HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII ACCESS TO JUSTICE COMMISSION TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO DEVELOP AN EDUCATIONAL LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM FOR WILLIAM S. RICHARDSON SCHOOL OF LAW GRADUATES TO EXPAND OPPORTUNITIES TO PURSUE PUBLIC INTEREST CAREERS IN HAWAII THAT DIRECTLY SERVE UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES.

1 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that there is a significant, 2 and income-based disparity in the ability of Hawaii residents to 3 meaningfully achieve justice in both the civil and criminal 4 courts of the State; and

6 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Supreme Court's Access to Justice 7 Commission, established in 2008 to increase access to justice in 8 civil legal matters for low- and moderate-income residents, 9 found that one of the reasons for the severe disparity among 10 citizens' abilities to access the judicial system is the 11 insufficient number of attorneys choosing to practice public 12 interest law in Hawaii; and

14 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that there are not enough 15 new lawyers that are able to practice public interest law due to 16 accumulated educational debt incurred, the high cost of living 17 in Hawaii, and the low compensation for public interest work 18 compared to other practice areas; and

20 WHEREAS, the legislature further finds that the federal 21 government and 26 other jurisdictions nationwide have loan 22 repayment assistance programs to encourage lawyers to pursue 23 public interest work within their jurisdictions; and 24

25 WHEREAS, there are several available options that could 26 achieve an effective Hawaii-focused loan repayment program, and 27 such a program is necessary to bring similar benefits to the 28 State's underserved communities; and 29



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1 WHEREAS, the William S. Richardson School of Law has served as Hawaii's law school since 1973 and provides an excellent 2 legal education for attorneys pursuing all sectors of law, with 3 an emphasis on public service and public interest law that, 4 5 compared to law school education elsewhere in the United States. provides a relatively low cost and high value legal education 6 7 that allows Hawaii residents the opportunity to pursue a rewarding legal career in-State; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, many students of the William S. Richardson School of Law express a high level of interest in pursuing public 11 12 service careers in Hawaii, including in the State's rural communities, and a loan repayment program would be a substantial 13 factor in enabling Richardson graduates to pursue these careers; 14 15 and 16 WHEREAS, many underserved communities in Hawaii would 17 18 benefit directly from a loan repayment program that supports 19 graduates of the William S. Richardson School of Law pursuing 20 public interest careers; and 21 22 WHEREAS, a successful loan repayment program needs to be 23 crafted carefully to: 24 25 (1)Ensure maximum compatibility with the federal repayment program; 26 27 28 (2) Ensure broad support from law students and graduates, the Judiciary, the Hawaii State Bar Association, and 29 the State's public service providers; 30 31 (3) Be financially sustainable; and 32 33 (4) Include a collection program that provides for 34 appropriate administrative support through the William 35 S. Richardson School of Law, but avoids conflicts of 36 interest with respect to its graduates; now, 37 38 therefore, 39 40 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 41 42 Session of 2014, the Senate concurring, that the Hawaii Access to Justice Commission is requested to convene a working group to 43 44 develop an educational loan repayment program for William S.



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Richardson School of Law graduates to expand opportunities to 1 2 pursue public interest careers in Hawaii for the benefit of 3 underserved communities; and 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group be composed 6 of members of the Hawaii Access to Justice Commission, faculty 7 and staff of the William S. Richardson School of Law, the Student Bar Association of the William S. Richardson School of 8 Law, the Alumni Association of the William S. Richardson School 9 10 of Law, the Hawaii State Bar Association, a retired member of the Hawaii Supreme Court, Hawaii Consortium of Legal Service 11 Providers, Hawaii Justice Foundation, a member of the House of 12 Representatives, a member of the Senate, and a representative of 13 the Governor's Office; and 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 16 17 to: 18 19 (1)Explore alternative methods of encouraging law graduates to pursue public interest careers that 20 provide legal services directly to underserved 21 communities and nonprofit organizations; 22 23 (2) Consider the compatibility of the federal law graduate 24 loan repayment programs with a Hawaii program; 25 26 (3) Consider the establishment of an incubator program for 27 post-graduate apprenticeship to afford practice-ready 28 training for graduates of the William S. Richardson 29 School of Law and to encourage multidisciplinary 30 training of graduates; and 31 32 (4) Draft proposed legislation or alternative measures, if 33 needed, to implement such programs; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the working 36 37 group should not be considered state employees based solely upon 38 their participation in the working group; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested to submit a final report of the working group's findings and 41 42 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 43 Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015; and 44



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 1 2 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, members of the Hawaii 3 4 Access to Justice Commission, the Dean of the William S. 5 Richardson School of Law, the President of the Student Bar Association of the William S. Richardson School of Law, the 6 President of the Alumni Association of the William S. Richardson 7 School of Law, the Executive Director of the Hawaii State Bar 8 9 Association, members of the Hawaii Consortium of Legal Service Providers, and the Commissioners of the Hawaii Justice 10 Foundation. 11
