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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMS FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the United
States, more than one-fourth of school-age children are left
alone and unsupervised during after-school hours. The majority
of these children are elementary and intermediate school
students, who are at a time in life when various types of
temptations surround them.

7 The legislature further finds that to counter such problems at the elementary school level in Hawaii, the afterschool plus 8 (A+) program was created in 1990 to provide an avenue to keep 9 elementary school students in a safe and nurturing environment --10 11 from the time the school day ends until the time that these 12 children are picked up by their families. Moreover, the 13 legislature finds that the A+ program has been operating successfully for the past decade, with more than eighteen 14 15 thousand elementary school students enrolled in A+ programs in more than one hundred eighty elementary schools statewide. 16 17 Approximately two-thirds of A+ program sites are managed by

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independent contractors, such as the YMCA and Kamaaina Kids, and
one-third are managed by department of education personnel.

3 The legislature further finds that for the past decade, an 4 evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-education program called "Fun 5" has been operating successfully in nearly 5 6 all of these locations as an integral part of the A+ program. 7 The Fun 5 program provides training for all A+ program group 8 leaders (i.e., those who work directly with the children), 9 supplies manuals and playground equipment, and provides hands-on 10 instruction for physically active games and nutritional 11 enlightenment.

12 In addition, the legislature finds that the Fun 5 program, 13 which for many of its participants is the only organized 14 physical activity that they experience in a day, has shown positive results in boosting the children's level of physical 15 16 activity, reducing their rate of obesity, and increasing their 17 consumption of fruits and vegetables. These achievements are 18 accomplished through a hands-on and enjoyable program that promotes five servings of fruits and vegetables per day and at 19 20 least thirty minutes of active physical exercise five days per 21 week.

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1 The legislature further finds that the kind of physical and 2 nutritional activities that exist in this evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-education program are and 3 4 should be an integral part of the A+ program. However, since 5 the establishment of the Fun 5 program a decade ago, nearly all 6 funding for this program has come from private donations, a situation which has become significantly more difficult to 7 8 maintain and which has substantially diminished the potential 9 impact of the program.

10 The legislature further finds that the overall cost of 11 operating the Fun 5 program averages approximately \$1 per child per month, which covers the training activities and equipment 12 replenishment requirements for after-school activities--but not 13 the data collection necessary to sustain the program. Given the 14 vital importance of physical activity and healthy eating to 15 optimal childhood development and obesity prevention, the 16 legislature believes that it is essential that funding for an 17 18 evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-education program be institutionalized within the budget of the A+ program 19 itself. 20

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1	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish an
2	evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-education pilot
3	program within the A+ program.
4	SECTION 2. (a) There is established within the department
5	of education's after-school plus program, hereinafter the A+
6	program, an evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-
7	education pilot program. The pilot program shall provide
8	regular physical exercise and nutritional education in a manner
9	that promotes active participation as an integral part of the A+
10	program and that meets the State's goals for a healthy diet and
11	adequate exercise. The pilot program shall be for five years,
12	ending on June 30, 2019.
13	(b) Any funding for the pilot program shall be included
14	within the A+ program budget and shall include funding for:
15	(1) Support for training of all A+ program coordinators
16	and group leaders;
17	(2) Necessary playground equipment and nutritional tools;
18	(3) Collection of data for the pilot program; and
19	(4) Periodic evaluation of the effectiveness of the pilot
20	program.
21	(c) The organization and management of training, data
22	collection and management, and equipment replenishment for the
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pilot program shall be carried out by an independently-1 2 contracted private entity, under the supervision of the 3 department of education. 4 The department of education may establish within the (d) 5 A+ program participation fees in an amount sufficient to 6 maintain the pilot program in all elementary schools operated by the department of education. 7 8 The private entity independently contracted pursuant (e) 9 to subsection (c), in conjunction with the department of 10 education, may seek funds from other public and private sources to supplement the costs of managing, expanding, and improving 11 12 the pilot program. 13 (f) The department of education may adopt rules pursuant 14 to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to implement this 15 section. 16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 17 or so 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for 19 an evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-education 20 pilot program within the after-school plus program of the 21 department of education for the purposes of this Act.

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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 1 2 education for the purposes of this Act. 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 4 or so 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the payment of after-school plus program fees, including those 6 for an evidence-based physical-activity and nutritional-7 education pilot program, for the children of families who are 8 9 eligible for the temporary assistance for needy families 10 program. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 11 12 human services for the purposes of this Act.

13 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
