HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES TWENTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE, 2013 STATE OF HAWAII

H.B. NO. 797

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. This Act shall be known as the Safe Schools
 Act.

Ż SECTION 2. The legislature finds that all students have 4 the right to fully participate in the educational process free 5 from bullying, cyberbullying, and harassment. A safe and civil 6 environment in school is necessary for students to learn and to 7 meet high academic standards. Bullying, cyberbullying, and 8 harassment, like other disruptive or violent behaviors, inhibit 9 a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate 10 students in a safe environment. It is imperative that all 11 schools in the State establish and maintain clear and consistent 12 policies and procedures to address such behavior. In addition, 13 because students learn by example, school administrators, 14 faculty, staff, parents, guardians, and volunteers should be 15 expected to demonstrate appropriate behavior, treat others with 16 civility and respect, and refuse to tolerate bullying and 17 harassment.



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1	The purpose of this Act, therefore, is to require the
2	department of education, public charter school governing boards,
3	and private schools to establish, maintain, monitor, and enforce
4	policies and procedures related to all forms of bullying,
5	cyberbullying, and harassment to protect students in the State.
6	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
8	designated and to read as follows:
9	" <u>§302A-A</u> Bullying, cyberbullying, and harassment;
10	departmental responsibilities. (a) This section shall apply to
11	conduct or communication occurring on all public elementary and
12	secondary school premises, at any public school-sponsored
13	function or activity, and on public school-sponsored
14	transportation. This section also applies to electronic
15	technology usage and electronic communications that occur on all
16	public elementary and secondary school premises, at any public
