds for the federal shelter plus care program to provide rental assistance in connection with supportive services.
