### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE REPEAL OF NON-GENERAL FUNDS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
3	Captain Cook memorial fund.
4	The legislature finds that the fund is no longer necessary.
5	It has had no activity in recent years and a very small balance.
6	SECTION 2. Section 6E-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to read as follows:
· 8	"[f]§6E-4[f] Administration. All state historic areas and
9	buildings surplus to the operations of the department of
10	accounting and general services shall be transferred by
11	executive order to the department[, except as provided in
12	section 6E-33]. All state projects and programs relating to
13	historic preservation shall come under the authority of the
14	department."
15	SECTION 3. Section 6E-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	repealed.
17	["[\$6E-33] Captain Cook Memorial Fund. All moneys in the
18	Captain Cook memorial fund or which may be paid into the same
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1	tiom the proceeds of sales of which may be received by way or
2	gift or otherwise for any of the purposes provided by this
3	section, the acceptance of such gifts and the receipt of such
4	funds being authorized, shall be expendable by the comptroller
5	from time to time for any of the purposes provided by this
6	section, and any original historical documents or other
7	articles, or copies, facsimiles, or replicas thereof, so
8	collected, and copies of publications made under this section
9	shall be deposited in the archives of Hawaii to constitute a
10	collection to be known as the "Captain Cook Memorial
11	Collection".
12	The comptroller may purchase or otherwise acquire original
13	books, mementos, pamphlets, documents, or other articles of
14	historical value relating to the life of Captain James Cook, or
15	connected with the history, discovery, and exploration of the
16	Hawaiian Islands, or copies, facsimiles, or replicas thereof of
17	other data relating thereto, and prepare and publish in the
18	comptroller's discretion books, documents, pamphlets, or other
19	publications relating thereto.
20	The comptroller may distribute free copies of such
21	publications to libraries, museums, and other places of
22	references open to the public in the United States or in other
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- 1 countries, not to exceed, however, one-third of the number of
- 2 copies of each published. The remaining copies may be sold at
- 3 such reasonable prices as may be fixed by the comptroller, the
- 4 proceeds of such sales to be paid into the trust fund."]
- 5 PART II
- 6 SECTION 4. The purpose of this part is to address the seal
- 7 of quality special fund. More specifically, this part repeals
- 8 the special fund and requires the deposit of fees and fines
- 9 generated by the seal of quality program to be deposited into
- 10 the general fund.
- 11 The legislature finds that the seal of quality special fund
- 12 is not necessary. Its balance and annual revenues and
- 13 expenditures are relatively small. Thus, a separate special
- 14 fund for the program is not justified.
- 15 SECTION 5. Section 148-67, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- "[+]\$148-67[+] Seal of quality [special fund. (a) There
- 18 is established in the state treasury the seal of quality special
- 19 fund, into which shall be deposited: program revenues; deposit
- 20 into general fund. The department of agriculture shall transmit
- 21 the following revenues to the director of finance for deposit
- 22 into the general fund:

2	SECTION 6. The purpose of this part is to repeal the
3	infrastructure development fund.
4	The legislature finds that the fund is no longer necessary.
5.	It has had no balance or activity in recent years.
6	SECTION 7. Section 171-19.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	repealed.
8	["\$171-19.5 Infrastructure development fund;
9	establishment. (a) There is established in the state treasury
10	the infrastructure development fund to be administered by the
11	department of land and natural resources. Funds transferred or
12	appropriated by the legislature and moneys received or collected
13	by the department of land and natural resources, as authorized
14	by the legislature, shall be deposited into the infrastructure
15	development fund.
16	(b) The infrastructure development fund shall be used to
17	provide funding for infrastructure development in the Kikala-
18	Keokea area on the island of Hawaii to benefit residents of
19	Kalapana who have been dispossessed of their homes and lands as
20	a result of the continued volcanic eruptions on the island of
21	Hawaii, which began on January 3, 1983. Proceeds of this fund

1	may be used for necessary expenses in the administration of the
2	<del>fund.</del>
3	(c) Upon fulfillment of the purposes of this section, any
4	unexpended or unencumbered funds appropriated by the legislature
5	or remaining in the infrastructure development fund as of the
6	close of business on December 31, 2004, shall not lapse into
7	that fund or to the credit of the general fund, but shall be
8	transferred to the credit of the Kikala-Keokea housing revolving
9	fund established in section 201H-81 as of that date; provided
10	that any unexpended or unencumbered moneys that were provided by
11	the office of Hawaiian affairs and deposited into the
12	infrastructure development fund for the purpose of

7	general fund.
8	The legislature finds that the statewide geospatial
9	information and data integration special fund is not necessary.
10	It has no balance or annual revenues.
11	SECTION 9. Section 225M-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended to read as follows:
13	"§225M-6 Fees for statewide planning and geographic
14	information system services and products. The office of
15	planning may charge fees for statewide planning and geographic
16	information system services and products. All fees collected
17	for statewide planning and geographic information system
18	analyses and other related services shall be deposited into the
19	[statewide-geospatial information and data integration special]
20	general fund [for the sole purpose of supporting the statewide
21	planning and geographic information system]. The office shall

department shall provide an opportunity for a hearing
within twenty-four hours after service of the order.
After a hearing pursuant to this subsection, the
director may affirm, modify, or rescind the order as
appropriate. The director may institute a civil
action in any court of appropriate jurisdiction for
the enforcement of any order issued pursuant to this
subsection.

Factors to be considered in imposing the administrative penalty include the nature and history of the violation and any prior violation and the opportunity, difficulty, and history of corrective action. It is presumed that the violator's economic

1		and financial conditions allow payment of the penalty
2		and the burden of proof to the contrary is on the
3		violator. In any judicial proceeding to enforce the
4		administrative penalty imposed pursuant to this
5		chapter, the director need only show that notice was
6		given, a hearing was held or the time granted for
7		requesting a hearing had expired without such a
8		request, the administrative penalty imposed, and that
9		the penalty imposed remains unsatisfied.
10		This section does not supersede specific
11		administrative penalties provided elsewhere.
12	(2)	Judicial. The director may institute a civil action
13		in any court of appropriate jurisdiction for
14		injunctive relief to prevent violation of any order
15		issued or rule adopted pursuant to this chapter, in
16		addition to any other remedy or penalty provided for
17		under this chapter.

- 15 SECTION 36. The purpose of this part is to address the
- 16 trust fund for the state certified motor vehicle arbitration
- 17 program.
- 18 More specifically, this part repeals the trust fund and
- 19 transfers its unexpended and unencumbered balance to the
- 20 compliance resolution fund. This part also requires the fees
- 21 formerly deposited into the trust fund to now be deposited into
- 22 the compliance resolution fund.

1	The legislature finds that the recent activity of the trus
2	fund has been minimal. Consequently, its existence separate
3	from the compliance resolution fund is no longer justified.

16	with the state certified arbitration program.] "

18	SECTION 38. The purpose of this part is to transfer the
19	balance of the fee simple residential revolving fund into the
20	general fund on June 30, 2014.
21	The legislature finds that the present balance of the fee
22	simple residential revolving fund is relatively small. More

- 1 importantly, the legislature finds that the residential
- 2 leasehold programs intended to be funded from the revolving fund
- 3 have not been active in recent years. Consequently, there is no
- 4 immediate need for funds to operate the programs.
- 5 If the need for operating funds becomes necessary in the
- 6 future, the revolving fund may be replenished as provided under
- 7 the enabling statute for the residential leasehold programs.
- 8 SECTION 39. Section 516-44, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

- 21 issued by the corporation, or by the State, and then for
