## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	PION 1. The legislature finds that the excessive use of
2	single-us	se checkout bags presents an unnecessary hazard to the
3	natural e	environment. While counties have enacted ordinances
4	that proh	aibit or will prohibit businesses from providing plastic
5	bags at t	the point of sale, other single-use checkout bags, such
6	as paper	bags:
7	(1)	Require crude oil, a polluting fossil fuel, for their
8		manufacture;
9	(2)	Burden overcrowded landfills;
10	(3)	Are recycled minimally;
11	(4)	Contribute to deforestation and greenhouse gas
12		emissions; and
13	(5)	Are manufactured using large quantities of water and
14		non-renewable energy.
15	Prohibiti	ons on the use of plastic bags may increase reliance on
16	paper bag	s that also are damaging to the environment. An
17	environme	entally friendly alternative to the single-use checkout

- 1 bag is the reusable bag that consumers can easily acquire,
- 2 clean, and store.
- 3 The legislature finds that the State has a compelling
- 4 interest in protecting its precious natural environment.
- 5 Several countries and both international and domestic cities
- 6 have successfully implemented similar laws that have resulted in
- 7 a significant reduction in single-use checkout bag usage and
- 8 have used collected fees for environmental protection programs.
- 9 Because the people of Hawaii depend on the preservation of the
- 10 natural environment for economic, social, and cultural reasons,
- 11 the public's health and welfare will benefit immensely from a
- 12 significant reduction of single-use checkout bag waste and
- 13 resource use for their manufacture and disposal.
- 14 The production of single-use checkout bags also requires
- 15 the consumption and combustion of large quantities of fossil
- 16 fuels, trees, and water. While plastic bags require large
- 17 amounts of crude oil to produce, production of paper bags can
- 18 use twenty times as much fresh water and four times as much
- 19 energy than plastic bags. In the United States alone, over
- 20 fourteen million trees are used to create paper bags, causing
- 21 significant greenhouse gas emissions by removing forests that
- 22 absorb large quantities of carbon dioxide. Disposing both paper



- 1 and plastic bags by burning further increases greenhouse gas
- 2 emissions.
- 3 The legislature further finds that protecting Hawaii's
- 4 forests from damage from invasive species helps to mitigate the
- 5 climate change caused by the production and disposal of single-
- 6 use checkout bags. The intergovernmental panel on climate
- 7 change considers reducing or preventing deforestation as the
- 8 climate mitigation option with the largest and most immediate
- 9 carbon stock impact in the short term.
- 10 Forest protection also increases Hawaii's resilience to the
- 11 likely effects of climate change caused by burning fossil fuels
- 12 worldwide. Major consequences of climate change for Hawaii's
- 13 water supplies are predicted, including drought from higher
- 14 temperatures, reduced rainfall, and rising sea levels salting
- 15 coastal freshwater aquifers. Climate change may also result in
- 16 severe storm events, causing flooding and erosion. Through Act
- 17 152, Session Laws of Hawaii 2000, the legislature recognized
- 18 that fresh water is not an infinite resource and its high
- 19 quality, quantity, and sustainability depend upon forested
- 20 watersheds. Hawaii's forests significantly increase water
- 21 capture and break the impact of heavy rains, reducing flooding
- 22 and erosion and siltation of reefs and fisheries. Protecting



- 1 watersheds is crucial for Hawaii's resiliency to climate change
- 2 by ensuring water availability and buffering severe storm
- 3 events.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to reduce the adverse impact of
- 5 single-use checkout bag waste on Hawaii's precious and unique
- 6 natural environment by establishing an offset fee for the
- 7 distribution of single-use checkout bags and funding programs to
- 8 mitigate against damaging effects of single-use checkout bags,
- 9 thereby improving water quality and resilience to climate
- 10 change.
- 11 SECTION 2. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 13 to read as follows:
- 14 "PART . SINGLE-USE CHECKOUT BAG FEE
- 15 §342H-A Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
- 16 context otherwise requires:
- 17 "Business" means any commercial enterprise or
- 18 establishment, including sole proprietorships, joint ventures,
- 19 partnerships, corporations, or any other legally cognizable
- 20 entity, whether for profit or not for profit, and includes all
- 21 employees of the business; provided that food donation

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organizations shall not be considered a business for purposes of 1 2 this part. 3 "Mil" means one thousandth of one inch. 4 "Proprietary information" means business information 5 covered by any of the exceptions to public disclosure under 6 chapter 92F. "Reusable bag" means a bag with handles that is 7 8 specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is 9 made of: **10** (1) Cloth or other machine-washable fabric; or (2) Durable material suitable for reuse, including plastic 11 12 that is at least 2.25 mils thick. 13 "Single-use checkout bag": 14 Means a bag made of plastic that is less than 2.25 (1)mils thick, or a paper package or sack, whether 15 16 recyclable or non-recyclable, that is provided by a 17 business to a customer and is designed for one-time use to contain and transport merchandise; and 18 19 (2) Does not include: Bags used by customers of a business to package 20 (A) 21 loose items, such as fruits, vegetables, nuts,

grains, candies, or small hardware items;

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1	(B)	Bags used to contain or wrap frozen foods, meat
2		or fish, flowers or potted plants, or other items
3		to contain dampness;
4	(C)	Bags used to protect or transport prepared foods
5		or bakery goods;
6	(D)	Bags provided by pharmacists to contain
7		prescription medications;
8	(E)	Newspaper bags for home newspaper delivery;
9	(F)	Door-hanger bags;
10	(G)	Laundry, dry cleaning, or garment bags, including
11		bags provided by hotels to guests to contain wet
12		or dirty clothing;
13	(H)	Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags
14		intended for use as garbage, pet waste, or yard
15		waste bags;
16	(I)	Bags used to contain live animals, such as fish
17		or insects sold in pet stores;
18	(J)	Bags used to transport chemical pesticides,
19		drain-cleaning chemicals, or other caustic
20		chemicals sold at the retail level; provided that
21		this exemption shall be limited to one bag per
22		customer per transaction or sale; or

1	(1	K) Bags provided to customers by a business to
2		package loose-lid beverages, including fountain
3		drinks, coffee, or other beverages served in a
4		disposable container with a separate lid;
5		provided that the beverage is prepared in or by
6		and purchased from that business.
7	"Small	business" means a business that grossed \$500,000 or
8	less in reve	enues in the previous year.
9	§342H-	B Distribution of single-use checkout bags; fee.
10	(a) Beginn	ing January 1, 2014, all businesses in the State
11	shall charge	e and collect a fee of cents for each single-
12	use checkou	t bag that is provided to customers; provided that:

  7 charged.
- 8 (c) Nothing in this part shall preclude businesses from9 making reusable bags available for sale to customers.
- (d) Of the fees collected pursuant to subsection (a), a

  11 business may retain up to twenty per cent from January 1, 2014,

  12 to December 31, 2015, and ten per cent from January 1, 2016, and

  13 thereafter, to reimburse the business for the costs of

  14 implementing this part; provided that all fees retained shall be

  15 subject to chapters 235 and 237. Any taxes imposed on the fees
- 17 (e) Businesses subject to the requirements of this part
  18 shall conduct educational outreach to their customers regarding
  19 the single-use checkout bag fee program.

\$342H-C Remittance of fees. (a) No later than the last day of each month, each business subject to the requirements of this part shall remit to the department the fees collected

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- 1 pursuant to section 342H-B(a), less the amount retained pursuant
- 2 to section 342H-B(d), during the immediately preceding month;
- 3 provided that a small business may remit the fees on a quarterly
- 4 basis on the last day of the month following the end of a
- 5 quarter.
- 6 (b) Payments and receipts of fees shall be reported on
- 7 forms prescribed by the director. Any proprietary information
- 8 obtained by the department shall be kept confidential and shall
- 9 not be disclosed to any other person.
- 10 (c) Businesses may be subject to penalties and interest
- 11 for late or underpaid fees.
- 12 (d) The department shall deposit all fees collected under
- 13 this part into a special account in the environmental management
- 14 special fund established by section 342G-63; provided that of
- 15 the fees deposited:
- 16 (1) The first \$ per year shall be expended by the
- department for administrative, education, audit,
- 18 compliance, and enforcement activities associated with
- 19 collection of the single-use checkout bag fee; and
- 20 (2) Any remaining balance shall be distributed as follows:
- 21 (A) per cent shall be deposited into the
- 22 environmental response revolving fund established

1	under section 128D-2, to be expended by the
2	department; and
3	(B) per cent shall be deposited into the natural
4	area reserve fund established under section 195-
5	9, to be expended by the department of land and
6	natural resources for watershed protection;
7	watershed restoration, including removal of
8	invasive species; and watershed acquisition.
9	§342H-D Violations. (a) It shall be a violation of this
10	part for any business that is subject to the requirements of
11	this part to pay or otherwise reimburse a customer for any
12	portion of the fee required to be charged and collected pursuant
13	to section 342H-B.
14	(b) Violations of this part or any rule adopted pursuant
15	to this part shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1,000
16	for each violation.
17	§342H-E Injunctive and other relief. The director may
18	institute a civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction
19	for injunctive and other relief to correct or abate violation of
20	this part or any rule adopted pursuant to this part, to collect
21	administrative penalties, or to obtain other relief.

13	§342H-I Rules. The director shall adopt rules, pursuant
14	to chapter 91, as may be necessary for the purposes of this
15	part.
16	§342H-J Annual report. The department shall submit to the
17	legislature an annual report, no later than twenty days prior to
18	the convening of each regular session, which shall include the
19	department's efforts to effectuate this part, the number of
20	single-use bags distributed by businesses, the statewide
21	reduction rate in the number of single-use bags distributed, and

1	any recom	mended policy changes needed to better effectuate the
2	purpose o	f this part."
3	SECT	ION 3. Section 342G-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended b	y amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
5	"(b)	All moneys collected pursuant to section 342G-62 and
6	remitted	pursuant to section 342H-C(d) shall be deposited into
7	the envir	onmental management special fund. All interest earned
8	or accrue	d on moneys deposited into the fund shall become a part
9	of the fu	nd.
10	(c)	The department shall expend moneys contained in the
11	environme	ntal management special fund to:
12	(1)	Partially fund the operating costs of the program
13		including its regulatory functions and the development
14		of waste reduction and diversion activities as
15		mandated by chapter 342G;
16	(2)	Fund statewide education, demonstration, and market
17		development programs, through direct contract or
18		direct transfer of funds to the counties and the
19		department of business, economic development, and
20		tourism, or under a grant program that may be

12	SECT	ION 4. No later than March 31, 2014, each business, as

15	use checkout bag fee shall submit to the department of health a	
16	one-time report listing the number of single-use checkout bags	
17	and reusa	ble bags provided to customers by that business for the
18	2013 cale	ndar year.
19	SECT	ION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
20	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
21	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 for

- 1 initiating and administering all components of the single-use
- 2 checkout bag fee program.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 health for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 6. If any provision of this Act, or the
- 6 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
- 7 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
- 8 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
- 9 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 10 of this Act are severable.
- 11 SECTION 7. Nothing in this Act shall be interpreted or
- 12 applied so as to create any requirement, power, or duty in
- 13 conflict with any federal or state law.
- 14 SECTION 8. The revisor of statutes shall insert the
- 15 effective date of this Act in section 342H-B(a)(2) in section 2
- 16 of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 9. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 18 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 19 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 20 the new sections in this Act.
- 21 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 22 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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1 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2112.
