A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE IMMERSION PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Hawaiian language, the native language of 2 the Native Hawaiian people, was once a thriving language used by 3 Native Hawaiians and foreigners alike. However, by the late 4 twentieth century, the Hawaiian language was pushed to the brink 5 of extinction due to a number of factors, including an 1896 law 6 that functioned to ban the speaking of the Hawaiian language in 7 Hawai'i schools. Fortunately, the Hawaiian language was saved by 8 several historic initiatives, including the department of 9 education's Hawaiian language immersion program, which was 10 launched in the 1980s. Today, the Hawaiian language immersion 11 program is offered at twenty-one public schools and educates 12 more than two thousand students in kindergarten through the 13 twelfth grade.

14 The assessment requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act 15 of 2001 present a challenge for the Hawaiian language immersion 16 program. Because English is not formally introduced in Hawaiian 17 language immersion program classrooms until the fifth grade,

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language to comply with the requirements of the No Child Left
 Behind Act. During the 2005-2006 and through the 2010-2011
 school years, these students have been taking the Hawaiian
 aligned portfolio assessment, which was developed in the
 Hawaiian language specifically for the Hawaiian language
 immersion program, to comply with the requirements of the No
 Child Left Behind Act.

8 The legislature finds that the Hawaiian language is a critical component of the heritage of the State of Hawai'i, and 9 10 that the State has a solemn obligation to perpetuate the 11 Hawaiian language. For example, the Hawai'i state constitution 12 recognizes the Hawaiian language as one of two official 13 languages of the State. Moreover, the board of education has 14 adopted a policy, board of education policy 2105, acknowledging that its Hawaiian language immersion program is "an essential 15 component to the revitalization and continuation of the Hawaiian 16 17 language and culture." The policy further states that one of 18 the goals of the Hawaiian language immersion program is to set a 19 challenging curriculum that follows the Hawaii content and 20 performance standards.

21 Furthermore, the federal Native American Languages Act of 22 1990 recognizes the United States' responsibility to ensure the HB224 HD1 HMS 2013-1660

survival of Native American languages and establishes the
 nation's policy of encouraging and supporting the use of Native
 American languages as a medium of instruction to help preserve
 those languages.

5 The legislature further finds that to uphold its obligation 6 to perpetuate the Hawaiian language, the department of education 7 must provide the students of the Hawaiian language immersion 8 program with an assessment system that most accurately measures 9 their academic achievement.

10 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of 11 education to develop annual assessments in the Hawaiian language 12 in language arts, mathematics, and science to be administered to 13 students in grades three through six of the department of 14 education's Hawaiian language immersion program.

15 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 16 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read 17 as follows:

"CHAPTER

HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE IMMERSION PROGRAM

20 § -1 Assessments. (a) The department of education, for
21 purposes of educational accountability under the No Child Left



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1 Behind Act of 2001, shall develop annual assessments in the 2 Hawaiian language: 3 In language arts and mathematics, to be administered (1)4 to Hawaiian language immersion program students in 5 grades three through six; and 6 (2)In science, to be administered to Hawaiian language 7 immersion program students in grade four. 8 The assessments shall be administered annually commencing with 9 the 2014-2015 school year. The assessments shall not be Hawaiian translations of 10 (b) 11 the general state assessments and shall be: 12 (1)Aligned with the common core state standards or the 13 Hawaii content and performance standards III, as 14 appropriate; Valid, reliable, and consistent with nationally 15 (2) 16 recognized professional and technical standards; and 17 Compliant with the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. (3) 18 All ancillary assessment materials and tools that are (C) 19 made available to students taking the general state assessment 20 shall also be made available in the Hawaiian language to 21 students in the Hawaiian language immersion program to the 22 extent that these materials and tools can be adapted for use in HB224 HD1 HMS 2013-1660



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1	the Hawaiian language. The department of education shall work
2	with the Hawaiian language community and any contractor to
3	develop the ancillary materials and tools required under this
4	subsection. Such materials and tools shall be comparable to
5	those developed for Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium
6	assessments aligned with the common core state standards.
7	(d) The department of education, with the assistance of
8	the Hawaiian language community, including the 'Aha Kauleo
9	Kaiapuni Hawaiʻi, members of the Hawaiian language immersion
10	program schools, the Hawaiian language programs at the
11	University of Hawaii at Hilo and the University of Hawaii at
12	Manoa, the office of Hawaiian affairs, and other Hawaiian
13	language community organizations, shall develop:
14	(1) Common core state standards assessments for students
15	in grades three through six; and
16	(2) A Hawaii content and performance standards, third
17	edition, science assessment for students in grade
18	four,
19	as required under subsection (a)."
20	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
21	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
22	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the
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same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
 2014-2015 to develop curriculum and professional development
 materials for teachers in Hawaiian language immersion program
 schools.

5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department6 of education for the purposes of this Act.

7 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 11 2014-2015 to develop the assessments required pursuant to 12 chapter , Hawaii Revised Statutes.

13 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department14 of education for the purposes of this Act.

15 SECTION 5. The department of education shall report to the 16 legislature on the status of the procedures for the development 17 of assessments in the Hawaiian language, pursuant to section 18 -1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, including the estimated costs 19 and other critical resources or agreements for the development 20 of the assessments, no later than twenty days prior to the 21 convening of the regular session of 2014.

22 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.

Hawaiian Language Immersion Program; Student Assessment

Description:

Requires the Department of Education to develop annual assessments in the Hawaiian language in language arts and mathematics for students in grades three through six, and in science for students in grade four in the Hawaiian language immersion program. Effective July 1, 2013. (HB224 HD1)

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
