### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that one of the major
- 2 educational dilemmas of our time is rooted in an existing system
- 3 that traps information-age students in agricultural-age schools.
- 4 While the flow of information and ideas is increasingly fluid,
- 5 students are confined to the physical structures and mindsets of
- 6 an earlier time and place. Building, repairing, and
- 7 retrofitting public schools to meet the challenges of the
- 8 twenty-first century and beyond will not be easy, and the costs
- 9 will be considerable. However, quality school infrastructure
- 10 facilitates an environment that will prepare children to achieve
- 11 and succeed in a highly competitive economy.
- 12 The infrastructure of the twenty-first century school must
- 13 be energy efficient and wired with the latest technology.
- 14 Classroom size must be flexible because the program, not the
- 15 space, should determine the number of students per class. The
- 16 school campus must be designed from its inception with student
- 17 achievement in mind to maximize available land and student
- 18 safety, and to offer the community multiple uses of existing



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structures. Most of Hawaii's school campuses fall short in
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    these areas.
         The legislature further finds that twenty-first century
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    schools are also those that include a full complement of the
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    people, programs, and places that support a wide range of
    personal learning styles and instructional modalities. Schools
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    are often separated from personal and family service programs in
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    urban and rural communities. One way to address this situation
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    is to think about schools as the center of a community that can
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    support all aspects of living and learning. The creation of
    school-centered communities will provide greater access to
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    centrally located physical, cultural, social, economic,
    organizational, and educational programs and services that are
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    within walking distance of children and families.
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         The considerable amount of underused public school lands on
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    the State's two hundred fifty-seven school campuses is an
    untapped resource that would provide infrastructure that could
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    make classrooms, campuses, and communities suitable for the
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    twenty-first century. By way of illustration, a preliminary
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    review by a real estate expert indicates that ten parcels that
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    have unused lands are valued at $120,000,000 under existing
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surrounding uses. These lands could be developed solely for the



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- 1 benefit of Hawaii's public school children. The beneficiaries
- 2 would be the children of Hawaii.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to optimize the use of public
- 4 school lands to generate opportunities to improve public school
- 5 facilities and infrastructure to meet the challenges of the
- 6 twenty-first century and to improve the overall quality of
- 7 education in Hawaii. In particular, this Act establishes a
- 8 three-year pilot project to generate revenue from uses for
- 9 public purposes, such as workforce housing, to build and
- 10 retrofit twenty-first century schools and create more school-
- 11 centered communities. The pilot project will lay important
- 12 groundwork for a statewide approach and plan to optimize public
- 13 school lands and modernize public school facilities. This Act
- 14 also establishes the school facilities special fund within
- 15 chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, into which shall be
- 16 deposited all proceeds generated from the lease of public school
- 17 lands. Moneys in the school facilities special fund will be
- 18 used to build or upgrade twenty-first century school facilities.
- 19 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
- 21 designated and to read as follows:



1	"S302A-A Pilot program for lease of lands under the
2	control of the department. (a) There shall be established,
3	within the office of the lieutenant governor, a pilot program
4	for the lease of lands and facilities under the authority of th
5	department of education. The lieutenant governor, in
6	consultation with the department of education, the board of
7	education, and any other appropriate agency, shall serve as the
8	facilitator of the pilot program.
9	(b) Notwithstanding sections 171-13 and 302A-1151, or any
10	other law to the contrary, the department, as directed by the
11	lieutenant governor, may lease public school land on terms it
12	deems appropriate; provided that:
13	(1) The department may lease public school land for not
14	more than a total of two existing sites under leases
15	for a term of not more than fifty-five years per leas
16	to lessees who shall be required to modify, construct
17	or utilize facilities to meet public purposes,
18	including but not limited to workforce rental housing
19	units, in accordance with specific request for
20	proposal or request for information guidelines; and
21	(2) Each lease stipulates that the lessee may retain any
22	revenue generated from the facilities; provided that:

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1	(A)	The lessee shall be obligated to maintain and
2		operate the facilities for a public purpose for
3		the length of the lease;
4	<u>(B)</u>	The lessee shall be subject to payment to the
5		county of all applicable property tax on the
6		value of any improvements;
7	<u>(C)</u>	A leasehold premium may be charged to the lessee
8		for the right to use the land based on a
9		competitive bid process;
10	<u>(D)</u>	Upon the expiration of the lease, the facilities
11		shall revert to the department; and
12	<u>(E)</u>	All revenues and proceeds derived under this
13		section shall be deposited in the school
14		facilities special fund established under section
15		302A-B.
16	<u>§302A-B</u>	School facilities special fund. (a) There is
17	established a	school facilities special fund into which shall be
18	deposited all	proceeds from the leases, permits, interest income
19	generated from	public school lands, and other revenue generated
20	from the non-p	ermanent disposition of public school lands under
21	section 302A-A	<u>··</u>

- 1 (b) The school facilities special fund shall be 2 administered by the department. Except as otherwise provided, 3 all moneys in the school facilities special fund shall be used exclusively for the new construction and upgrade of twenty-first 4 century school facilities, as well as the repair and maintenance 5 6 of existing school facilities." 7 SECTION 3. Section 171C-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: There is established the Hawaii public land 9 10 development revolving fund, to which shall be credited any state 11 appropriations to the fund, any sums collected as a result of 12 bonds issued pursuant to this chapter, any revenues generated from the facilities, except as provided in [sections] section 13 171C-17.5 [and 171C 21], or other moneys made available to the 14 15 fund, to be expended as directed by the corporation." 16 SECTION 4. Section 171C-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 repealed. ["[\$171C-21] School facilities special fund. (a) There 18 19 is established a school facilities special fund into which shall be deposited all proceeds from leases, permits, interest income 20 21 generated from public school lands and facilities, and other 22 revenue generated from the non-permanent-disposition of public
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school lands and facilities under this chapter, less the 1 2 following: (1) The principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to 3 this chapter for projects on public school lands or 5 utilizing public school facilities; 6 (2) The cost of administering, operating, and maintaining projects on public school lands or utilizing public school facilities, not to-exceed fifteen-per cent-of 8 9 the sums collected, net of principal and interest 10 payments on bonds; and -(3) Other sums that may be necessary for the issuance of 11 12 bonds-under this chapter. 13 (b) The school facilities special fund shall be administered by the department of education in consultation with 14 15 the board of education. Except as otherwise provided, all 16 moneys in the school facilities special fund shall be used 17 exclusively for the new construction and upgrade of twenty-first 18 century school facilities, and the retrofit and upgrade of 19 existing school facilities to meet twenty first century school standards."] 20 21 SECTION 5. The lieutenant governor shall submit a report 22 to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 2013-0355 HB SMA-1.doc

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- 1 convening of the regular sessions of 2014 through 2016. In the
- 2 lieutenant governor's report to the legislature, the lieutenant
- 3 governor may provide the following:
- 4 (1) A timeline for the pilot project pursuant to this Act;
- 5 (2) A summary of the lieutenant governor's and the
- 6 department's activities, results, and recommendations
- 7 to optimize the use of public school lands as a means
- 8 to build or renovate twenty-first century schools and
- 9 school-centered communities; and
- 10 (3) Any recommendations for statutory amendments.
- 11 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
- 14 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 15 year 2014-2015 for the public school lands pilot program.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 7. All moneys in the school facilities special
- 19 fund established pursuant to section 171C-21, Hawaii Revised
- 20 Statutes, as of the effective date of this Act, shall be
- 21 transferred to the school facilities special fund established
- 22 pursuant to section 2 of this Act.



- 1 SECTION 8. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 3 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 4 the new sections in this Act.
- 5 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 8 provided that section 6 of this Act shall take effect on July 1,
- 9 2013; provided further that section 302A-A, Hawaii Revised
- 10 Statutes, established by section 2 of this Act, shall be
- 11 repealed on June 30, 2016.

### Report Title:

Education; Public School Lands; Leases; Appropriation

#### Description:

Establishes a three-year pilot program to generate revenue for the use of public school land. Specifies that the lieutenant governor, in consultation with the department of education, board of education, and other appropriate agencies, shall be the facilitator of the pilot program. Authorizes the lease of certain public school lands for public purposes, including but not limited to the development of workforce housing rental units, under specified conditions. Establishes the school facilities special fund within chapter 302A, HRS. Repeals the schools facilities special fund in chapter 171C, HRS. Requires the lieutenant governor to submit a report to the legislature. Makes an appropriation for the pilot program. Pilot program repeals 6/30/2016.

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
