HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO CONVENE AN ANTI-GRAFFITI TASK FORCE COMPOSED OF REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE PRIVATE AND PUBLIC SECTORS TO DEVELOP RECOMMENDATIONS THAT ADDRESS EDUCATION AND PREVENTION, ENFORCEMENT, COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT, LEGISLATION, AND GRAFFITI REMOVAL.

WHEREAS, graffiti vandalism has grown from an exclusively 1 2 big city or urban concern to a problem that affects all communities; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, graffiti vandals have caused more than \$1,000,000,000 of damage on public and private property 6 nationwide; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, in Hawaii, graffiti vandals are elusive and city 10 and county police generally apprehend individuals suspected of graffiti only when they stake out a specific area or, more 11 commonly, when a witness calls 911; and 12 13 WHEREAS, graffiti vandals may use social media to showcase 14 their acts of vandalism to a nationwide audience, which has led 15 to a recent increase of graffiti vandalism in Hawaii, according 16 to a Department of Public Safety official; and 17 18 WHEREAS, while anti-graffiti legislation should be one part 19 of Hawaii's comprehensive approach to eradicating or containing 20 the problem of graffiti vandalism, other elements should include 21 education and prevention, enforcement, community involvement, 22 23 and graffiti removal; now, therefore, 24 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 25 Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 26 Session of 2014, that the Department of Public Safety is 27 requested to convene an anti-graffiti task force to develop 28 recommendations that address education and prevention, 29 enforcement, community involvement, legislation, and graffiti 30 removal; and 31

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4 5 (5) Developing legislation to assist law enforcement and judicial agencies in reducing graffiti vandalism; 6 7 (6) Partnering with communities to establish graffiti 8 hotlines and graffiti removal teams; and 9 10 (7) Determining the amount spent on graffiti removal at 11 schools and public spaces; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 14 15 submit a report, authored by the Department of Public Safety with consultation from representatives of the retail industry 16 and community graffiti clean-up groups, that addresses the 17 problem of graffiti vandalism in Hawaii, and provides findings 18 19 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 20 Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015; and 21 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Public Safety; 24 Attorney General; Superintendent of Education; Executive 25 Director of the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts; 26 President of the Senate; Speaker of the House of 27 28 Representatives; Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court; the police chiefs of the Hawaii Police Department, Honolulu Police 29 Department, Kauai Police Department, and Maui Police Department; 30 and the chairperson of the Board of Directors of the Retail 31 Merchants of Hawaii. 32 33
