#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TELEHEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that one of the
2	challenges facing the country's health care system is providing
3	quality care to segments of the population who do not have
4	access to essential services because of geographic limitations.
5	The use of telehealth to deliver health care from a distance is
6	an effective way of overcoming certain barriers to care,
7	particularly for communities located in rural and remote areas.
8	This is especially important in a state like Hawaii, where
9	residents on the neighbor islands and in rural areas lack the
10	same level of access to care that residents on Oahu enjoy.
11	The legislature further finds that telehealth services are
12	used extensively across the country with no compromise in
13	quality of care when the services are within the scope of
14	practice of a provider. However, reimbursement policies vary
15	between health plans, leading to confusion among health care
16	providers and restrictions on patient access to quality health

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care.

1	The legislature additionally finds that requiring parity						
2	for teleh	ealth services will empower consumer choice, reduce					
3	dispariti	disparities in access to care, enhance health care provider					
4	availabil	ity, and improve quality of care.					
5	The	legislature also finds that various sections of the					
6	Hawaii Re	vised Statutes contain different definitions for or					
7	reference	s to "telemedicine" and "telehealth" and notes that					
8	these definitions and references should be harmonized for						
9	consistency.						
10	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to:					
11	(1)	Require reimbursement for services provided through					
12		telehealth to be equivalent to reimbursement for the					
13		same services provided via face-to-face contact					
14		between a health care provider and a patient;					
15	(2)	Clarify that a health care provider of telehealth					
16		includes primary care providers, mental health					
17		providers, and oral health providers such as					
18		physicians and osteopathic physicians, advanced					
19		practice registered nurses, psychologists, and					
20		dentists; and					
21	(3)	Amend references to "telemedicine" in the Hawaii					

Revised Statutes to "telehealth" for consistency.

Standard telephone contacts, facsimile transmissions, or email texts, in combination or by themselves, do not constitute a telehealth service for the purposes of this chapter."

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#### Report Title:

Telehealth; Insurance; Health Care Providers; Reimbursement

#### Description:

Requires reimbursement for services provided through telehealth to be equivalent to reimbursement for the same services provided via face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a patient. Clarifies that a health care provider of telehealth includes primary care providers, mental health providers, and oral health providers such as physicians and osteopathic physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, psychologists, and dentists. Amends references to "telemedicine" in the Hawaii Revised Statutes to "telehealth" for consistency.
