A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEAD INJURIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, was enacted to require the department of 2 3 education and the Hawaii High School Athletic Association to develop a concussion education program for students who are 4 5 fourteen to eighteen years old. Act 197 requires, in part: (1) 6 the immediate removal of a student who exhibits signs, symptoms, 7 or behaviors consistent with a concussion from a game, practice, 8 or other activity; and (2) clearance by a licensed health care 9 provider before the student can return to the activity.

10 The legislature finds that head injuries, including but not 11 limited to concussions and traumatic brain injuries, are 12 sustained by children nineteen years old or younger. According 13 to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, from 2001 to 2009, the number of emergency department visits for traumatic 14 15 brain injuries sustained during sports and recreational 16 activities among children and adolescents nineteen years old or 17 younger increased by sixty-two per cent.

1 The purpose of this Act is to amend Act 197, Session Laws 2 of Hawaii 2012, to: 3 (1) Expand the concussion education program to include all 4 head injuries under a head injury education program; 5 (2) Extend the head injury education program and program 6 protocols to all public and private school students who 7 are nineteen years old or younger, which shall include 8 but is not limited to student athletes, including 9 student cheerleaders; and 10 (3) Implement a provision to provide immunity to public and 11 private school staff and volunteers who comply with the 12 head injury education program and program protocols. SECTION 2. Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, is 13 14 amended by amending section 1 to read as follows: 15 "SECTION 1. The legislature finds that head injuries, 16 including but not limited to concussions [or mild] and traumatic 17 brain injuries sustained by children and adolescents, frequently 18 occur in a variety of sports and recreational activities, 19 including football, soccer, bicycling, and skateboarding. Tn 20 October 2011, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention 21 reported that the number of traumatic brain injury-related 22 emergency department visits in this country by persons nineteen HB HMIA 2013-1-07.doc

1 years old or younger that were related to sports and 2 recreational activities increased from 153,375 in 2001 to 3 248,418 in 2009. In this State, the department of education's 4 athletic health care trainers program also noted an increase in 5 the number of reported concussions, from two hundred thirteen in 6 the 2007-2008 school year to four hundred forty-six in the 2010-7 2011 school year.

8 The marked increase in national and state [concussion] 9 statistics may be attributed, at least in part, to an increased 10 awareness of the dangers of concussions by the people involved 11 in sports activities. The department of education began its 12 concussion management program in 2011 to educate coaches, 13 parents, and athletic trainers, and provide care for students. 14 The legislature finds, however, that a statewide [concussion] 15 head injury educational program is necessary to ensure that 16 public and private high school students, school personnel, and 17 parents are provided with consistent and up-to-date information on [concussions] head injuries and management of symptoms [and 18 19 injuries] relating to a [concussion.] head injury.

3	SECTION 3. Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, is

8	"Concussion" means [a pathophysiological process affecting		
9	the brain, caused by traumatic biomechanical forces] a transient

12	include nausea, headache, dizziness, memory loss, and loss of		
13	consciousness.		
14	"Head injury" means any trauma that leads to injury to the		
15	scalp, skull, or brain and includes but is not limited to a		
16	concussion or traumatic brain injury.		
17	"Licensed health care provider" means an advanced practice		
18	registered nurse, certified or registered athletic trainer,		
19	neuropsychologist, physician assistant, physician, or		
20	osteopathic physician trained in the management of sports		
21	concussions.

1 (4) The need for a [concussed student's] licensed health 2 care provider to evaluate the [student] student's head 3 injury and determine whether the student is able to 4 return to a particular athletic or recreational 5 activity; and 6 The monitoring of a student's return to physical (5) 7 activity by the school or the school's certified 8 athletic trainer, if an athletic trainer is employed 9 by the school. This return to activity plan is to be 10 based upon peer-review scientific evidence, such as 11 that from the National Athletic Trainer Association or 12 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention." 13 SECTION 5. Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, is 14 amended by amending section 4 to read as follows: 15 "SECTION 4. Educational guidelines for development of a 16 [high] school [concussion] head injury awareness program. There 17 shall be an educational program developed for every public and 18 private school [that is a member of the Hawaii High-School 19 Athletic Association] on how to develop a school's [concussion] 20 head injury awareness plan. Every program shall require:


