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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INSURANCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the federal Patient 1 2 Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (Affordable Care Act) 3 encourages states to develop innovative approaches to insuring their populations by authorizing states to apply for waivers 4 from certain requirements of the Affordable Care Act. To be 5 6 eligible, a state must demonstrate that its proposed health insurance reforms are as comprehensive and affordable as the 7 federal requirements for insurance sold in its state health . 8 insurance exchange. In addition, proposed reforms must be 9 budget neutral for the federal government. States that are 10 11 granted innovation waivers may receive federal assistance to operate their reform programs in an amount that is equivalent to 12 the aggregate amount of tax credits and cost-sharing subsidies 13 14 that the federal government would have paid for individuals 15 enrolled in state health insurance exchanges.

16 The legislature also finds that Hawaii has a bold history 17 as an innovator in ensuring that its residents have access to 18 health care. The Hawaii Prepaid Health Care Act has ensured the 2014-1781 HB2581 SD1 SMA.doc

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availability of employer-sponsored health insurance for workers 1 2 and their families, and the State's medicaid program has provided access to comprehensive managed care for low-income 3 4 families. The legislature believes that, while Hawaii has taken great steps in implementing the health insurance exchange and 5 6 other insurance reforms required by the Affordable Care Act, the State may be able to create a more effective alternative 7 8 solution for providing affordable health coverage to 9 individuals. 10 The purpose of this Act is to establish a state innovation 11 waiver task force to develop a health care reform plan that meets requirements for obtaining a state innovation waiver. 12 SECTION 2. (a) There is created the state innovation 13 waiver task force, to be temporarily attached to the office of 14 the governor for administrative purposes. 15 (b) The task force shall consist of the following members, 16

17 or their respective designees:

- 18 (1) The healthcare transformation coordinator, who shall
 19 serve as chair;
- 20 (2) The director of health;

21 (3) The director of commerce and consumer affairs;
22 (4) The director of labor and industrial relations;

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1	(5)	The administrator of the MedQUEST division of the
2		department of human services;
3	(6)	The insurance commissioner;
4	(7)	The chief information officer of the office of
5		information management and technology;
6	(8)	The administrator of the Hawaii employer-union health
7		benefits trust fund;
8	(9)	The chairperson of the board of directors of the
9		Hawaii Health Connector;
10	(10)	The executive director of the Hawaii Health Connector;
11	(11)	The executive director of the Hawaii Health
12		Information Exchange;
13	(12)	A representative of The Chamber of Commerce Hawaii;
14	(13)	A representative of the Healthcare Association of
15		Hawaii;
16	(14)	A person with expertise in health care delivery and a
17		person with expertise in health insurance, to be
18		designated by the president of the senate; and
19	(15)	A person representing small businesses in Hawaii and a
20		person with expertise in health care delivery, to be
21		designated by the speaker of the house of
22		representatives.
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1	(c)	The task force shall:	
2	(1)	Examine the feasibility of alternative approaches to	
3		the health reform requirements described under Section	
4		1332(a)(2) of the federal act;	
5	(2)	Examine alternatives to and possible exemptions or	
6		waivers from requirements relating to allowable	
7		premium rate variations based upon age, as described	
8		in Section 1201 of the federal act;	
9	(3)	Examine the feasibility of options for providing	
10		affordable insurance coverage for uninsured and	
11		underinsured individuals in Hawaii through brokers and	
12		professional employer organizations that include	
13		innovations to the State's existing medicaid program;	
14		and	
15	(4)	Develop a plan for applying for a state innovation	
16		waiver that meets the requirements of Section 1332 of	
17		the federal act, including:	
18		(A) Developing a strategy for health care reform	
19		that:	
20		(i) Provides coverage that is at least as	
21		comprehensive as required by the federal	
22		act;	
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1	(ii)	Provides coverage and cost-sharing
2		protections that are at least as affordable
3		as under the federal act;
4	(iii)	Makes health insurance coverage available to
5		as many residents of Hawaii as under the
6		federal act; and
7	(iv)	Is budget neutral for the federal
8		government;
9	(B) Exam	ining the feasibility of options for
10	prov	iding affordable insurance coverage for
11	unin	sured and underinsured individuals in Hawaii
12	that	include innovations to the State's existing
13	medi	caid program; and
14	(C) Ensu	ring compliance with all applicable public
15	noti	ce requirements of title 31 Code of Federal
16	Regu	lations part 33 and title 45 Code of Federal
17	Regu	lations part 155, as amended.
18	(d) The task	force shall prepare a draft application for a
19	state innovation wa	iver, to take effect for plan years beginning
20	after January 1, 20	17.

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1	(e) The members of the task force shall serve without		
2	compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including		
3	travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties.		
4	(f) The task force shall submit an initial interim report		
5	to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the		
6	convening of the regular session of 2015. The task force shall		
7	submit a second interim report to the legislature no later than		
8	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of		
9	2016. The interim reports shall include:		
10	(1) Identification of opportunities for state agencies to		
11	collaborate on new information technology that will		
12	advance the goals of the federal act and state		
13	innovation; and		
14	(2) Recommendations on the allocation of existing moneys		
15	available for health reform and innovation, including		
16	any proposed legislation.		
17	(g) The task force shall submit a final report of its		
18	findings and recommendations to the legislature, including any		
19	proposed legislation and the draft application, no later than		
20	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of		
21	2017.		

(h) The task force shall be dissolved on June 30, 2017.
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1	(i) For the purposes of this section, "federal act" means
2	the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111-
3	148), as amended, and any regulations adopted thereunder.
4	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
6	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2014-2015 for
7	the operations of the state innovation waiver task force.
8	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
9	governor for the purposes of this Act.
10	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
