A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELAND SECURITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is an ever 2 increasing possibility of terrorist or other man-made threats to 3 infrastructure critical to national security; local, state, and 4 federal governmental entities; and the stability and security of 5 the citizens of Hawaii. The increasing sophistication of 6 terrorist groups, trans-national criminal organizations, and others who would threaten the peace and security of the State, 7 8 greatly complicates the State's ability to protect its citizens 9 and prevent attacks.

10 The legislature further finds that state departments and 11 agencies are performing many duties and tasks to combat 12 terrorism and support homeland security without underlying 13 statutory authority or enabling legislation.

14 The purpose of this Act is to establish an office of 15 homeland security and support laws to provide a comprehensive 16 program to protect our citizens, infrastructure, and government 17 from terrorism and threat of attack.

1 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 2 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read 3 as follows: 4 "CHAPTER 5 HOMELAND SECURITY 6 S -1 Policy and purpose. (a) Because of the existing 7 and increasing possibility of the occurrence of terrorist 8 attacks of unprecedented size and destructiveness, in order to 9 ensure that the state's preparations will be adequate to deal 10 with such attacks, and generally to protect the public peace, 11 health, and safety, and to preserve the lives and property of 12 the people of the State, it is hereby found and declared to be 13 necessary: 14 To provide for homeland security by the State, and to (1) 15 authorize the creation of local organizations for homeland security in the counties of the State; 16 17 (2) To confer upon the governor the emergency powers 18 provided by this chapter; and 19 (3) To provide programs, in coordination with county 20 agencies, other state and federal agencies, and the 21 private sector, and to educate and train publicly and

privately employed workers and the general public to
 be prepared for attacks.

3 (b) It is further declared to be the purpose of this 4 chapter and the policy of the State that all homeland security functions of the State and its counties be coordinated to the 5 maximum extent with the comparable functions of the federal 6 7 government including its various departments, agencies of other 8 states and localities, and private agencies of every type, to 9 ensure that the most effective preparation and use may be made 10 of the nation's manpower, resources, and facilities for dealing 11 with any attack that may occur.

12 § -2 Definitions. As used in this chapter:
13 "Administrator" means the administrator of homeland
14 security.

15 "Attack" means any attack or series of attacks by anyone 16 causing, or which may cause, damage or injury to persons or 17 property in the United States in any manner by the use of 18 chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, explosive, firearm, 19 cyber, or other weapons or processes; and any form of hostile 20 action.

1 "County" means any of the political subdivisions including 2 the counties of Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai and the city and county 3 of Honolulu, but does not include the county of Kalawao. 4 "Director of homeland security" means the adjutant general, 5 pursuant to section 26-21. "Facilities", except as otherwise provided in this chapter, 6 7 includes buildings and other structures, shelters, land, and 8 appurtenant materials. 9 "Homeland security" means a concerted effort to prevent 10 terrorist attacks within the United States, reduce Hawaii's 11 vulnerability to terrorism and attacks, and minimize the damage 12 and recover from attacks that occur. 13 "Mayor" means the senior elected official of the executive 14 branch of each county. 15 "Necessary" means and refers to such means, measures, or other actions or determinations as are necessary in the opinion 16 17 of the governor or the governor's authorized representative or 18 mayor or mayor's authorized representative. 19 "States" includes the several states of the United States, the District of Columbia, and the possessions and territories of 20

21 the United States.

1 -3 State office of homeland security. (a) S There 2 shall be established within the department of defense an office 3 of homeland security. The director of homeland security shall 4 employ appropriate personnel and make expenditures as may be 5 necessary to carry out this chapter. The director of homeland 6 security shall appoint an administrator of homeland security, 7 who shall be exempt from chapter 76, who shall be subject to 8 removal by the director, and who shall receive compensation as 9 the director may determine.

10 (b) The administrator shall be responsible for formulating
11 and carrying out programs for homeland security. The
12 administrator shall ensure coordination and cooperation between
13 all organizations for homeland security, including county,
14 state, and federal, or private, and shall cooperate with state,
15 county, and federal homeland security and law enforcement
16 agencies.

17 § -4 Homeland security responsibilities. In performing
18 the director's duties under this chapter, the director of
19 homeland security, or the director's authorized representative,
20 may:

(1) Prepare comprehensive plans and programs for homeland
 security and homeland defense; provided that these

.1		plans and programs shall be integrated and coordinated
2		with the plans of the counties and the federal
3		government to the fullest possible extent;
4	(2)	Conduct studies and surveys of the vulnerabilities of
5		critical infrastructure and key resources in this
6		State as may be necessary, and participate in planning
7		for their protection;
8	(3)	Develop and maintain a critical infrastructure list,
9		coordinating the list with the counties, other state
10		agencies, federal agencies, including departments of
11		defense and homeland security, the private sector, and
12		other agencies and organizations as necessary;
13	(4)	Develop and maintain the capability to process
14		security clearance applications for civilian workers
15		of the State and county governments;
16	(5)	Foster coordination on security matters with all
17		nations of the Pacific region, including but not
18		limited to coordinating planning efforts, as
19		appropriate, sponsoring discussions and seminars, and
20		hosting periodic international conferences; and
21	(6)	Solicit and manage funds, including but not limited to
22		grants from the federal government, including managing

1 funds from other divisions in the department of 2 defense and other state agencies, if the director and 3 the other department directors agree, which agreement 4 may include providing personnel support to the office 5 of homeland security.

-5 Local organizations for homeland security. 7 Counties may establish local organizations for homeland 8 security. Counties that do not establish a separate 9 organization for homeland security shall incorporate the 10 responsibilities included in section -4 into the 11 responsibilities of the county civil defense agency."

12 SECTION 3. Section 26-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

14 "(a) The department of defense shall be headed by a single 15 executive to be known as the adjutant general. The adjutant general shall also be the director of civil defense [-] and the 16 17 director of homeland security.

18 There shall be a full-time vice director of civil defense 19 who shall be appointed and may be removed by the director.

20 The department shall be responsible for the defense of the State and its people from mass violence, originating from either 21 human or natural causes. 22

1 The devolution of command of the military forces in the
2 absence of the adjutant general shall be within the military
3 establishment. The devolution of command of the civil defense
4 agency in the absence of the director of civil defense shall be
5 within the civil defense agency."
