A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ISLAND BURIAL COUNCILS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the statute
2	providing for the establishment of the island burial councils
,3	needs to be clarified and simplified to ensure that the island
4	burial councils can fulfill their critical responsibilities.
5	SECTION 2. Section 6E-43.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended to read as follows:
7	"§6E-43.5 Island burial councils; creation; appointment;
8	composition; duties. (a) [The department shall establish]
9	There are established within the department five island burial
10	councils, one each for [Hawaii, Maui/Lanai, Molokai, Oahu, and
11	Kauai/Niihau, Hawai'i, Maui/Lāna'i, Moloka'i, O'ahu, and
12	Kaua'i/Ni'ihau, to implement section 6E-43. Each council shall
13	consist of nine members, except the Kaua'i/Ni'ihau council, which
14	shall consist of eleven members. Each council shall consist of
15	no more than three representatives of development and large
16	property owner interests and at least one representative from
17	each geographic region identified as follows:

1	(1)	The Hawai'i council shall consist of the following
2		geographic regions: Kohala, Kona, Kaʻū, Puna, Hilo,
3		and Hāmākua;
4	(2)	The Maui/Lāna'i council shall consist of the following
5		geographic regions: Lahaina, Wailuku, Makawao, Hāna,
6		and Lāna'i;
7	(3)	The Moloka'i council shall consist of the following
8		geographic regions: West Moloka'i, Central Moloka'i,
9		East Moloka'i, and Kalawao;
10	(4)	The O'ahu council shall consist of the following
11		geographic regions: Wai'anae, 'Ewa, Kona, Ko'olaupoko,
12		Koʻolauloa, and Waialua; and
13	(5)	The Kaua'i/Ni'ihau council shall consist of the
14		following geographic regions: Waimea, Kōloa, Līhu'e,
15		Kawaihau, Hanalei, Na Pali, and Ni'ihau.
16	Regional	representatives shall be selected from the Hawaiian
17	community	on the basis of their understanding of the culture,
18	history,	burial beliefs, customs, and practices of native

20	(b)	Appointment of members to the councils shall be made
21	by the go	vernor, in accordance with section 26-34, from a list

provided by the department, provided that a minimum of twenty 1 2 per cent of the regional representatives shall be appointed from 3 a list of at least nine candidates provided by the office of 4 Hawaiian affairs. The department shall develop the list in 5 consultation with appropriate Hawaiian organizations, such as 6 Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawai'i Nei. [The membership of each 7 council shall include at least one representative from each 8 geographic region of the island as well as representatives of 9 development and large property owner interests. Regional 10 representatives shall be selected from the Hawaiian community on 11 the basis of their understanding of the culture, history, burial 12 beliefs, customs, and practices of native Hawaiians. The 13 councils shall have a minimum of nine and a maximum of fifteen 14 members, and have a ratio of not more than three to one and no 15 less than two to one in favor of regional representatives. 16 The department, in consultation with the councils, 17 office of Hawaiian affairs, representatives of development and 18 large property owner interests, and appropriate Hawaiian 19 organizations, such as Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawai'i Nei, 20 shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 necessary to carry out 21 the purposes of this section. - 1 expenses incurred during the performance of their duties. The
- 2 councils shall be a part of the department for administrative
- 3 purposes.
- 4 (d) The councils shall hold meetings and acquire
- 5 information as they deem necessary and shall communicate their
- 6 findings and recommendations to the department. Notwithstanding
- 7 section 92-3, whenever the location and description of burial
- 8 sites are under consideration, the councils may hold closed
- 9 meetings. A majority of all members to which each council is
- 10 entitled shall constitute a quorum to do business. Concurrence
- 11 of a majority of the members present at a meeting shall be
- 12 necessary to make any action of a council valid.
- 13 (e) Department records relating to the location and
- 14 description of historic sites, including burial sites, if deemed
- 15 sensitive by a council or the [Hawaii] Hawaii historic places
- 16 review board, shall be confidential.
- 17 (f) The councils shall:
- 18 (1) Determine the preservation or relocation of previously
- identified native Hawaiian burial sites;

1	(3)	Make recommendations regarding appropriate management,	
2		treatment, and protection of native Hawaiian burial	
3		sites, and on any other matters relating to native	
4		Hawaiian burial sites;	
5	(4)	Elect a chairperson for a four-year term who shall	
6		serve for not more than two consecutive terms; and	
7	(5)	Maintain a list of appropriate Hawaiian organizations,	
8		agencies, and offices to notify regarding the	
9		discovery of remains."	
10	SECT	ION 3. Each current sitting council member shall serve	
11	the remai	nder of their term. However, once their term ends,	
12	their sea	t shall be filled in accordance with this Act. All	
13	future appointments to the burial councils shall be filled in		
14	accordance with this Act.		
15	SECT	ION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed	
16	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.	
17	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
