# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to establish a 2 statewide early childhood education program consisting of 3 providers of high-quality early childhood education, delivered 4 in either of Hawaii's two official languages, to assist families 5 in establishing a solid foundation for success in school so that 6 children graduate from high school prepared for college and a 7 career; provided that Senate Bill No. 1084, introduced in the regular session of 2013, which amends article X, section 1, of 8 9 the Hawaii state constitution, to permit the appropriation of 10 public funds for private early childhood education programs, is 11 enacted and ratified.

Significant research affirms the positive effects of highquality early childhood education programs on the physical, cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional outcomes of young children.

16 For example, early childhood education is one way to reduce 17 high-school dropout rates. A report released by the Annie E. 18 Casey Foundation, released in 2011 and updated in 2012, found SB1095 HD2 HMS 2013-3222 Page 2

1 that students who do not read proficiently by third grade are 2 four times more likely to drop out of school without a diploma, 3 when compared to their counterparts who are proficient readers. 4 The number increases when those students come from low-income 5 families. After third grade, students use their reading skills 6 to learn other subjects, and students who do not have such 7 skills by that time are faced with enormous challenges.

8 When provided with opportunities for early childhood 9 education, children are more likely to succeed in kindergarten 10 and beyond and more likely to grow into healthy and capable 11 adults who contribute positively to the larger community. 12 Research emphasizes that high-quality programs are necessary to 13 produce positive outcomes for children, both in the near- and 14 long-term. Studies have shown that high-quality early childhood 15 education programs are especially effective for at-risk 16 children, including children from low-income families and 17 otherwise disadvantaged children, with great potential to alter 18 their lifetime trajectories for success.

19 Well-executed and well-targeted early childhood education 20 programs have immediate and long-term benefits not only for the 21 children participating in the programs but also for the 22 societies in which they live, as determined by seminal studies 3B1095 HD2 HMS 2013-3222 3B1095 HD2 HMS 2013-3222 Page 3



1 such as those conducted by the HighScope and Chicago Parent-2 Child Centers programs. Societies that invest in such programs 3 realize higher levels of educational attainment; reductions in 4 homelessness, crime, and substance abuse; improved health; and 5 better overall social and economic well-being. A 2008 study 6 commissioned by the Good Beginnings Alliance found that every 7 dollar invested today in high-quality early childhood education 8 for Hawaii generates more than four dollars in future savings 9 and increased earnings through state, federal, and social 10 benefits.

SECTION 2. Chapter 302L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

14 "<u>\$302L-</u> Early childhood education program. (a) There
15 is established within the early learning system an early
16 childhood education program to be administered by the office.
17 The early childhood education program shall:

18 (1) Through either of the state's two official languages,

- 19 prepare children for school and active participation
  20 in society; and
- 21 (2) Provide equitable access to high-quality early
   22 childhood education that addresses children's

2	development.
3	(b) The early childhood education program shall serve
4	three- and four-year-old children, with priority extended to:
5	(1) Four-year-old children; and
6	(2) Underserved or at-risk children.
7	(c) Enrollment in the early childhood education program
8	shall be voluntary. A parent or legal guardian shall share in
9	the costs of the program through a copayment according to a
10	sliding fee scale that is based on need and through fulfillment
11	of family participation requirements, pursuant to rules adopted
12	by the office. A child who is enrolled in or eligible to attend
13	a public elementary school shall not be eligible for enrollment
14	in the early childhood education program.
15	(d) The office may contract with eligible providers, which
16	may include private providers, of early childhood education to
17	increase the capacity of the early childhood education program
18	to provide high-quality early childhood education to children
19	across the State. Eligible providers shall meet, or develop
20	plans to meet, the Hawaiian or English language medium education
21	standards, as applicable, established under the early childhood
22	education program pursuant to rules adopted by the office. The

2	Eligible	providers shall comply with all applicable state and
3	federal l	aws.
4	<u>(e)</u>	The early childhood education program standards shall:
5	(1)	Include research-based, developmentally appropriate
6		practices that are associated with better educational
7		outcomes for children, such as hiring teachers who
8		possess a bachelor's degree with not less than twelve
9		credits in early childhood education or child
10		development; curriculum aligned with the Hawaii early
11		learning and development standards; and individual
12		assessments of children, based upon all areas of
13		childhood development and learning, including
14		cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional
15		approaches to learning and health and physical
16		development; and
17	(2)	Align with the state content and performance standards
18		for grades kindergarten to twelve to facilitate a
19		seamless and high-quality educational experience for
20		children.

1	(f) The office shall coordinate with other agencies and
2	programs to facilitate comprehensive services for early
3	childhood education.
4	(g) The office shall collect data to evaluate services
5	provided, inform sound policy, and improve the provision of
6	early childhood education through the early childhood education
7	program.
8	(h) The office shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
9	necessary to carry out the purposes of this section, including
10	compliance with all applicable state and federal laws."
11	SECTION 3. Section 302L-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
13	and to read as follows:
14	""Early childhood education program" means an education
15	program for children provided for in section 302L"
16	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
17	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
18	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 and the
19	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
20	2014-2015 for the purpose of establishing a statewide early
21	childhood education program.

3	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

7	appropriation of public funds for private early childhood
8	education; provided that section 4 shall take effect on July 1,
