A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LAND USE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART 1
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a serious
3	lack of coordinated effort among the State, the city and county
4	of Honolulu, and the Honolulu authority for rapid transportation
5	for state and city planning purposes. The result is an
6	inability to adequately plan ahead for transit-oriented
7	development around train stations. This Act is a starting point
8	for an integrated approach to coordination and planning.
9	However, to facilitate a plan for transit-oriented development
10	the legislature also finds that it is more efficient and
11	expedient to use the transit-oriented development programs under
12	the department of planning and permitting as a starting point
13	rather than developing a series of memorandums of agreement.
14	PART II
15	SECTION 2. The legislature finds that the State owns
16	significant amounts of land around the proposed rail transit
17	stations in Honolulu. It is important that these surrounding

- 1 lands are analyzed for the impact that the transit stations will
- 2 have on the various communities.
- 3 The purpose of this part is to require all state agencies
- 4 within one-half mile of proposed rail transit stations to enter
- 5 into a memorandum of understanding with each other and convene
- 6 working groups together with the Honolulu authority for rapid
- 7 transportation to address the effects that each rail transit
- 8 station will have on the surrounding workforce and housing.
- 9 SECTION 3. (a) All state agencies owning properties or
- 10 facilities within one-half mile of each proposed rail transit
- 11 station shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with each
- 12 other to determine how each respective transit station will help
- 13 address the State's population growth by meeting the demand for
- 14 workforce housing and to assess the respective transit station's
- 15 contribution to transit ridership; provided that the memorandum
- 16 of understanding does not replace or conflict with any
- 17 regulatory function.
- (b) Each memorandum of understanding shall require the
- 19 convening of a working group that includes a representative of
- 20 the Honolulu authority for rapid transportation and any
- 21 appropriate state agencies.

1	(c) The state agency owning the most land around the	
2	proposed rail transit station shall designate a representativ	е
3	to serve as the initial chairperson and coordinator of the	٠,
4	working group.	
5	(d) No later than twenty days prior to the convening of	
6	each regular session, each working group shall submit an annu	al
7	report to the legislature including but not limited to the	
8	following:	
9	(1) How the rail transit station will help address the	
10	State's population growth by meeting workforce hous	ing
11	demand and contributing to transit ridership; and	
12	(2) How the transit station will help emerging industri	es
13	create economic growth opportunities to:	
14	(A) Diversify the economy; and	
15	(B) Achieve the goals of establishing a "second ci	ty"
16	outside of central Honolulu.	
17	(e) Each working group shall be dissolved upon completi	on
18	of the rail transit project.	
19	(f) For the purposes of this part, "proposed rail trans	it
20	station" means a station at one of the following proposed

Honolulu rail transit locations:

East Kapolei;

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University of Hawaii, West Oahu; 1 (2) 2 (3) Leeward community college; 3 (4) Aloha stadium; 4 (5) Honolulu International Airport; 5 (6) Lagoon drive; 6 (7) Kalihi; and 7 (8) Kapalama. PART III 8 9 SECTION 4. The legislature finds that the careful 10 coordination between transit and development is critical in allowing each to optimally enhance the other. Transit-oriented 11 12 development presents an opportunity not only for a project at a station, but for a full-fledged transit-centered community. A 13 14 transit corridor that offers an advantageous mix of uses can be 15 used to integrate a number of separate activity nodes, 16 particularly when the various uses are close together, are easily accessible, and support each other. 17 18 The purpose of this part is to establish a transit-oriented 19 development advisory committee to make recommendations about

sustainable development projects close to transit.

5	(a) Ther	e is established a transit-oriented development
6	advisory	committee within the department of business, economic
7	developme	nt, and tourism for administrative purposes. The
8	advisory	committee shall comprise fifteen members as follows:
9	(1)	Three members shall be planners, to be appointed, one
10		each, by the mayor of the city and county of Honolulu,
11		Honolulu authority for rapid transportation, and
12		<pre>governor;</pre>
13	(2)	Three members shall be architects, to be appointed,
14		one each, by the mayor of the city and county of
15		Honolulu, Honolulu authority for rapid transportation,
16		and governor;
17	(3)	Three members shall be individuals living within a
18		three-mile radius of a transit-oriented development
19		zone, to be appointed, one each, by the mayor of the
20		city and county of Honolulu, Honolulu authority for
21		rapid transportation, and governor;

1	(4)	Three members shall be cultural advisors, to be
2		appointed, one each, by the mayor of the city and
3		county of Honolulu, Honolulu authority for rapid
4		transportation, and governor; and
5	(5)	Three members shall be employees, one each, of the
6		city and county of Honolulu, Honolulu authority for
7		rapid transportation, and State, to be appointed by
8		the mayor of the city and county of Honolulu, Honolulu
9		authority for rapid transportation, and governor,
10		respectively.
11	(b)	The members of the advisory committee shall designate
12	a chairpe	rson from among its members.
13	(c)	The purpose of the advisory committee shall be to
14	advise an	d assist the legislature and state agencies in:
15	(1)	Creating vibrant communities through public and
16		private partnerships, and investments and incentives
17		for key development projects located near transit; and
18	(2)	Providing support for alternative forms of
19		transportation, such as walking and biking.
20	<u>(d)</u>	The advisory committee's advice and assistance shall
21	include b	ut not be limited to:
22	(1)	Development and construction of a project that:
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1		(A)	Locates a transit stop at the center of a
2			neighborhood;
3		<u>(B)</u>	Creates an activity center;
4		(C)	Reflects the character of the surrounding
5			community;
6		(D)	Includes engaging public spaces;
7		<u>(E)</u>	Promotes pedestrian connections; and
8		<u>(F)</u>	Facilitates a round-the-clock activity;
9	(2)	Cons	ideration of economic industry, commercial, and
10		reta	il components within the project;
11	(3)	Cons	ideration of an economic analysis for the project;
12	(4)	Cons	ideration of the land use and zoning requirements,
13		as t	hey relate to infrastructure and capacity, and
14		whet	her they are consistent with the county's transit-

16	(5)	Iden	tification of similar development plans, such as

6		(A) The proximity of transit to the project;
7		(B) The quality of pedestrian connectivity to
8		transit; and
9		(C) Whether the planned densities are sufficient to
10		support transit;
11	(8)	Preservation and expansion of workforce housing around
12		transit to accommodate housing for:
13		(A) Individuals;
14		(B) Single families; and
15		(C) Senior citizens and persons who are aging in
16		place; and
17	(9)	Identification and application of partnerships to
18		provide opportunities for mutual expectations and
19		shared risk and costs in which:
20		(A) The public sector may provide:
21		(i) Resolution to land use and zoning issues;
22		(ii) Site development;

1		(iii) Entitlement processes; and
2		(iv) Financial resources for land and
3		infrastructure costs; and
4		(B) The private sector may provide experience and
5		financial resources.
6	<u>(e)</u>	Members of the advisory committee shall:
7	(1)	Serve for a term of four years; provided that any
8		vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee
9		shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired
10		term in the same manner as the original appointments;
11	(2)	Receive no compensation but shall be reimbursed for
12		necessary expenses, including travel expenses,
13		incurred in the performance of their duties as members
14		of the committee; and
15	(3)	Be subject to chapter 84.
16	<u>(f)</u>	The advisory committee shall convene for quarterly
17	meetings	in the city and county of Honolulu; provided that any
18	member wh	o is not a state resident may attend a meeting by
19	teleconfe	rence.
20	(g)	The advisory committee shall submit an annual report
21	on its ac	tivities to:
22	(1)	The legislature and office of the governor;
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1	(2) The Honolulu city council and the office of the mayor
2	of the city and county of Honolulu; and
3	(3) The board of directors of the Honolulu authority for
4	rapid transportation.
5	(h) For the purposes of this section, "transit-oriented
6	development zone" means the parcels of land around a rapid
7	transit station. Generally, the transit-oriented development
8	zone shall include the parcels of land where any portion is
9	within one mile of the transit station; provided that the
10	advisory committee may include or exclude any parcel from the
11	transit-oriented development zone either upon its own initiation
12	or upon request."

14	SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
15	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
