A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the right to 2 vote is integral to the democratic process. Therefore, the 3 public must have confidence in the integrity of elections 4 procedures. Without such assurances, it will be difficult to 5 garner enthusiasm and increase voter turnout in the future. The 6 legislature further finds that the public's trust in the 7 government's ability to conduct fair and efficient voting 8 operations has been shaken, due to events that unfolded during 9 the 2012 elections. Polling places in Hawaii County delayed 10 their opening time due to polling place and operational issues; 11 some polling places on Oahu did not have enough paper ballots on 12 hand. As a result, voters were forced to stand in long lines 13 for an hour or more, discouraging some from exercising their 14 right to vote.

15 The purpose of this Act is to prevent such reoccurrences by 16 expanding the responsibilities of the elections commission to 17 more closely monitor the chief election officer and clarify the 18 duties of the chief election officer in monitoring elections. HB HMIA 2013-1-11.doc Page 2

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1 SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended 2 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to 3 read as follows: 4 "§11- Staff for the elections commission. The elections 5 commission shall have the authority to hire employees to assist 6 the commission in the fulfillment of its duties under this 7 chapter." 8 SECTION 3. Section 11-1.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by amending subsection (g) to read as follows: 10 "(g) Before February 1, 2016, [The] the chief election 11 officer may be removed by the elections commission at any time 12 for good cause. After January 31, 2016, the chief election 13 officer shall serve at the pleasure of the elections 14 commission." 15 SECTION 4. Section 11-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended to read as follows: 17 "§11-2 Chief election officer; duties. (a) The chief 18 election officer shall supervise all state elections. 19 (b) The chief election officer may delegate 20 responsibilities in state elections within a county to the clerk 21 of that county $[\Theta r]$ and to other specified persons [-], provided 22 that: HB HMIA 2013-1-11.doc

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1 [(c)] (d) The chief election officer shall maintain data 2 concerning registered voters, elections, apportionment, and 3 districting. The chief election officer shall use this data to 4 assist the reapportionment commission provided for under Article 5 IV of the Constitution. 6 $\left[\frac{d}{d}\right]$ (e) The chief election officer shall be responsible 7 for public education with respect to voter registration and 8 information. 9 (f) The chief election officer shall, in preparation for 10 elections, implement the use of a simple and unambiguous checklist of required duties, to be utilized by all monitors of 11 12 the election. 13 [-(e)-] (g) The chief election officer shall adopt rules 14 governing elections in accordance with chapter 91." 15 SECTION 5. Section 11-7.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended to read as follows: 17 "[[]§11-7.5[]] Duties of the elections commission. The 18 duties of the elections commission are to: 19 (1)Hold public hearings; 20 Investigate and hold hearings for receiving evidence (2)21 of any violations and complaints; 22 (3) Adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91; HB HMIA 2013-1-11.doc

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invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
of this Act are severable.

SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.
