A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sexuality health

2 education promotes healthy attitudes on adolescent growth and

3 development, body image, gender and sexuality, dating,

4 relationships, and family. The legislature further finds that

5 sexuality health education should positively affect adolescent

6 behavior and provide teens with the information, skills, and

7 support they need to develop positive values, make healthy

8 decisions, and respect the important role that sexuality plays

9 throughout a person's life. In the past three years, several

10 states, including Hawaii, have enacted laws that require school

11 districts that teach sexuality health education to include age

12 appropriate, medically accurate health education. The

13 legislature finds, however, that the effectiveness of sexuality

14 health education in Hawaii's schools could be bolstered by

15 providing clearer guidance on a comprehensive approach to

16 sexuality health education, greater flexibility in the

17 implementation of the curricula, and greater public access to

18 the curricula.

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1	The	purpose of this Act, therefore, is to:	
2	(1)	Specify additional elements to include in Hawaii's	
3		existing sexuality health education law;	
4	(2)	Require the department of education to provide	
5		information on the curricula to the public; and	
6	(3)	Allow parents to request that their children not	
7		receive the sexuality health education provided	
8		pursuant to Hawaii's sexuality health education law.	
9	SECT	ION 2. Section 321-11.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
10	amended to read as follows:		
11	" [+]	§321-11.1[] Medically accurate sexuality health	
12	education	. (a) Sexuality health education programs funded by	
13	the State	shall provide medically accurate and factual	
14	information that $[is]$:		
15	(1)	<u>Is</u> age appropriate [and includes];	
16	(2)	Includes education on abstinence, contraception, and	
17		methods of disease prevention to prevent unintended	
18		pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease, including	
19		human immunodeficiency virus[+];	
20	(3)	Helps students develop relationships and communication	
21		skills to form healthy relationships that are based on	

1		mutual respect and affection and free from violence,
2		coercion, and intimidation;
3	(4)	Helps students develop skills in critical thinking,
4		problem solving, decision making, and stress
5		management to make healthy decisions about sexuality
6		and relationships; and
7	(5)	Encourages students to communicate with their parents,
8		guardians, and other trusted adults about sexuality
9		and intimate relations.
10	(b)	At their own discretion, teachers may answer in good
11	faith any	question initiated by a student or students that is
12	reasonabl	y related to and consistent with the material of a
13	course provided pursuant to subsection (a).	
14	<u>(c)</u>	The department of education may eliminate or modify
15	component	s of instruction under subsection (a)(2) in elementary
16	school for reasons of age appropriateness.	
17	<u>(d)</u>	Sexuality health education under subsection (a) shall
18	not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, ethnicity, national	
19	origin, disability, religion, sexual orientation, or gender	
20	identity.	·
21	<u>(e)</u>	The department of education shall develop, maintain,
22	and make	available to the public a current list of sexuality
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- 1 health education curricula that are consistent with the
- 2 requirements under subsection (a).
- 3 (f) A student shall be excused from any part of the
- 4 instruction provided pursuant to this section only upon the
- 5 written request of the student's parent or legal guardian. A
- 6 student may not be subject to disciplinary action, academic
- 7 penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent or legal
- 8 guardian requests that the student not receive the instruction
- 9 provided under this section.
- 10 (q) The department of education shall establish minimum
- 11 education and training qualifications for sexuality health
- 12 education teachers.
- 13 [\(\frac{(b)}{}\)] (h) For the purposes of this section:
- "Age appropriate" means suitable to a particular age or age
- 15 group based on developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral
- 16 capacity typical for that age or age group.
- 17 "Factual information" means medical, psychiatric,
- 18 psychological, empirical, or statistical information that is
- 19 verified or supported by research conducted by recognized
- 20 medical, psychiatric, psychological, and public health
- 21 professionals or organizations.

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- 1 "Medically accurate" means verified or supported by
- 2 research conducted in compliance with accepted scientific
- 3 methods and recognized as accurate and objective by professional
- 4 organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field,
- 5 such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
- 6 the American Public Health Association, the American Academy of
- 7 Pediatrics, and the American College of Obstetricians and
- 8 Gynecologists.
- 9 "Sexuality health education" means education in any medium
- 10 regarding human development and sexuality, including education
- 11 on pregnancy, family planning, and sexually transmitted
- 12 diseases."
- 13 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
