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1 2 WHEREAS, the introduction of measures like these and the continued reports of abuse against animals demonstrates that a 3 4 review of current state laws on animal cruelty is timely and 5 appropriate and that there is a need for comprehensive legislation regarding animal cruelty to address the concerns of 6 the community; now, therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 10 Session of 2014, that the Governor is requested to establish the 11 Task Force on the Humane Treatment of Animals (Task Force) to 12 review and examine Hawaii's animal cruelty laws; and 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the membership of the Task 15 16 Force consist of the following members to serve at the request of the Governor: 17 18 19 (1)Individuals recommended by the prosecutor's office of each county; 20 21 (2)One member with law enforcement experience 22 specifically dealing with animal cruelty cases; 23 24 25 (3) One member from the Office of the Public Defender; 26 (4) One member from the field of veterinary medicine; 27 28 29 (5) One member from a national animal advocacy organization; 30 31 (6) One member from an animal advocacy organization that 32 provides emergency response to cases of animal cruelty 33 involving dogs, such as K9 Kokua; 34 35 (7)One member from an animal advocacy organization that 36 37 provides emergency response to animal cruelty cases involving cats; 38 39



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(8) One member from an animal advocacy organization that 1 provides emergency response to animal cruelty cases 2 3 involving horses and livestock; 4 (9) One member from an animal advocacy organization that 5 provides emergency response to animal cruelty cases 6 7 involving monk seals; 8 (10) One member from an animal advocacy organization that 9 provides emergency response to animal cruelty cases involving birds; and 10 11 (11)Two members of the public; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed 15 legislation, to the Legislature no later than 20 days prior to 16 the convening of the Regular Session of 2015; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force include in its 20 report: 21 (1) An examination of current animal cruelty laws, 22 particularly as they relate to animal abandonment, the 23 establishment of a registry of persons convicted of 24 felony animal abuse, and the treatment of dead 25 companion animals; 26 27 (2) Issues identified and solutions proposed for the 28 29 enforcement of any proposed legislation; and 30 Any dissenting opinions among Task Force members to 31 (3) 32 any proposed legislation; and 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judiciary provide 34 35 administrative assistance to the Task Force; and

Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Administrative
Director of the Courts, Prosecutor of each county, and Public
Defender.

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
