
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEMORIALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The freedom and security that United States
2 citizens enjoy today are direct results of the sacrifices and
3 continued vigilance of the United States armed forces over the
4 course of our nation's history. The sacrifices of the members
5 of the United States armed forces have preserved the liberties
6 that have made this nation unique in the world community.

7 While members of the United States armed forces have
8 engaged in numerous conflicts worldwide for over two centuries,
9 more recent combat missions have included the Persian Gulf War,
10 from August 2, 1990, to February 28, 1991, which culminated in
11 the liberation of Kuwait from Iraq; the air-and-land conflict
12 known as Operation Desert Storm, which began on January 17,
13 1991, and lasted through April 11, 1991; Operation Iraqi
14 Freedom, which was a military campaign that was led by United
15 States troops and conducted from March 20, 2003, through August
16 31, 2010, and later re-named "Operation New Dawn"; and Operation
17 Enduring Freedom, more commonly known as the "War in
18 Afghanistan", which is an ongoing effort. Members of the United



1 States armed forces have also served a pivotal role in the
2 Global War on Terrorism, Homeland Defense, and Operation Noble
3 Eagle and continue to protect our borders by land, sea, and air.

4 Recognition of the sacrifices of members of the United
5 States armed services who served in the various conflicts in
6 which the United States was involved, many of whom paid the
7 ultimate sacrifice, can be found throughout the State. Two of
8 the most prominent of these memorials are the USS Arizona
9 Memorial and the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific at
10 Punchbowl. However, a number of additional memorials exist
11 commemorating the sacrifices of the men and women in uniform
12 from Hawaii who have served this country, including the Korean
13 and Vietnam War Memorials on the grounds of the state capitol,
14 which were dedicated in 1994. Thus, it is both fitting and
15 necessary for the State to give tangible and visible recognition
16 for the sacrifices and contributions of veterans from Hawaii who
17 served in the Persian Gulf War, Operation Desert Storm,
18 Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation
19 New Dawn, the Global War on Terrorism, Homeland Defense, and
20 Operation Noble Eagle and who have protected our borders by
21 land, sea, and air.



1 Recognizing the need for such a memorial, the legislature
2 passed Senate Bill No. 551, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, enacted as
3 Act 139, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, which required the office
4 of veterans' services, with the assistance of the department of
5 accounting and general services, the department of defense, and
6 the state historic preservation division, to develop a plan to
7 establish a memorial honoring the veterans of the Persian Gulf
8 War, Operation Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation
9 Enduring Freedom, Operation New Dawn, the Global War on
10 Terrorism, Homeland Defense, and Operation Noble Eagle and those
11 who have protected our borders by land, sea, and air.

12 In response to Act 139, the office of veterans' services
13 created the Hawaii gulf war memorial task force to develop a
14 plan to establish a Hawaii Gulf War Memorial. The task force
15 held multiple monthly meetings, conducted surveys, and held a
16 public hearing on the matter. In its report to the legislature,
17 the task force stated that, based upon its findings and
18 research, the ideal spot for the memorial would be on the
19 grounds of the Hawaii State Veterans Cemetery in Kaneohe on the
20 island of Oahu. The task force also recommended that replicas
21 of the memorial be located at state veterans' cemeteries
22 statewide.



1 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize the
2 issuance of general obligation bonds and appropriate funds for
3 the planning, design, and construction of the Hawaii Gulf War
4 Memorial and replicas of the Hawaii Gulf War Memorial.

5 SECTION 2. The director of finance is authorized to issue
6 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$ or so much
7 thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof
8 as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2014-2015
9 for the purpose of planning, design, and construction of the
10 Hawaii Gulf War Memorial on the grounds of the Hawaii state
11 veterans cemetery in Kaneohe, on the island of Oahu, and for the
12 planning, design, and construction of replicas of the Hawaii
13 Gulf War Memorial to be located on the grounds of state
14 veterans' cemeteries statewide.

15 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
16 veterans' services, in consultation with the department of
17 accounting and general services, for the purposes of this Act.

18 SECTION 3. The appropriation made for the capital
19 improvement project authorized by this Act shall not lapse at
20 the end of the fiscal biennium for which the appropriation is
21 made; provided that all moneys from the appropriation
22 unencumbered as of June 30, 2016, shall lapse as of that date.



1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Hawaii Gulf War Memorial; Construction; Appropriation; GO Bonds

Description:
