# H.B. NO. 1937

#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Prior to the establishment of the Hawaii health 2 systems corporation, the State's community hospitals system was 3 a division of the department of health. Rapid changes in the 4 health industry and impending implementation of national and 5 local health care reform prompted legislative action to 6 permanently allow the community hospitals system to gain greater 7 control over operations to compete and remain viable. In 1996, 8 the Hawaii health systems corporation was created to provide 9 improved health care for all persons in the State, including 10 those served by small rural facilities by coordinating and 11 overseeing statewide health policy and services.

12 Today, the Hawaii health systems corporation is the fourth 13 largest public health system in the United States, the largest 14 provider of health care on every island except Oahu and Molokai, 15 and the only acute care provider on Lanai and Maui. The 16 corporation is also the safety net for neighbor island acute 17 care and for long-term care in the State.



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1 Ongoing financial challenges faced by the Hawaii health 2 systems corporation are a risk to the public health care 3 services provided by the corporation. Under current conditions, 4 the Hawaii health systems corporation continues to face 5 financial challenges, including budget shortfalls, increased 6 operational and capital improvement costs, declining government 7 and third-party payer subsidies, and inadequate reimbursements, 8 among other challenges.

9 Structural reform to the Hawaii health systems corporation 10 provides an opportunity to improve the delivery of health care services and resources in the community. Eliminating the 11 12 corporation board and the centralized authority of the Hawaii 13 health systems corporation, and instead establishing regional 14 health care systems, each to be headed by a regional system 15 board, will give the regional health care systems administrative 16 and operational autonomy. Establishing autonomous regional 17 health care systems will also streamline government operations 18 and allocate greater resources directly to the respective 19 regional health care systems for the provision of public health **20** · care services.

However, such an undertaking is complex. It requires wellcoordinated and careful planning to provide a seamless



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1 transition to ensure continuity of health care services in the 2 community and to maintain the viability of the State's health 3 care delivery system.

Many of the issues to be considered in the transition are finance- and budget-related. Other considerations are the impact on the types of health services offered statewide, the additional responsibilities and greater roles that will be absorbed by the regional system boards, and the status of employees in the new structure.

10 The purpose of this Act is to ensure continuity of health 11 care services to the community and maintain the viability of the 12 health care delivery system in the State by requiring the 13 governor to establish a task force to develop an organizational 14 and functional plan that:

15 (1)Eliminates the corporation board and the centralized authority of the Hawaii health systems corporation; 16 17 Establishes autonomous regional health care systems, (2)18 each to be headed by a regional system board; and 19 Gives the regional system boards complete (3) administrative and operational oversight over their 20 21 respective regional health care systems.

18		descriptions for employees of the State's public	
19		health care system;	
20	(4)	Develop an organizational structure for the regional	
21		health care systems and their boards;	



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1	(5)	Prepare proposed budgets for each of the regional		
2		health care systems; and		
3	(6)	Attend to other administrative details necessary to		
4		complete the transition.		
5	(c)	The task force shall consist of representatives of the		
6	departments of health, budget and finance, human resources			
7	development, accounting and general services, and attorney			
8	general; the chairperson of the Hawaii health systems			
9	corporation; the respective chairs of the current regional			
10	health care system boards; the designated collective bargaining			
11	representatives of current employees of the Hawaii health			
12	systems corporation; representatives of the hospital industry;			
13	representatives of insurers and health maintenance			
14	organizations; and community members from each county.			
15	(d)	The task force shall submit the organizational and		
16	functional plan, including any proposed legislation necessary to			
17	implement	the transition from the Hawaii health systems		
18	corporation structure to a regional health care systems			
19	structure, to the legislature no later than thirty days prior to			
20	the convening of the regular session of 2015 as part of the			
21	biennial executive budget request.			



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1	(e)	Then completion of the exceptional and functional	
I	(e)	Upon completion of the organizational and functional	
2	plan, the	governor shall appoint a management team to develop	
3	transition	plans, finalize position descriptions and revise	
4	personnel	classifications, establish a personnel records system,	
5	develop ac	counting and fiscal controls, and attend to other	
6	administrative details so that by January 1, 2016:		
7	(1)	The transition from the Hawaii health systems	
8		corporation structure to a regional health care	
9		systems structure is complete; and	
10	(2)	The transfer of functions of the Hawaii health systems	
11		corporation to the respective regional health care	
12		systems and all other actions necessary in the	
13		transfer are complete.	
14	(f)	Members of the task force shall not be considered	
15	employees	of the State for purposes of chapter 84, Hawaii	
16	Revised Statutes, based solely upon their participation on the		
17	task force.		
18	(g)	The task force shall be exempt from the requirements	
19	of chapter	92, Hawaii Revised Statutes.	
20	SECTI	ON 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
21	revenues o	f the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much	



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1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the

2 purposes of this Act.

3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the4 governor for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
6 provided that section 3 shall take effect on July 1, 2014.
