### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MILITARY PERSONNEL AND THEIR FAMILIES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. According to the Defense Manpower Data Center, 1 2 a total of 113,317 service members and their dependents live in 3 Hawaii and comprise about 8.2 per cent of Hawaii's population, according to the 2011 Census Bureau estimate. An economic 4 5 report produced by The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii indicates that total spending by the armed services in Hawaii was 6 \$6,500,000,000 in 2009, which resulted in direct and indirect 7 8 impacts exceeding \$12,200,000,000 to Hawaii's economy, and accounted for more than 101,000 jobs and a reported 9 10 \$3,500,000,000 in household earnings.

11 Thousands of military families move to Hawaii every year, 12 and though Hawaii is part of the United States, the transition 13 to settle in and find a home, enroll children in school, and 14 care for and transport pets is significantly harder in Hawaii 15 than relocating within the continental United States. On some 16 levels, it is as complex as moving overseas to a foreign country. especially when spousal employment is considered. Many of these
 issues can be addressed with a robust and universal information
 center. However, this would just be the first step of
 transitioning into a new place. Immersion and educational
 programs would strengthen and provide longevity to the military
 relocation process.

7 It is evident that the military and their family members play a vital role in Hawaii's economy and compose a significant 8 percentage of its population. It would be in the best interest 9 10 of Hawaii and the United States Department of Defense to ensure 11 that armed service members not only have a seamless relocation and transition to Hawaii, but also have a way in which to 12 integrate and connect into the community. No such pathway now 13 14 exists. Currently, service branches located on Oahu retain their own informational and support channels for members 15 relocating to Hawaii. This ad hoc system is disjointed and 16 inefficient for the military members and their families. 17 The purpose of this Act is to create a center for 18

19 transition, immersion, and education that will act as a 20 stepping-stone for both military members and their families 21 transitioning to Hawaii, and for Hawaii residents to better 22 understand and engage with military members in the State. The

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1	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
. 3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
4	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
5	year 2014-2015 for the creation of a center for transition,
6	immersion, and education for military members and their
7	families; provided that no funds shall be made available under
8	this Act unless the federal Department of Defense provides
9	matching funds for the purpose for which these sums are
10	appropriated.
11	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
12	of defense for the purposes of this Act.
13	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2013.

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
