A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The cost of feed for livestock production in 2 Hawaii can constitute up to seventy per cent of total production 3 costs, whereas feed costs for mainland producers amount to 4 nearly fifty per cent of total production costs. In 2007, there 5 were five dairies and six egg farms of significant size in 6 Hawaii, with combined gross annual revenues of \$26,400,000. 7 Currently, there are only two dairies and four egg farms of 8 significant size, with combined gross annual revenues of
- 9 \$16,250,000. Since 2007, two dairies and four egg farms have
- 10 gone out of business, primarily due to the rising cost of feed
- 11 for livestock animals and the resulting increases in production
- 12 costs. Since October 2010, the cost of poultry feed alone has
- 13 increased approximately \$60 per ton and is expected to rise even
- 14 further.
- 15 Currently, one dairy and the four remaining egg farms are
- 16 threatened by closure. Such closures heighten the State's
- 17 dependence on imported foods and threaten the State's food
- 18 security and ability to achieve adequate levels of agricultural



- 1 self-sufficiency. Self-sufficiency is critical to Hawaii's food
- 2 security and its ability to respond effectively in the event of
- 3 natural disasters or disruptions in transportation.
- 4 The closure of local dairies and poultry farms also means
- 5 that children and adults throughout the State will no longer
- 6 have the option of selecting fresh, locally produced milk and
- 7 eggs. Consumers have often expressed interest in obtaining
- 8 locally produced milk but, unfortunately, the dairies do not
- 9 produce enough milk to meet consumer demand. The public has
- 10 expressed a similar interest in island-fresh beef, pork, sheep,
- 11 lamb, chicken, eggs, and seafood.
- 12 Locally produced fresh beef, milk, pork, lamb, chicken,
- 13 eggs, and seafood provide essential nutrition to consumers.
- 14 Transport times from offshore farms to Hawaii consumers create a
- 15 greater risk of food spoilage and resultant food-borne illnesses
- 16 due to the highly perishable nature of these products. Without
- 17 these local agricultural businesses, all beef, milk, pork, lamb,
- 18 chicken, and eggs would have to be imported into the State,
- 19 requiring up to ten days of shipping before being sold to
- 20 consumers. This increased shipping time reduces the expected
- 21 shelf life of fresh milk and eggs in particular.



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1 The purpose of this Act is to provide funds to allow 2 qualified beef cattle, dairy, hog, poultry, goat, sheep, fish, 3 and crustacean farms to apply for and receive a reimbursement 4 for a percentage of each farm's feed expenses. With financial 5 support, the livestock industry will be able to continue to make 6 investments in modern equipment, expand and improve herds and 7 flocks, and develop new markets and products. This financial support will serve a public purpose by enabling the livestock 8 9 industry to stabilize its operations, thereby contributing to 10 food security and increasing the competitiveness of the local 11 livestock industry with mainland suppliers. SECTION 2. Section 155D-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 13 amended by amending the definitions of "milk" and "qualified 14 producer" to read as follows: 15 ""Milk" means the lacteal secretion, practically free from 16 colostrums, obtained by the milking of healthy cows or goats 17 normally produced or marketed through the channels of the fluid 18 milk trade[-] or for further processing into milk products. "Qualified producer" means any person that at the time of 19 20 application for and disbursement of funds under this chapter is 21 in the business of producing:

1	(T)	Milk from a nerd, located in Hawaii, of not less than
2		three hundred fifty cows[+] or twenty-five lactating
3		<pre>milking goats;</pre>
4	(2)	Poultry products from a flock, raised and located in
5		Hawaii, of not less than three thousand birds;
6	(3)	Pork from a herd, raised and located in Hawaii, of not
7		less than fifty sows; [or]
8	(4)	Beef[-] that is grown, slaughtered, processed, and
9		marketed in Hawaii. Producers who finish at least one
10		hundred head of beef cattle annually shall be eligible
11		for this program[-];
12	<u>(5)</u>	Sheep or lamb that are grown, slaughtered, processed,
13		and marketed in Hawaii, with current annual sales of
14		not fewer than thirty sheep or lambs; or
15	<u>(6)</u>	Fish or crustaceans, with current annual sales of not
16		less than two thousand pounds."
17	SECT	ION 3. Section 155D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended by	y amending subsections (a), (b), and (c) to read as
19	follows:	
20	"(a)	Applications for grants by qualified producers shall
21	be submit	ted [+]on[+] a form furnished by the department and

1	shall be	filed with accompanying documentation of animal feed
2	costs; pr	ovided that:
3	(1)	The applicant shall comply with applicable federal and
4		state laws prohibiting discrimination against any
5		person on the basis of race, color, national origin,
6		religion, creed, sex, age, sexual orientation, or
7		disability;
8	(2)	The applicant shall have applied for or received all
9		applicable licenses or permits;
10	(3)	The applicant shall indemnify and hold harmless the
11		State and its officers, agents, and employees from all
12		claims arising out of or resulting from the feed
13		purchased;
[4	(4)	The subsidy shall not be allowed within a fiscal
. 5		quarter if the flock or herd size or, in the case of
16		fish or crustaceans, sale weight, falls five per cent
17		or more below the required minimum of:
18		(A) Three thousand birds;
9		(B) Three hundred fifty cows;
20		(C) Fifty sows in any two months of the applicable
21		fiscal quarter; [or]
22		(D) One hundred finished beef cattle annually:

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1	(E) Twenty-five lactating milking goats; or
2	(F) Sales of five hundred pounds of fish or
3	crustaceans in the applicable fiscal quarter;
4	(5) The grant shall not exceed a total of \$250,000 per
5	qualified producer per year; and
6	(6) The department may request an applicant to provide
7	necessary information for the purposes of verifying
8	flock or herd size or sale weight, as applicable, and
9	feed purchases.
10	(b) Documentation of animal feed costs, as requested by
11	the department, shall be filed for feed purchased within the
12	immediate preceding fiscal quarter of filing and shall be
13	effective for feed costs incurred after July 1, $[\frac{2007.}{2007.}]$
14	(c) The applicant shall submit a quarterly financial
15	statement of farm revenues and expenses along with other
16	supporting documents as deemed necessary by the department, and
17	filed with the documentation of the feed costs. An annual
18	financial statement shall be filed with the department within
19	ninety days following the close of the business' fiscal year
20	after June 28, $[\frac{2007}{}]$ $\underline{2013}$ for final reconciliation of any
21	reimbursement paid during the previous three quarters within the
22	fiscal year. The financial statements shall be certified as
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- 1 accurate by the applicant and the preparer of the financial
- 2 statement on forms prepared by the department."
- 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$3,000,000 or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the
- 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 7 2014-2015 for the agricultural development division of the
- 8 department of agriculture to:
- 9 (1) Reimburse qualified producers of milk, pork, eggs,
- 10 poultry, beef, lamb, and seafood, for the cost of feed
- for beef cattle, dairy cows or goats, sheep, hogs,
- fish, crustaceans, and poultry; and
- 13 (2) Provide funding for the administrative costs of the
- 14 livestock revitalization program.
- The appropriations made for the purposes authorized under
- 16 this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for
- 17 which the appropriations are made; provided that any balance of
- 18 any appropriation that is not encumbered as of June 30, 2016,
- 19 shall lapse as of that date.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 21 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.

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- 1 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
