A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that twenty-seven states have laws on ticket scalping. These laws vary from complete 2 bans on ticket scalping, capping the profit that ticket scalpers 3 4 can earn; restricting the time, place, and manner of ticket 5 scalping; and regulating scalpers through licensing and other 6 requirements. Twenty other states do not regulate ticket scaling at the state level and leave the regulation of ticket 7 8 scalping up to the counties. However, the legislature further finds that Hawaii only prohibits ticket scalping at boxing and 9 mixed martial arts events. 10 The legislature additionally finds that when events sell 11 out, a secondary market of profiteers, known as scalpers, begins 12 to profit from the scarcity of tickets, much to the dismay of 13 potential buyers who were unable to acquire tickets through 14 primary channels. The resale of tickets far in excess of the 15 tickets' face value hurts all parties connected with a promotion 16

except the scalper. The use of illicit computer software, known

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- 1 as bots, to electronically circumvent the ticket buying process
- 2 also impedes the public's fair access to ticket sales.
- 3 The legislature therefore concludes that state regulation
- 4 of ticket sales practices and ticket scalping will benefit
- 5 Hawaii consumers.
- 6 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 7 (1) Prohibit the sale of tickets to an exhibition, game,
- 8 concert, and other events at prices greater than the
- 9 sum of the price printed on the ticket, any lawful
- 10 taxes collected, and any reasonable charge for
- 11 services;
- 12 (2) Specify that no ticket sales for events in Hawaii
- shall commence before 8:00 a.m. Hawaii standard time
- 14 or before the primary ticket seller commences ticket
- sales:
- 16 (3) Specify requirements for tickets sold or offered for
- sale through an internet website;
- 18 (4) Establish requirements for disclosures relating to
- 19 fees and taxes and number of available tickets;
- 20 (5) Establish remedies for violations of event ticket
- 21 sales practices and ticket scalping; and

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- 1 (6) Make the circumvention of online ticket purchases 2 through the use of illicit computer software a 3 misdemeanor. 4 SECTION 2. Chapter 481B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 6 to read as follows: 7 . EVENT TICKET SALES PRACTICES AND TICKET SCALPING "PART 8 §481B-A Definitions. As used in this part, unless the 9 context requires otherwise: 10 "Primary ticket seller" means an owner or operator of a 11 venue or sports team, manager or provider of an event, event 12 promoter, a provider of ticketing services or an agent of such owner, operator, manager or provider, that engages in the 13 14 primary sale of tickets for an event or retains the authority to otherwise distribute tickets. 15 §481B-B Ticket sales; price limitations; website sales 16 requirements. (a) Subject to subsection (b), no person shall 17 18 sell or offer for sale any ticket of admission or any other 19 evidence of a right of entry to an exhibition, game, contest, 20 athletic competition, concert, performance, or any other event, 21 at a price greater than the sum of:
 - (1) The price printed on the ticket;

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1	(2)	Any tax that the seller may lawfully collect on the
2		price printed on the ticket; and
3	(3)	Any reasonable charge for services actually rendered
4		and directly relating to the cost of selling or
5		offering to sell the ticket, which charge shall not
6		exceed four hundred per cent of the price printed on
7		the ticket.
8	(b)	Notwithstanding subsection (d)(1), no ticket sales for
9	an event	in Hawaii shall commence before 8:00 a.m. Hawaii
10	standard	time or before the primary ticket seller commences
11	ticket sa	ales.
12	(c)	If the ticket is sold or offered for sale through an
13	internet	website by a person other than a primary ticket seller,
14	the webs:	ite operator shall:
15	(1)	Guarantee a full refund of the amount paid for the
16		ticket, and any applicable servicing, handling, or
17		processing fees, if:
18		(A) The ticketed event is canceled;
19		(B) The purchaser is denied admission to the ticketed
20		event, unless such denial is due to the action or
21		omission of the purchaser; or

1		(C) The ticket is not delivered to the purchaser in
2		time for the purchaser to attend the event; and
3	(2)	Disclose that it is not the reseller of tickets and
4		that the price of the ticket listed on that website
5		may be higher than the ticket's original value.
6	(d)	There shall be no violation of this section if:
7	(1)	The person selling the ticket is the primary ticket
8		seller; or
9	(2)	The ticket is for an event taking place outside of the
10		State.
11	(e)	Each violation of this section shall be subject to the
12	remedies	provided in section 481B-D; provided that each sale or
13	offer for	sale shall constitute a separate violation.
14	§ 4 81	B-C Disclosures, fees and taxes, available tickets.
15	(a) A pr	imary ticket seller shall disclose all applicable taxes
16	and fees	that may be assessed on a ticket sale on the same web
17	page or p	hysical display that lists the price of the ticket.
18	(b)	A primary ticket seller shall disclose the total
19	number of	tickets available in a ticket sale on a publicly
20	available	website or at the venue box office.
21	§481	B-D Remedies. (a) Any violation of this part shall
22	constitut	e unfair methods of competition and unfair and

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- 1 deceptive acts or practices in the conduct of any trade or
- 2 commerce under section 480-2.
- 3 (b) Any agreement entered into by a consumer for the
- 4 purchase of a ticket that waives, limits, or disclaims any of
- 5 the rights set forth in this part shall be void as contrary to
- 6 public policy.
- 7 (c) No agreement to arbitrate any dispute arising from the
- 8 purchase or sale of a ticket subject to this part shall be
- 9 enforceable against any consumer.
- 10 (d) A penalty issued pursuant to subsection (a) is in
- 11 addition to remedies otherwise available against the same
- 12 conduct under the common law or other statutes of this State.
- 13 §481B-E Ticket brokers; fees; cancellation. (a) No
- 14 ticket broker shall charge a fee for the use of a credit card to
- 15 purchase tickets without first disclosing that a fee will be
- 16 charged.
- 17 (b) A ticket broker shall refund any and all service fees
- 18 charged for the purchase of a ticket when the public exhibition,
- 19 game, contest, or performance for which the ticket was purchased
- 20 is canceled.
- 21 (c) For the purposes of this section, "ticket broker"
- 22 means any person whose primary business purpose is selling or

- 1 reselling tickets of admission or any other evidence of right of
- 2 entry to a theater, place of amusement or entertainment, or
- 3 other place where public exhibitions, games, contests, or
- 4 performances are held."
- 5 SECTION 3. Chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended by adding a new section to part IX to be appropriately
- 7 designated and to read as follows:
- 8 "§708- Circumvention of online ticket purchase
- 9 processes. (a) No person shall use computer software to
- 10 circumvent a security measure, access control system, or other
- 11 control or measure on a ticket seller's website that is used to
- 12 ensure an equitable process for purchasing tickets.
- 13 (b) A person found in violation of this section shall be
- 14 guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (c) For purposes of this section, "ticket" means any
- 16 ticket of admission or any other evidence of a right of entry to
- 17 an exhibition, game, contest, athletic competition, concert,
- 18 performance, or any other event taking place in the State."
- 19 SECTION 4. Section 440-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended to read as follows:
- 21 "S440-17 Admission tickets. All tickets of admission to
- 22 any boxing contest for which admission fees are charged and

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- received shall have printed clearly upon the face thereof the 1
- purchase price of same, and no ticket shall be sold [for more 2
- 3 than the price as printed thereon.] in a manner that violates
- section 481B-B." 4
- 5 SECTION 5. Section 440E-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 "[+]§440E-13[+] Admission tickets. All tickets of
- admission to any mixed martial arts contest for which admission 8
- 9 fees are charged and received shall have printed clearly upon
- 10 the face thereof the purchase price of same, and no ticket shall
- 11 be sold for more than the [price as printed thereon.] amount
- 12 allowed under section 481B-B."
- SECTION 6. Section 481B-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13
- 14 repealed.
- ["[\$481B-15] Ticket brokers; fees; cancellation. (a) No 15
- 16 ticket broker shall charge a fee for the use of a credit card to
- 17 purchase tickets without first disclosing that a fee will be
- 18 charged.
- (b) A ticket broker shall refund any and all service fees 19
- 20 charged for the purchase of a ticket when the public exhibition,
- 21 game, contest, or performance for which the ticket was purchased
- 22 is canceled.

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- 1 (c) For the purposes of this section, "ticket broker"
 2 means any person engaged in the business of selling tickets of
 3 admission or any other evidence of right of entry to a theater,
 4 place of amusement or entertainment, or other place where public
 5 exhibitions, games, contests, or performances are held, at a
 6 price greater than the price printed on the ticket."]
- 7 SECTION 7. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 8 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 9 begun before its effective date.
- 10 SECTION 8. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 11 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 12 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 13 the new sections in this Act.
- 14 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 16 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2112.

Report Title:

Event Ticket Sales Practices; Ticket Scalping; Price Limitations; Website Sales Requirements; Disclosures; Remedies; Unfair and Deceptive Practices; Circumvention of Online Ticket Purchase Processes

Description:

Prohibits the sale of tickets to an exhibition, game, concert, and other events at prices greater than the sum of the price printed on the ticket, any lawful taxes collected, and any reasonable charge for services. Specifies that no ticket sales for events in Hawaii shall commence before 8:00 a.m. Hawaii standard time or before the primary ticket seller commences ticket sales. Specifies requirements for tickets sold or offered for sale through an internet website. Establishes requirements for disclosures relating to fees and taxes and number of available tickets. Establishes remedies. Makes the circumvention of online ticket purchases through the use of illicit computer software a misdemeanor. Effective July 1, 2112. (SD1)

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
