A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING FUND.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the ongoing impacts
- 2 of the recession are particularly challenging to the small
- 3 businesses in Hawaii. Small businesses with fewer than fifty
- 4 employees represent over ninety-five per cent of employer firms
- 5 in the State of Hawaii according to the research and statistics
- 6 office of the department of labor and industrial relations.
- 7 These small businesses play an important role in job creation
- 8 and have an integral role in maintaining and improving the
- 9 economic situation in Hawaii.
- 10 The legislature further finds that the inability of small
- 11 businesses to provide training for their workers is impeding
- 12 their ability to both remain viable and grow, which would
- 13 enhance economic recovery in Hawaii. The employment and
- 14 training fund was established to support innovative programs
- 15 developed in cooperation between business and government to
- 16 assist employers and workers.
- 17 The legislature further finds that the activities supported
- 18 by the employment and training fund is one avenue by which the

1	State can support small business and further the economic		
2	recovery in Hawaii. Moreover, Governor Abercrombie's New Day		
3	efforts to support small businesses can be augmented by		
4	strengthening the use of the employment and training fund to		
5	support workforce training activities for small businesses.		
6	The purpose of this Act is to amend the employment and		
7	training fund law to assist small businesses in business-		
8	specific training programs and industry specific training		
9	programs where there are critical skill shortages in high growth		
10	occupational or industry areas.		
11	SECTION 2. Section 383-128, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
12	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:		
13	"(b) The moneys in the employment and training fund may be		
14	used for funding:		
15	(1) The operation of the state employment service for		
16	which no federal funds have been allocated;		
17	(2) Business-specific training programs to create a more		
18	diversified job base and to carry out the purposes of		
19	the new industry training program pursuant to section		
20	394-8[\div] with emphasis on serving small businesses by		
21	serving the training needs for industries included in		
22	the State's economic development strategy as		
23	recommended by the department of business, economic

2		by the county workforce investment boards, employer
3		organizations, industry or trade associations, labor
4		organizations and similar organizations;
5	(3)	Industry or employer-specific training programs where
6		there are critical skill shortages in high growth
7		occupational or industry areas[+] with emphasis on
8		serving small businesses by serving the training needs
9		for industries included in the State's economic
10		development strategy as recommended by the department
11		of business, economic development, and tourism and
12		training needs identified by the county workforce
13		investment boards, employer organizations, industry or
14		trade associations, labor organizations and similar
15		organizations;
16	(4)	Training and retraining programs to assist workers who
17		have become recently unemployed or are likely to be
18		unemployed;
19	(5)	Programs to assist residents who do not otherwise
20		qualify for federal or state job training programs to
21		overcome employment barriers; and

1	(6) Training programs to provide job-specific skills for
2	individuals in need of assistance to improve career

DEPARTMENT:

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYMENT

AND TRAINING FUND.

PURPOSE:

To facilitate the use of Employment and Training Fund (ETF) moneys to strengthen local small businesses through training programs described in the State's economic development strategy as recommended by the Department of Business, Economic

Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) and local

workforce investment boards.

MEANS:

JUSTIFICATION:

Amend section 383-128(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes.

In Hawaii, small businesses with fewer than fifty employees represent over 95 percent of employer firms. These small businesses play an important role in job creation and retention and have an integral role in improving the economic situation in the State.

Although small businesses are critical to job creation and economic recovery, they face significant challenges in providing training for their workers. ETF moneys can assist small businesses and their workers by providing training that otherwise would not be available.

Impact on the public: By supporting the continued economic recovery of the State, this measure, if enacted, will benefit all of Hawaii and especially the small businesses and their workers that participate in ETF-supported training programs. Moreover, existing as well as new

small businesses will benefit from a stronger partnership with the State.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
The department will be in a better position
to carry out its mission of developing a
qualified workforce by working more closely
with the small business community.
