A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MARIJUANA FOR EXPORT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the interest of
- 2 economic development and enhancing revenue for public purposes,
- 3 the cultivation of marijuana in Hawaii for export to foreign
- 4 jurisdictions should be legalized and profits from those
- 5 cultivation and export activities should be taxed.
- 6 Commercial cultivation and distribution of marijuana are
- 7 not legal in Hawaii, but the State could still reap great
- 8 economic benefit from allowing its cultivation for export to
- 9 other jurisdictions where a commercial market is allowed.
- 10 Hawaii is well situated to provide an abundant supply to fill a
- 11 growing demand. The rich Hawaiian soils, coupled with a
- 12 continually temperate climate, provide ideal conditions for
- 13 year-round outdoor farming. These advantages should be
- 14 capitalized upon for the benefit of enhancing revenue for the
- 15 State.
- 16 Profits from the cultivation of marijuana for export can be
- 17 taxed similarly to alcohol, and the revenues used to provide
- 18 much needed funding for education, health care, and human



- 1 services programs. The tax revenues can be divided between four
- 2 important entities: the department of education, to fund
- 3 mandatory pre-school; the department of health, for care of the
- 4 elderly and disabled, specifically for increased payments for
- 5 care home and foster home operators; Hawaii public housing
- 6 authority, for the construction of more state-owned public
- 7 housing; and the Hawaii housing finance and development
- 8 corporation for the construction of affordable housing.
- 9 A surprisingly large number of associated products are now
- 10 being produced from marijuana and sold on the commercial market,
- 11 such as cannabis-infused chocolate, ice cream, beverages,
- 12 capsules, bath soaks, and muscle relief lotions. Taxing revenue
- 13 from the production and sale of marijuana and marijuana-
- 14 associated products to foreign countries that have legalized its
- 15 use presents the potential for a very large revenue stream that
- 16 would provide economic relief for agencies which are currently
- 17 underfunded. The Goddess Pele has provided Hawaii with the best
- 18 soil in the nation for marijuana cultivation; it should be
- 19 capitalized upon for the good of her people.
- 20 SECTION 2. (a) The department of business, economic
- 21 development, and tourism in consultation with the department of
- 22 agriculture shall convene a temporary working group to develop a
