A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE FIFTIETH REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that beaches are unique 2 assets of the State created by the natural process of erosion and accretion. Accreted beach land, in the form of coastal 3 4 dunes and dry beach area, is an integral portion of the beach This land holds the fragile carbonate sands that the 5 system. active beach relies upon during periods of episodic erosion. 6 These same lands will once again transition back into active 7 beach area as the shoreline migrates and sea-level rises. 8

9 As the shoreline migrates, so too does the conservation district boundary, where all submerged lands are zoned as 10 resource subzone. The accreted lands, originally within the 11 conservation district, will not only return to the conservation 12 district with subsequent erosion, but also will have a 13 significant impact on the function and health of the beach 14 15 resource to be conserved and protected within the existing 16 conservation district boundaries.

1	Proper management, achieved through appropriate shoreline
2	setbacks within which construction is prohibited, will:
3	(1) Help to protect development from coastal hazards;
4	(2) Conserve and protect Hawaii's beaches;
5	(3) Preserve recreational uses of coastal resources; and
6	(4) Minimize future impacts to the coastal ecosystem.
7	With long-term sea level rise, and without necessary coastal
8	management planning, these issues will reach crisis proportions.
9	The legislature also finds that recent events at Kuhio
10	Beach in Waikiki, Sunset Beach on Oahu's North Shore, and Kailua
11	Beach by the boat ramp, illustrate the catastrophic result of
12	inadequate coastal management planning: rising sea levels and
13	beach erosion on our coastlines. To remedy this situation and
14	to effect more appropriate laws and policies to protect Hawaii's
15	beaches, a study to update our beach erosion data is essential.
16	The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for a beach
17	erosion study for the island of Oahu.
18	SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the beach
19	restoration special fund the sum of \$100,000 or so much thereof
20	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014–2015 to subsidize a
21	beach erosion study, that includes the shoreline areas within
22	the fiftieth representative district.
