A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACCESS TO JUSTICE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act shall be known as the Hawaii Justice
- 2 League Act of 2014.
- 3 The legislature finds that there is a lack of access to
- 4 justice within the State in both civil and criminal contexts.
- 5 The supreme court of Hawaii access to justice commission,
- 6 established in 2008 to increase access to justice in civil legal
- 7 matters for low- and moderate-income residents, found that one
- 8 of the reasons for the severe disparity among citizens'
- 9 abilities to access the judicial system is the insufficient
- 10 number of attorneys choosing to practice public interest law.
- 11 The legislature finds that few new lawyers are able to
- 12 practice public interest law due to the high cost of attending
- 13 law school; the debt that law school graduates incur to finance
- 14 their legal education; the high cost of living in Hawaii; and
- 15 the compensation, which is much lower than in other practice
- 16 areas. Because of these circumstances, new lawyers pursuing
- 17 public interest jobs often cannot service their student loan
- 18 debt. Lawyers who choose to work in public interest law can do



- 1 so only by maintaining a "no-frills" subsistence-level
- 2 lifestyle. The increasingly high cost of attending law school
- 3 requires lawyers to seek out higher-paying jobs that allow for
- 4 repayment of student loans.
- 5 The legislature further finds that twenty-six other
- 6 jurisdictions nationwide have loan repayment assistance programs
- 7 to encourage lawyers to pursue public interest work within their
- 8 jurisdiction. Additionally, the legislature finds that the
- 9 current federal programs, although helpful, are inadequate to
- 10 incentivize public interest work in Hawaii because it is more
- 11 economically feasible for lawyers to live in jurisdictions that
- 12 offer a lower cost of living and higher salary levels.
- 13 Loan repayment assistance programs have been successfully
- 14 used in Hawaii to increase the number of educators serving in
- 15 hard-to-fill teaching positions, and the legislature believes
- 16 that loan repayment assistance programs can also be used to
- 17 encourage and enable lawyers to pursue public interest work in
- 18 the State.
- 19 The legislature finds that encouraging law students and
- 20 lawyers to practice public interest law is essential to ensuring
- 21 access to the justice system. Therefore, it is the intent of
- 22 the legislature in enacting this legislation to provide for the



- 1 partial repayment of student loans of lawyers who provide public
- 2 interest legal services.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii justice
- 4 league program, under the University of Hawaii William S.
- 5 Richardson School of Law, to provide student loan repayment
- 6 assistance for lawyers who agree to pursue public interest work
- 7 in Hawaii.
- 8 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 9 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
- 10 as follows:
- 11 "CHAPTER
- 12 HAWAII JUSTICE LEAGUE PROGRAM
- 13 § -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the
- 14 context requires otherwise:
- 15 "Lawyer" means a person admitted to practice law as
- 16 required by the rules of the supreme court of Hawaii.
- 17 "Loan repayment" means the payment, per year, of up to
- 18 twenty per cent of a Hawaii justice league program participant's
- 19 legal training costs, including the cost of in-state tuition at
- 20 the William S. Richardson School of Law, not exceeding \$35,000
- 21 per year, for a maximum of five years.

- 1 "Participant" means a lawyer who is receiving loan
- 2 repayment assistance through the Hawaii justice league loan
- 3 repayment assistance program.
- 4 "Public interest work" means work for an organization that
- 5 has been granted tax-exempt status as a charitable organization
- 6 by the Internal Revenue Service pursuant to section 501(c)(3),
- 7 501(c)(4), 501(c)(5), or 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code
- 8 of 1986, as amended; local or state government; Native Hawaiian
- 9 public interest organizations; and low-income community-based
- 10 private practice.
- 11 § -2 Hawaii justice league program; loan repayment
- 12 assistance; established. (a) The Hawaii justice league program
- 13 is established to encourage lawyers to pursue public interest
- 14 work in Hawaii. The program shall be administered by the
- 15 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law. In
- 16 administering the program, the University of Hawaii William S.
- 17 Richardson School of Law shall:
- 18 (1) Adopt rules and develop guidelines to administer the
- 19 program;
- 20 (2) Identify and designate areas of the State with the
- 21 greatest need for public interest work;

4	(4)	Establish criteria for the selection of lawyers to

6	(5)	Beginning on July 1, 2015, and no later than July 1 in
7		each year thereafter, increase the per annum maximum
8		loan repayment amount for a cost-of-living adjustment
9		The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School
10		of Law shall use \$35,000 the first year, multiplied by
11		the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price
12		Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the previous
13		year to determine the adjusted per annum maximum loan
14		repayment amount for the next year. Each year
15		thereafter the new adjusted per annum maximum loan
16		repayment amount shall be used to determine the per
17		annum maximum loan repayment amount for the following
18		year;

(6) Publish the adjusted per annum maximum loan repayment

- (8) Collect and manage reimbursements from participants who do not meet their service commitments under the program;
- 6 (9) Publicize the program, particularly to maximize
 7 participation by individuals who live in areas of the
 8 State where there is the greatest need for public
 9 interest work; and
- 10 (10) Solicit and accept grants and donations from public
 11 and private sources for the program, including
 12 maximizing the use of federal matching funds.
- The Hawaii justice league program shall partner with a 13 (b) lending financial institution whose operations are principally 14 conducted in Hawaii to provide loan repayment assistance to 15 16 lawyers who make the service commitment under subsection (c). The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law 17 shall make loan repayments directly to the financial institution 18 under this subsection to offset the loan repayment for which the 19 Hawaii justice league program participant would otherwise be 20

liable. The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School

- 1 of Law shall prioritize loan repayments in accordance with the
- 2 greatest need for public interest work.
- 3 (c) The Hawaii justice league program shall provide loan
- 4 repayments on behalf of a lawyer who agrees to serve for at
- 5 least five consecutive years as a lawyer pursuing public
- 6 interest work in Hawaii; provided that eligible lawyers, as
- 7 applicable, shall have graduated from a duly accredited law
- 8 school within the United States; provided further that
- 9 preference shall be given to graduates of the University of
- 10 Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law, as applicable.
- 11 (d) Eligibility to participate in the program shall be
- 12 determined by the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson
- 13 School of Law on a competitive basis and in accordance with
- 14 subsection (c).
- (e) If a Hawaii justice league program participant fails
- 16 to satisfy the participant's service commitment under subsection
- 17 (c), the Hawaii justice league program participant shall be
- 18 liable for the repayment of the outstanding balance of the loan
- 19 to the lending financial institution under subsection (b). In
- 20 addition, the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School
- 21 of Law may seek reimbursement for any loan repayment made by the

- 1 university on behalf of the Hawaii justice league program
- 2 participant.
- 3 (f) In accordance with chapter 103D, the University of
- 4 Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law may enter into
- 5 written contracts with collection agencies to collect delinquent
- 6 reimbursements of loan repayments. All payments collected,
- 7 exclusive of a collection agency's commissions, shall revert and
- 8 be credited to the Hawaii justice league revolving fund. A
- 9 collection agency that enters into a written contract with the
- 10 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law to
- 11 collect delinquent reimbursements of loan repayments pursuant to
- 12 this section may collect a commission from the participant in
- 13 accordance with the terms of, and up to the amounts authorized
- 14 in, the written contract.
- 15 S -3 Rules. The University of Hawaii William S.
- 16 Richardson School of Law shall adopt rules to administer this
- 17 chapter. The rules shall be adopted pursuant to chapter 91.
- 18 § -4 Hawaii justice league revolving fund. (a) There
- 19 is established in the treasury of the State the Hawaii justice
- 20 league revolving fund, which shall be administered by the
- 21 University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law, and
- 22 into which shall be deposited:

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1	(1)	Any funds appropriated by the legislature for the
2		Hawaii justice league program;
3	(2)	Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and
4		private persons;
5	(3)	Reimbursements of loan repayments under the Hawaii
6		justice league loan repayment assistance program;
7	(4)	Proceeds of the operations of the Hawaii justice
8		league program; and
9	(5)	Interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited into
10		the fund.

- (b) The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School 11 of Law may expend moneys from the fund for the purposes of this 12 chapter, including the operational expenses of the Hawaii 13 14 justice league program."
- 15 SECTION 3. The University of Hawaii William S. Richardson 16 school of law shall implement the Hawaii justice league program 17 no later than June 30, 2015.
- The dean of the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson 18 school of law shall report to the legislature on the status of 19 20 the Hawaii justice league program, including the most recently adjusted per annum maximum repayment amount, no later than 21

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- 1 twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session
- 2 beginning with the regular session of 2016.
- 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
- 6 deposit into the Hawaii justice league revolving fund.
- 7 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii justice
- 8 league revolving fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as
- 9 may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for the purposes of
- 10 establishing and administering the Hawaii justice league
- 11 program.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 13 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2525.

Description:

Establishes the Hawaii Justice League Program to provide loan repayments on behalf of eligible lawyers that pursue public interest work in Hawaii. Provides for loan repayments by the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law. Creates the Hawaii Justice League Revolving Fund. Makes an appropriation. Effective July 1, 2525.
