A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that falls and fall related injuries among the elderly impact individuals, families,
 the community, and the State's health care system. Fall
 prevention is a major concern for the safety and well-being of
 the State's elderly residents, the fastest growing segment of
 Hawaii's population.

7 Falls are the leading cause of fatal injuries, an average 8 of forty-four per cent, and injury-related hospitalizations, an 9 average of eighty-three per cent, among the elderly in Hawaii. 10 On average, every five hours in Hawaii an elderly person is 11 injured so severely in a fall that hospitalization is necessary. 12 Falls among Hawaii's elderly also result in a yearly average of 13 eighty-two deaths and nearly one thousand eight hundred hospitalizations. 14

15 The legislature further finds that hospital costs 16 associated with fall-related injuries average over \$65,000,000 17 each year. This total cost does not include the additional 18 significant costs associated with skilled nursing care and



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rehabilitation. Among Hawaii seniors hospitalized for a fall,
 forty-three per cent are discharged to skilled nursing
 facilities for additional care, and twelve per cent are moved to
 rehabilitation facilities.

5 The legislature additionally finds that access to fall 6 prevention services and programs would significantly reduce 7 these costs. In addition, the early detection of fall 8 occurrences would reduce both costs and suffering by expediting 9 treatment, minimizing serious long-term consequences, reducing 10 the extent of the injury, and in some instances, avoiding death. 11 Though falls among the elderly are a significant public 12 health issue, currently, there are insufficient resources to 13 develop a coordinated statewide approach to reduce and promptly 14 detect falls among the elderly. The legislature therefore finds 15 that the department of health's emergency medical services and 16 injury prevention system branch should be required to establish 17 and maintain a program dedicated to fall prevention and early detection for the elderly. This program shall serve as a focal 18 19 point for statewide injury prevention and detection efforts to 20 ensure multidisciplinary support, coordination of prevention and detection efforts, and continuity of implementation and 21 22 accountability.



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The purpose of this Act is to require the department of
 health's emergency medical services and injury prevention system
 branch to establish and maintain a statewide fall prevention and
 early detection program and to make an appropriation for this
 program.

6 SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7 amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
8 designated and to read as follows:

9 "§321- Fall prevention and early detection program. (a) 10 The department of health shall establish and maintain, within 11 the emergency medical services and injury prevention system 12 branch, a fall prevention and early detection program to serve 13 as a focal point for statewide injury prevention and detection 14 efforts. The department may dedicate a position to fall 15 prevention and early detection in support of this program. 16 (b) The statewide fall prevention and early detection 17 program shall develop a statewide approach to falls among the 18 elderly by: 19 Investigating and examining the immediate and long-(1) 20 term dangers of fall injuries on the elderly; 21 (2) Examining the fiscal impact of falls by the elderly on 22 the State's medical system and health care costs;



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1	<u>(3)</u>	Recommending appropriate interventions and prevention
2		programs to reduce falls by the elderly;
3	(4)	Investigating and implementing the most effective
4		means to enhance public awareness that falls are
5		preventable;
6	(5)	Reviewing and developing the potential for increasing
7		for the elderly and their caregivers, on a statewide
8		basis, the availability and accessibility of fall
9		prevention programs that effectively use community
10		resources;
11	(6)	Recommending measures that will promote early
12		detection of falls, particularly for those who live
13		alone or in circumstances where the likelihood of not
14		being discovered soon after a fall is great; and
15	<u>(7)</u>	Investigating and recommending the best way to expand
16		the role of medical and health care professionals in
17		screening, educating, and referring the elderly to
18		fall prevention and early detection services and
19		programs.
20	For	purposes of this subsection, the statewide fall
21	preventio	n and early detection program shall collaborate with
22	intereste	d stakeholders, including health care facilities,
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1	community coalitions, government agencies, and organizations
2	concerned with protecting the elderly and preventing and
3	detecting elderly falls.
4	(c) The department shall submit a report to the
5	legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
6	each regular session, beginning with the regular session of
7	2015, on the statewide fall prevention and early detection
8	program, describing the progress made in implementing subsection
9	(b), including the review of fall prevention data and the impact
10	of falls by the elderly on the State's medical system and health
11	care costs.
12	(d) For the purposes of this section, "the elderly" means
13	persons who are age sixty-five or older."
14	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
15	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
16	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and
17	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
18	year 2014-2015 for the department of health's emergency medical
19	services and injury prevention system branch to establish and
20	maintain a statewide fall prevention and early detection
21	program.



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1	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department			
2	of health for the purposes of this Act.			
3	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.			
4	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
