HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO REPORT ON THE STATUS OF SEXUALITY HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND THE FEASIBILITY OF DEVELOPING A UNIFORM, MANDATORY SEXUALITY HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAM FOR ALL PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, under the Hawaii State Constitution, the State 1 2 shall provide for the establishment, support, and control of a statewide system of public schools free from sectarian control, 3 4 a state university, public libraries, and such other 5 institutions as may be deemed desirable, including physical 6 facilities therefor; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the mission of the Board of Education is to 9 promote excellence and equity in Hawaii's public schools and enable all students to meet their own unique and varied 10 potentials; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the mission of the Department of Education is to 13 serve the community by developing the academic achievement, 14 character, and social-emotional well-being of students to the 15 16 fullest potential and to work with partners, families, and communities to ensure that all students reach their aspirations 17 from early learning through college, career, and citizenship; 18 19 and 20 21 WHEREAS, section 321-11.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires state-funded sexuality health education to be medically 22 23 accurate and age appropriate, and include education on abstinence, contraception, and methods of disease and pregnancy 24 prevention; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, Hawaii's teen pregnancy rate is the twelfth highest in the nation; and 28 29 WHEREAS, teen childbearing costs Hawaii taxpayers 30 \$37,000,000 per year, seventy-one percent of which are state and 31 32 local costs; and 33 2014-0319 HR SMA.doc

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WHEREAS, Hawaii has historically high rates of teen 1 pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, such as chlamydia; 2 3 and 4 5 WHEREAS, Hawaii's high school students report the lowest percentage of condom use of any state in the nation; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, according to the Hawaii Adolescent Reproductive 9 Health Survey of 2012, a survey of community attitudes toward 10 sexuality health education in Hawaii, ninety-seven percent of 11 survey participants reported that it was important or very important to have sexuality health education as part of the 12 school's curriculum; and 13 14 WHEREAS, education is key to reducing the number of cases 15 16 of sexually transmitted disease and the number of teen pregnancies and to building stronger families and a healthier 17 future; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Legislature to utilize all available information to determine how to ensure that the youth 21 22 of Hawaii have the skills and tools necessary to make healthy and responsible decisions with regard to their sexual and 23 24 reproductive health, through programs in the public school system or through other means; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 27 Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 28 29 Session of 2014, that the Board of Education and Department of Education are requested to report to the Legislature on the 30 status of sex education programs in public schools and the 31 32 feasibility of developing a uniform, mandatory sexuality health education program for all public school students that meets the 33 requirements of section 321-11.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education and 36 37 Department of Education are requested to determine the following: 38 39 Feasibility of including, as part of the Department of 40 (1)Education's sexuality health education program, 41 social-emotional issues relating to sexuality, 42 including the development of: 43 44 2014-0319 HR SMA.doc
