A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness
3	continues to be one of the State's most significant and
4	challenging social problems. The legislature further finds that
5	according to a recent report, fourteen thousand two hundred
6	homeless individuals were served through shelter and outreach
7	programs in fiscal year 2011. Of these individuals, nine
8	thousand seven hundred eighty-one resided in the city and county
9	of Honolulu. The legislature also finds that homeless service
10	providers estimate that six thousand homeless people in the
11	State need shelter each night.
12	The legislature additionally finds that homelessness is a
13	complex issue that requires continuous resources and coordinated
14	efforts at all levels. The legislature also finds that homeless
15	persons face a myriad of issues, including mental illness,
16	substance abuse, loss of employment and income, and a lack of
17	affordable housing. Appropriate funding for programs and
18	services tailored to address these issues is essential.
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- 1 The purpose of this part is to better assist individuals
- 2 facing or experiencing homelessness by funding various homeless
- 3 and housing programs.
- 4 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
- 7 substance abuse treatment and mental health support services for
- 8 individuals who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 health for the purposes of this part.
- 11 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
- 14 clean and sober housing support services to be administered by
- 15 the alcohol and drug abuse division of the department of health.
- 16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 17 health for the purposes of this part.
- 18 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for a
- 21 rental assistance program, also known as a shallow subsidy
- 22 program, for homeless working individuals and their families who

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- permanent housing; provided that:
- 3 (1) The maximum subsidy shall be \$300 per month; provided
- 4 that in order to qualify for the subsidy, a household
- 5 shall pay a minimum of forty per cent of its adjusted
- **6** gross income for rent; and
- 7 (2) A household's adjusted gross income shall be
- 8 calculated in the same manner as calculated by the
- 9 United States Department of Housing and Urban
- 10 Development.
- 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii public
- 12 housing authority for the purposes of this part.

13 PART II

- 14 SECTION 5. The legislature finds that housing first
- 15 programs are a collaborative effort between the department of
- 16 human services and the United States Department of Housing and
- 17 Urban Development that provides housing and support services for
- 18 chronically homeless individuals, including those who have an
- 19 addiction or mental illness, or both. The principles of housing
- 20 first programs include:

1	(1)	Moving enrolledity homeless individuals into housing		
2		directly from streets and the shelters without a		
3		precondition of accepting or complying with treatment;		
4	(2)	Providing robust support services for program		
5		participants that are predicated on assertive		
6		engagement rather than coercion;		
7	(3)	Granting chronically homeless individuals priority as		
8		program participants in housing first programs;		
9	(4)	Embracing a harm-reduction approach to addictions		
10		rather than mandating abstinence while supporting		
11		program participant commitments to recovery; and		
12	(5)	Providing program participants with leases and tenant		
13		protections as provided by law.		
14	The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to the			
15	department of human services to support the State's housing			
16	first programs in assisting Hawaii's chronically homeless who			
17	are often the most vulnerable, most visible, and most difficult			
18	to serve.			
19	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general			
20	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
21	much ther	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 to be		
22	deposited	to the credit of the housing first special fund		
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- 1 established under section 346-377, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for
- 2 the department of human services to continue to administer
- 3 housing first programs for chronically homeless individuals in
- 4 the State.
- 5 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the housing first
- 6 special fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be
- 7 necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the department of human
- 8 services to continue to administer housing first programs for
- 9 chronically homeless individuals in the State.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 11 human services for the purposes of this part.
- 12 PART III
- 13 SECTION 8. The legislature finds that the purpose of the
- 14 United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's
- 15 homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing program is to
- 16 provide economically distressed households and individuals with
- 17 financial and other assistance to prevent them from becoming
- 18 homeless and help those who are experiencing homelessness to be
- 19 quickly re-housed and stabilized. The funds under this program
- 20 are intended to target individuals and families who would be
- 21 homeless but for this assistance.

1	The department of human services administers the
2	homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing program to provide
3	homeless prevention and housing assistance to all eligible
4	individuals and households who apply through contracted
5	organizations. The funds from the program provide for a variety
6	of assistance, including short-term or medium-term rental
7	assistance and housing relocation, and stabilization services,
8	such as mediation, security or utility deposits, utility
9	payments, moving cost assistance, and case management.
10	The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to the
11	department of human services to provide homelessness prevention
12	and rapid re-housing assistance to all eligible individuals and
13	households.
14	SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
15	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
16	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
17	the homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing program.
18	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
19	human services for the purposes of this part.
20	PART IV

21 SECTION 10. The continuum of care permanent supportive

22 housing programs funded by the United States Department of

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1 Housing and Urban Development provide rental assistance in 2 connection with supportive services. The programs provide a 3 variety of permanent housing choices, accompanied by a range of 4 supportive services funded through other sources. The programs 5 assist hard-to-serve homeless individuals with disabilities and 6 their families. These individuals primarily include those with serious mental illness, chronic problems with alcohol and drugs, 7 8 and HIV, AIDS, or related diseases. 9 There are four components to the continuum of care **10** permanent supportive housing programs: single room occupancy 11 component - moderate rehabilitation for single-room occupancy 12 dwellings; sponsor-based rental assistance component; project-13 based rental assistance component; and tenant-based rental 14 assistance component. Under all components, supportive services 15 must be available to meet the needs of participants. Similar to 16 many other federal programs, continuum of care permanent 17 supportive housing programs have a match requirement. 18 Applicants must match the aggregate amount of continuum of care 19 rental assistance with supportive services. This ensures that

appropriate and timely services will be available to meet the

needs of individual participants.

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The purpose of this part is to provide matching funds for 1 2 the continuum of care permanent supportive housing programs of 3 the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 5 or so 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for 7 matching funds for the continuum of care permanent supportive 8 housing programs of the United States Department of Housing and 9 Urban Development. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 10 11 human services for the purposes of this part. 12 PART V SECTION 12. The legislature finds that homelessness 13 14 continues to be one of the State's most significant and challenging social problems. The number of homeless persons in 15 the State, estimated to be approximately six thousand on any 16 given day, is indicative of the limited shelter space available. 17 The legislature further finds that new and innovative 18 19 solutions are needed to address the homelessness crisis. 20 Oregon, for example, has adopted laws that authorize political

subdivisions to allow religious institutions to offer overnight

camping space for homeless persons living in vehicles.



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- 1 Similarly, Santa Barbara, California, has instituted a program
- 2 that allows private organizations to use county-owned parking
- 3 lots to provide overnight sleeping space for homeless persons
- 4 with vehicles.
- 5 Act 222, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, established a
- 6 homeless assistance working to group to work within each local
- 7 neighborhood in each county to identify, plan, and implement
- 8 housing options for homeless persons in each local community
- 9 that reflect shared responsibility for addressing homelessness
- 10 in Hawaii.
- 11 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the
- 12 purchase and construction of housing solutions related to the
- 13 homeless assistance working group's findings and
- 14 recommendations.
- 15 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
- 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 17 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
- 18 the purchase and construction of innovative housing solutions
- 19 for homeless persons as they relate to the working group's
- 20 findings and recommendations; provided that:

1	(1) The purchase and construction of innovative housing
2	solutions pursuant to this section shall not be
3	subject to chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and
4	(2) The housing created pursuant to this section shall be
5	ready for use and fully occupied by December 1, 2014.
6	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii
7	housing finance and development corporation for the purposes of
8	this part.
9	PART VI
10	SECTION 14. Act 222, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, section
11	16, is amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as
12	follows:
13	"(a) There is established [within the department of human
14	services] a homeless assistance working group. The purpose of
15	the working group shall be to:
16	(1) Work within each local neighborhood in each county to
17	identify various private and public properties whose
18	owners are interested in partnering with the local
19	neighborhood and government to provide land or
20	structures that can be used to provide temporary home:
21	for homeless persons, including people who are living
22	in their motor vehicles;

1	(2)	Coordinate with the State's homeless programs office		
2		and continuum of care providers to match homeless		
3		persons in every community with appropriate care and		
4		housing;		
5	(3)	Work with non-profit organizations, businesses, and		
6		government agencies that may be willing to offer their		
7		property for homeless persons living in their motor		
8		vehicles and coordinate voluntary participation and		
9		support to homeless persons;		
10	(4)	Create, develop, and support the housing options		
11		within each local community; and		
12	(5)	Communicate and coordinate with the Hawaii interagency		
13		council on homelessness on meeting their goals.		
14	(b)	[The director of human services, or a designee,] The		
15	chairpers	ons of the senate and house of representatives		
16	committee	s on human services shall convene the working group and		
17	invite the following as members:			
18	(1)	Representatives of homeless service providers;		
19	(2)	Representatives of community and volunteer service		
20		organizations, which may include:		
21		(A) Community associations;		
22		(B) Neighborhood boards; and		

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1	•	(C) Faith-based organizations;
2	(3)	Representatives of property owners who are interested
3		in partnering with the State to provide land, homes,
4		or buildings that can be used to provide homes for
5		homeless persons;
6	(4)	Representatives of the homeless community who are
7		currently experiencing or formerly experienced
8		homelessness;
9	(5)	Representatives of environmental organizations;
10	(6)	Representatives of the architecture, engineering,
11		development, and building industry;
12	(7)	Representatives of other businesses, including
13		realtors and financial institutions;
14	(8)	Representatives of labor unions;
15	(9)	Representatives of legal services;
16	(10)	Representatives of the technology community;
17	(11)	Various federal, state, and county and city
18		representatives, including the chair of the Hawaii
19		interagency council on homelessness and homeless
20		programs office administrator;
21	(12)	Interested federal, state, county, and city elected
22		officials; and

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- 1 (13) Others interested in supporting homeless assistance.
- 2 The members of the working group shall designate a chair from
- 3 among themselves and serve without compensation."
- 4 PART VII
- 5 SECTION 15. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 16. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
