A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO YOUTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the United
- 2 States, more than one-fourth of the children, or fifteen
- 3 million, are left alone and unsupervised after school. Thirty
- 4 per cent, or nearly four million, of middle school students are
- 5 left unsupervised until their parents return home from work.
- 6 The legislature further finds that juvenile violence peaks
- 7 in the after-school hours on school days and in the evenings on
- 8 nonschool days. Sixty-three per cent of violent crimes
- 9 committed by juveniles occur on school days, while nearly one-
- 10 fifth of all juvenile violent crimes occur between the hours of
- 11 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. During fiscal year 2013, the police
- 12 made over three thousand arrests of juveniles between the ages
- 13 of twelve and fourteen in Hawaii.
- 14 The legislature finds that according to the superintendent
- 15 of education's annual report of 2011, Hawaii's dropout rate has
- 16 reached over sixteen per cent, with a graduation rate of only
- 17 around eighty per cent. Nearly half of the high school dropouts
- 18 reported that they started high school ill-prepared.

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- 1 The legislature further finds that research indicates that
- 2 each disconnected youth costs the taxpayers nearly \$14,000 per
- 3 year, which can continue and even increase in the future as some
- 4 disenfranchised youth become part of the juvenile justice
- 5 system. The stakes of youth disengagement are high. Once
- 6 students are disconnected, recruitment, enrollment, and
- 7 retention programs require stronger and more persistent
- 8 outreach, more intensive services, and more long-term
- 9 participation.
- 10 Middle and intermediate school years are a pivotal time for
- 11 our keiki, a time when they can succumb to peer pressure and
- 12 significantly derail their education and futures. Accordingly,
- 13 participation in high-quality after-school programs can lead to
- 14 improved school attendance, better behavior, and better academic
- 15 performance. Keeping our keiki engaged in positive after-school
- 16 activities will help to keep them on the path toward graduation
- 17 and productive futures.
- 18 Currently, there are approximately thirty-nine thousand
- 19 middle and intermediate public school students in Hawaii.
- 20 Approximately half of the roughly fifty-one middle and
- 21 intermediate schools in the State receive some federal or state

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- 1 funding for after-school programing; however, funding is
- 2 inconsistent or unreliable.
- 3 The legislature finds that in March 2013, the lieutenant
- 4 governor established the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 5 culture, and health initiative to develop a standardized
- 6 framework and funding for after-school programs for public
- 7 middle and intermediate school students throughout the State.
- 8 The establishment of a state-subsidized after-school program for
- 9 middle and intermediate public school students is important to
- 10 the future of our keiki and the welfare of our State as a whole.
- 11 The legislature further finds that the office of youth
- 12 services, within the department of human services, provides
- 13 comprehensive front end services and programs for youth to
- 14 prevent delinquency and reduce the incidence of recidivism. The
- 15 office is dedicated to creating opportunities for youth to
- 16 develop competencies that foster resiliency and enable them to
- 17 achieve a successful transition to young adulthood. The
- 18 legislature determines that the objectives of the resources for
- 19 enrichment, athletics, culture, and health initiative are wholly
- 20 aligned with those of the office of youth services.
- 21 The purpose of this Act is to:

1	(1)	Statutorily establish the resources for enrichment,
2		athletics, culture, and health program within the
3		office of youth services to provide a standardized
4		framework for operations and provide funding for
5		after-school programs in public middle and
6		intermediate schools;
7	(2)	Establish a special fund to receive fees and other
8		moneys to help meet the costs of administering and
9		operating the program;
10	(3)	Appropriate funds for establishing the resources for
11		enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program to
12		provide funding for after-school programs in middle
13		and intermediate public schools; and
14	(4)	Establish one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position
15		to support the program and appropriate funds for that
16		position.
17	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended b	y adding three new sections to be appropriately
19	designate	d and to read as follows:
20	" <u>§35</u>	2D-A Resources for enrichment, athletics, culture, and
21	health pr	ogram; established. There is established the resources

1	for enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program within
2	the office.
3	§352D-B Resources for enrichment, athletics, culture, and
4	health program; powers and duties of the office. (a) The
5	office shall provide funding to establish, support, or enhance
6	after-school programs in public middle and intermediate schools
7	The office may enter into contracts with middle and intermediate
8	schools, individuals, organizations, or other entities to
9	provide after-school programs to public middle and intermediate
10	schools.
11	(b) The office shall:
12	(1) Establish criteria and application, selection, and
13	award processes for funding after-school programs;
14	(2) Monitor the after-school programs within each school;
15	(3) Conduct site evaluations for schools with after-schoo
16	programs funded under the resources for enrichment,
17	athletics, culture, and health program; and
18	(4) Ensure each after-school program meets contractual
19	expectations.
20	(c) The office may establish participation fees and other
21	charges to be assessed to each student for the cost of
22	administering and operating the program. The revenues shall be

- 4 §352D-C Resources for enrichment, athletics, culture, and
- 5 health program special fund. (a) There is established the
- 6 resources for enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program
- 7 special fund to be administered by the office.
- 8 (b) The special fund shall consist of:
- 9 (1) Fees collected by the office for administering and
- operating the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 11 culture, and health program, and for the provision of
- 12 program services;
- 13 (2) Legislative appropriations;
- 14 (3) All interest earned on the deposit or investment of
- moneys in the special fund; and
- 16 (4) Any other moneys made available to the special fund
- from any other sources.
- (c) Moneys in the resources for enrichment, athletics,
- 19 culture, and health program special fund shall be used to
- 20 supplement the costs of administering and operating after-school
- 21 programs in middle and intermediate public schools. The office
- 22 may also use the moneys to:

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1	(1)	Hire personnel to implement, operate, and oversee				
2		after-school programs;				
3	(2)	Promote after-school program activities;				
4	<u>(3)</u>	Conduct after-school education and demonstration				
5		projects;				
6	(4)	Contract for services for after-school programs; and				
7	(5)	Fund associated expenses for after-school programs."				
8	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general					
9	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so					
10	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 to be					
11	deposited into the resources for enrichment, athletics, culture,					
12	and health program special fund.					
13	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the resources for				
14	enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program special fund					
15	the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary					
16	for fiscal year 2014-2015 to carry out the purpose of this Act,					
17	including the establishment and operation of the resources for					
18	enrichment, athletics, culture, and health program and hiring of					
19	one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position for the office of					
20	youth services.					
21	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of					
22	human serv	vices for the purposes of this Act.				

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- 1 SECTION 5. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 3 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 4 the new sections in this Act.
- 5 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
